Hsu publishes green tea book internationally

As a youth, Dr. Stephen Hsu found only misery in green tea. For six and a half years, he spent up to 18 hours a day working in a remote farmland, harvesting tea leaves and growing other produce in a Chinese labor camp for children from the "capitalist class."

Now, decades later, the worldrenowned green tea researcher has published a book about the beverage's benefits on health and lifestyle

lifestyle.

The book, *Green Tea and Beyond*, written by Hsu, a Molecular and Cell Biologist in the Georgia Health Sciences University College of Dental Medicine, with Christine Hurley Deriso, GHSU Editorial Manager, was published by Nova Publishing and is available in the United States, Europe and Japan.


"In the labor camp, I never dreamed I'd spend my life researching and writing about benefits of the tea plant I was being forced to grow," Hsu said.

The book explains the health benefits of green tea based on his 10 years of research. Along with his findings of green tea's effects on cancer, skin disorders, obesity, autoimmune diseases and other conditions, the book discusses the origins of tea and how to easily incorporate it and other related products into the diet to prevent or lower the risks of many illnesses.

Hsu noted that countries with a tradition of consuming high quantities of green tea, such as China and Japan, have lower rates of certain cancers, diabetes, obesity and cardiovascular disease than the United States. With the adoption of a Western lifestyle, this tradition weakens and these diseases became more prevalent, despite the modernization of health care, Hsu said. He hypothesized that the correlation is not one to be ignored.

Symposium sheds light on lupus

A diagnosis of lupus can seem daunting with its sporadic flare-ups and fluctuating symptoms.

"One person may experience joint pain and fatigue while another battles skin rashes and sudden weight loss. But there is hope for lupus sufferers, and that's the message we want to get to people at our upcoming event," said Dr. Alyce Oliver, a Rheumatologist at MCGHealth.

The second annual "Living with Lupus" Symposium will be held from 9 a.m. to noon Saturday, March 5, in the Lee Auditorium. The free event is sponsored by MCGHealth and the Georgia Chapter of the Lupus Foundation of America.

Leading physicians will cover critical topics including organ involvement, lab results, nutrition, symptoms, diagnosis, kidney health, skin health and pregnancy.

Lupus is a clinical diagnosis that requires a thorough physical exam and blood testing. Treatment for

lupus is usually organ-based, but because so many systems can be affected, multidisciplinary care is the best approach.

The multidisciplinary Lupus Clinic at MCGHealth includes several specialists, and three of them - Oliver, Nephrologist Michael Madaio and Dermatologist Loretta Davis - will answer questions from patients and families during a special question-and-answer session at the symposium.

"There are many misconceptions out there about lupus," Oliver said. "It's not hopeless. There are effective drugs and treatments that can improve a patient's quality of life."

Oliver also recommends the Augusta Lupus Support Group, which meets monthly at the Augusta-Richmond County Public Library. For information about the support group, contact Beverly O'Hara at 706-394-6484.

Grants fund mental health services for MS patients

Patients expect a physical check up when they arrive for regular clinical visits at the Augusta Multiple Sclerosis Center. But thanks to grants from the Multiple Sclerosis Foundation and the Clinton Anderson Hospital Foundation, they have also been offered mental health screenings and counseling.

Offering such psychological services as part of a clinic visit is a novel idea made possible by the two organizations during the past five years.

"This doesn't happen in most clinics," said Dr. Lara M. Stepleman, Director of Multiple Sclerosis and HIV Psychological Services and Co-Director of the Education Discovery Institute.

Multiple sclerosis is an autoimmune disease that affects the central nervous system. The disease can affect patients' abilities to walk, talk, see and think. It may hamper or completely alter careers and life plans. Episodes are unpredictable in onset, duration and severity. And the disease has no cure.

It's not surprising that depression and anxiety is common in individuals with MS In fact, the suicide rate for individuals with MS is seven times higher than that of the general population.

The disease can be devastating to young lives, as the onset of symptoms and then diagnosis often occurs before the age of 40.

"That's right when patients are making life decisions – what am I going to do with my life?" said Mitzi. J Williams, Medical Director of the Augusta Multiple Sclerosis Center and Medical Director of Adult Rehabilitation Services.

Williams says that loss of personal control contributes to the emotional difficulties many patients face. But their own anxieties may also feed back into their disease.

For example, fearing relapse of MS symptoms, some patients may find themselves irritable and unable to sleep. Lack of sleep and mental preoccupation may result in heightened forgetfulness or decreased fine motor control, which mimics some symptoms of MS. The patient may then assume the symptoms are caused by a relapse. Counseling may reduce a patient's anxiety or depression, thereby lessening the symptoms and heading off further stress.

Despite the fact that depression and anxiety are highly treatable conditions, many MS patients go untreated.

"There is a stigma attached to mental health services," Williams said. In addition, about 50 percent of MS patients have mobility issues that make it difficult to attend appointments.

Co-locating the psychological services with the medical clinic cuts through issues of mobility, unfamiliarity with a new treatment location or providers, and anxiety associated with cobbling together different services to treat one multidimensional problem. Integrated services also facilitates adherence to treatment recommendations.

With the grant money provided by the two foundations, the Augusta MS Center is staffed with postdoctoral fellows and doctoral psychology residents, who work under the supervision of Stepleman and Williams. To the 1,500 patients of the center, they provide psychological consultations, cognitive assessments, brief counseling sessions and crisis intervention.

For example, a mother with MS may find that the usual difficulties in parenting teenagers are increased. Counseling may offer her new techniques for communicating with her children that lessen that additional stressor.

Similarly, a couples may face challenges to their relationship as their roles transform to meet the changing limitations of MS. Counseling can improve communication help preserve and strengthen a relationship.

Stepleman says that any patient who accepts the offer of assistance receives a 15-30 minute consultation addressing self-reported or provider-identified problems, triaging for further services and up to five sessions of solution-focused therapy like behavioral interventions for mood and stress management.

They're services that Stepleman and Williams hope will both improve and save lives.

To date, the Multiple Sclerosis Foundation has provided more than \$140,000 and the Clinton Anderson Hospital Foundation has supported the services with \$17,500 in grants.





Competitors win race, save lives

The patient was unconscious. The medical team had found him after he had been missing for several days from his campsite. They were waiting for a helicopter to evacuate him when the unthinkable happened: The chopper crashed.

"What started out as a very simple plan ended up being markedly complex," said Dr. Michael Caudell, Associate Professor of Emergency Medicine and the Medical Director for Wilderness Medicine and Survival Medicine in the GHSU Center of Operational Medicine.

Helping students, residents and practicing physicians deal with the variables in a simulated situation like this is the purpose of MedWar, an orienteering race begun by Caudell and former GHSU Professor of Emergency Medicine David Ledrick in 2001. The annual race combines adventure racing with wilderness medicine to test academic and practical knowledge.


Teams of four run, canoe and bicycle through a course at Fort Gordon, stopping at stations for medical exercises. Organizers hit them with anything related to wilderness medicine -fractures, cuts, infections, animal attacks, exposure to

elements, food and water contamination, lightning strikes and even avalanches. Anything that can occur in the wilderness is fair game.

Rachel Nix, a second-year medical student who is helping to organize this year's race, remembers a year when racers had to perform an emergency cricotomy using pig tracheas. A first-year medical student may have had no previous exposure to surgical techniques, so mistakes can abound.

"It's exciting because whether you're racing or volunteering, you're going to learn a lot. The attendings are wonderful about teaching - it's what they love to do. Even if you don't necessarily know what to do when you approach a medical situation, you'll be instructed in a respectful way. And it's great to get outside, and in a learning situation that is hands-on, rather than in the classroom," she said.

For example, racers evaluating a missing camper have a number of decisions to make. Upon "finding" him, they can construct a litter (an impromptu stretcher) or wait for the rescue chopper's long spine board. They can carry him up the hill to the clearing, or wait until he can be

"The more I learned, the more I found there was to learn," Hsu said. 
Foundation and prospective major donors.

Division of Advancement and Community Relations at GHSU, which raises funds for the university as well as clinical services. "In this new year, we're fortunate to continue to benefit from this happy combination. With support from institutional leadership, our new division is poised to achieve ever higher goals. And we look forward to continuing to engage our volunteers and donors in GHSU's leading edge education, research and clinical care."

The CASE WealthEngine Awards recognize overall performance and overall improvement in educational fundraising programs based on data submitted to the Council for Aid to Education's Voluntary Support of Education survey. Judges select winners based on a number of factors, including:

- the pattern of growth in total support (or adjusted total support if appropriate)
- evaluation of what contributed to the total support figure
- overall breadth in program
- pattern of growth in each program area
- pattern of donor growth among graduates who are donors and other individual donors
- impact of the 12 largest gifts on total support
- total support in relation to the graduate base
 - type of institution

In selecting award winners, judges use the factors to find significant program growth across three years of data. Institutions are evaluated within appropriate peer groups, using different size and type classifications.

Over fiscal year 2008 to fiscal year 2010, Georgia Health Sciences University saw an eight percent increase in overall giving.



winched. Each decision has immediate consequences that affect the fictional patient and the ability of team members to finish the grueling race.

"They've got to figure out what's going on. If they do get through the scenario and do it properly, that's great. But if not, we immediately give them feedback," Caudell said.

There is more than one way to approach a situation, and the intractability of wilderness medicine often inspires innovation and improvisation that teaches something new to the volunteers and experienced medical professionals who oversee it.

"You think you know what the best options are, but then you see someone stabilize a c-spine in a way that I never would have thought of," Caudell said.

Nix said that they try to make the medical scenarios as fun as possible – but it's best when the participant playing the role of the injured per-

son is a good actor. In fact, organizers sometimes give a Drama Queen Award for acting.

The muscled military members playing very confused victims of altitude sickness were good for a few laughs. And during one race, a participant portraying a traumainduced psychological break was so annoying to the "rescuers" that some of the teams opted to tie him down. While amusing, Caudell said that the scenarios serve a medical purpose as well.

"They had to figure out how to take care of this person who is losing it," Caudell said.

The lifelong lessons ingrained by practical experience are precisely what the creators intended. Three students used Caudell's and Ledrick's first orienteering experience at Wildwood Park in Columbia County as a research project on innovations in education and presented it to the Society of Academic Emergency Medicine. When Ledrick returned to his native Ohio, he began one there, while Caudell continued here.

The project continued to grow, so the pair formed a non-profit to oversee the direction and quality of the races. Presently, there are nine races nationwide and in Canada. The local planners run the races as they desire, but submit the medical scenarios to the directors for approval. Some races host as many as 50 teams.

"This stuff is really fun, but there's a reason that I organize it but don't race it. It's challenging. Start training now," Nix said.

Caudell and Ledrick just returned from competing in a MedWar in Park City, Utah, that was raced entirely on snowshoes. The directors knew who they were, but kept it quiet. Their team beat most of the younger teams that competed.

"You old guys were just flying through those medical scenarios. You didn't miss anything," one competitor commented in surprise.

"Yeah, we better not have,' Caudell said.




