## Augusta Chamber wants to help MCG conference planners

Setting up conferences, meetings and conventions for departments, sections or professional societies can be a juggling act with all the details threatening to fall on the meeting planner's head if just one detail is missed.

Mary Gause of the Convention and Visitors Bureau of the Greater Augusta Chamber of Commerce would like to make the job easier for those with this responsibility. "The bureau is very service oriented," she says, "There is a lot we can do for those at MCG who organize conferences and meetings that will be held in Augusta."

The bureau begins work-

ing with any meeting from the start. They will send out proposals for rates from local hotels and provide a report on the hotels responses to the conference group.

"If the meeting is a large one and more than one hotel is needed, we will work out the problems of registration by having the hotel reservations come to the chamber so those giving the meeting don't have to keep up with who is staying where and, if appropriate, make sure specific groups, such as an organization's executive committee, are located in the same hotel for convenience," Gause says.

The bureau provides,

at no charge, publications, containing information of special interest to visitors; hotel/motel accommodations, restaurants, special events, cultural interests, tours of attractions and museums.

Publicity for the convention will also be set up by the bureau at no cost. This can include press releases, setting up appearances on local talk shows to promote the convention and planning a news conference.

"We will put the conference planner in touch with those in the area who can provide support services," Gause says. "These services can include photography, printers, audio-

visual rental equipment, florists, speciality advertising and local speakers. We will also provide someone from either the Chamber or local government to give a welcome at the conference's opening, if so desired.

"These services are free. Our purpose is to take some of the load off the meeting planner and help them put on a well received meeting in Augusta," she says. "In the past we have worked with groups at the Medical College in planning their conferences and meetings. We will be happy to work with any MCG group planning an Augusta meeting in the future."

In addition, Dr. Cordell L. (Chip) Bragg, Dr. Charles Howell and Dr. Robert A. Parrish are the MCG doctors in the film.

Tom Greene and Bob Shaver of MCG television services produced the film. Teresa Bates and Sara Jimenez assisted Williams in writing the script for the film.

The film was made in memory of Sara Wiley, a RN on MCG Hospital's surgery and pediatric surgery units, who died in 1984. Wiley was a dedicated advocate of educating pediatric surgery patients, according to Williams.

RULES

TUG OF WAR

- 1. There must be eight contestants on either side.
- 2. Participants can only compete on one tug-of-war team.
- 3. Participants can not wear cleats of any kind. Violators of this rule will be immediately disqualified and the team will forfeit the pull.
- 4. A line is drawn at right angles to the rope and midway between the two teams. A handkerchief or white rag is tied in the middle of the rope. Players line up, taking hold of the rope. The anchor man on each side, that is, the end man, may wind the rope about his body.
- 5. The leader calls "Ready!" All players assume positions. "Set!" All players pull the slack out of the rope and get ready for the pull. "Go!" All players pull with all their might.
- 6. The winner will be determined by the first team who pulls their opponents past the flag. There will be four divisions: light weight, medium weight, heavy weight, and super heavy weight. All weight limits must pull and win to be eligible for prizes. In the event only one team enters in a particular category, the team will be notified in advance in order that they might alter their team to compete in another category.
- 7. If a contestant withdraws, an alternate may be substituted; however, the weight of the team must remain within their weight division as submitted on the registration form.
