## Medical College operators They've got your number

Maybe it was just a bad dream.

"It could have been," you reason.

"It could have been a car in the street or those noisy neighbors," you think as you consider the prospect of rolling over and slipping back into a sound slumber.

But a little voice in the back of your head tells you it probably wasn't a dream, a noisy car or the neighbors.

You'd better call paging.

Just as you've gathered your senses, stumbled across the bedroom and managed to hit most of the right numbers on the telephone, you are assured that you've taken the proper action.

"Beep, beep, beep," the pager calls. "Please call paging, 3893, 3893," requests a voice too pleasant for the middle of the night.

The voices of the Medical College of Georgia telephone operators are unmistakable — clear, professional and to-the-point.

The 13 women who make up the Medical College of Georgia operators staff are the voices that wake on-call personnel in the wee hours of the night, track down health care professionals in the hospital, answer the main Medical College of Georgia number (828-0211) and they are the ones Medical College of Georgia employees reach when they dial 0.

During an average 24-hour period, the team of operators answers about 2,300 calls. In a

month, they can rack up as many as 67,000 calls.

With that many calls coming in a day, the operators have experienced just about every kind of call imaginable.

"I call the public the good, the bad and the ugly," said operator Lucille Lockett laughingly.

Many people are kind and very appreciative, said Ms. Lockett, who has served as a Medical College operator for 15 years. Others can be nasty. Then there is a special group who challenge the operators' capabilities.

"They'll call and tell us they want to talk to the doctor they saw today," Ms. Lockett said. "I'll ask if they know what the doctor's name was or where they

saw him. They'll say they don't, so I ask them what they saw the doctor for."

Ms. Lockett said she keeps asking the caller questions until she tracks down enough information to connect him with the proper physician.

"I don't mind helping them," said Ms. Lockett. "I understand. I do the same thing when I go to the doctor's."

The operators monitor the switchboards 24 hours a day. During the 7 a.m.-3 p.m. and 3-11 p.m. shifts, there are three or four operators on duty. Through the night there are two operators answering the phones.

"You have to have the ability to have two or three things in your mind at once," said chief operator Jennie Walker. "The first thing I tell my new operators is to memorize the procedure manual. You have to operate quickly. You're learning something new every day."

The operators can be the vital link in an emergency situation. When a Code 99 (cardiac arrest) is sounded, they drop whatever they're doing. "A Code 99 takes precedence," said Ms. Lockett. "Somebody's life is dependent on it."

## Survey designed to assess employee child care needs

Medical College of Georgia officials would like to know whether faculty and staff would take advantage of extended hours of operation at the new Medical College of Georgia Child Care Center.

A survey, distributed with pay vouchers, asks employees if they would enroll their children at the Child Care Center if the hours were extended from the present 6:30 a.m. - 6 p.m. Monday through Friday schedule to a 6 a.m.- midnight Monday through Sunday schedule.

The Child Care Center, located on Old Bailie Street, is licensed to accommodate 121 children from 6 weeks to 12 years old.

A weekly fee of \$54 is charged for infants in diapers. The fee pays for diapers, formula and strained food. A \$45 weekly fee is charged for older children and pays for breakfast, mid-morning and mid-afternoon snacks and a hot lunch. A discount is given for additional children in the same family.

Children also are accepted on a part-time, drop-in basis when space is available. The part-time rate is \$2 per hour for infants in diapers and \$1.75 an hour for older children.

## Hospital joins search for missing children

The Medical College of Georgia Hospital and Clinics was one of the first medical facilities in the country to join in a nationwide program to help locate missing children.

Along with other hospitals in the Augusta area, the Medical College of Georgia Hospital has agreed to use missing children directories developed by Child Keyppers' International, a non-profit organization based in Lake Worth, Fla.

Augusta area hospitals will be among about 52,000 emergency rooms, dentist and doctors offices across the country who will be using the Child Keypper's Emergency Room Medical and Dental Directories to help spot missing children.

The directories reference the children by sex, year of birth and race. Medical and dental histories are printed next to the children's photos. The

directories will be updated and redistributed quarterly.

Jo Ann Currier, president and founder of Child Keyppers' International, presented the directories to local hospital officials during a July press conference.

Since most children need medical care at some point, the directories will serve as a reference for medical professionals who may notice unusual behavior, Mrs. Currier said.

"The average person on the street will never have the opportunity to look for a particular mole or scar like a nurse will," she said.

Three of the 149 children featured in the directory are from the Augusta area. They are 5-year-old Jeremy James Grice of Bath, S.C., 6-year-old Nicholas Scott of Aiken, S.C., and 7-year-old Adrian Thomas Fredericks of Martinez, Ga.

## Dr. Godt named to study group

Dr. Robert E. Godt, professor of physiology and endocrinology at the Medical College of Georgia, has been appointed to a four-year term on the Physiology Study Section of the Division of Research Grants of the National Institutes of Health.

In his position on the study section, Dr. Godt will be involved in the initial review of grant applications submitted to the National Institutes of Health for funding.

Scientists from around the world submit projects to the NIH with the hope of securing research funds.

calls is the toughest job, the operators agree. Because the list of on-call personnel is always changing, it can be a big job to keep up with who is on-call and who's not. In addition, there may be several paging calls coming in and several paging calls on hold, requiring the operator to perform a switchboard juggling act.

"Some people say we don't do anything but sit here all day. That's true, it's not a physical job, but it is a mental job," Ms. Lockett said.

Unlike many hospital telephone operators, the

Medical College of Georgia's operators take care of a very diverse group, said Emmie Powell, a 30-year veteran Medical College operator. They must not only meet the needs of the hospital staff, patients and visitors, but also lend assistance to the students and staff of the Medical College's five schools.

Though it can sometimes be a demanding and frustrating job, it's one that Ms. Lockett said she enjoys. "It's very fulfilling. I like dealing with the public. Most times you are so busy that you don't have time

to get mad at them."

Ms. Powell agrees. "I like dealing with the public, but this way you never have to face them," she said with a laugh.

"You kind of get it in your blood," Ms. Walker added. "You either like it or you don't."

And so it goes. Hour after hour, day after day, month after month.

"Medical College of Georgia operator. That number is 2867. Thank you."

## Diabetes grants exceed \$73,000

Three Medical College of Georgia researchers have received one-year grants totaling \$73,718 from the American Diabetes Association.

Jerry Freeman, executive director of the American Diabetes Association - Georgia Affiliate, was in Augusta recently to present the money to the researchers.

Dr. Edathara C. Abraham, professor of cell and molecular biology, received \$25,000 for the study of "The Effect of Non-enzymatic Glycosylation of Lens Crystallines on Diabetic Cataract Formation."

Dr. Abraham will study the way cataracts form in diabetic patients. Cataracts, which are a clouding of the eye's lens, are a major problem for patients with diabetes. The Medical College professor is looking at the proteins and the lenses that are modified in cataracts.

Dr. Gerald O. Carrier, professor of pharmacology and toxicology, will study "The Cholinergic System in the Heart in Diabetes."

Diabetics experience a variety of cardiovascular problems and, in fact, most deaths

from diabetes are related to problems with the cardiovascular system. With the \$25,000 from the ADA, Dr. Carrier will attempt to determine what the abnormality of this system is and attempt to see if it can be reversed. It appears that the cholinergic system, which is involved in the regulation of heart rate, is altered in diabetics.

Dr. Warren B. Karp, associate professor of pediatrics, has received \$23,718 from the

ADA to study, "Glycosylated Proteins in Diabetic Cerebral Edema."

One of the problems with young diabetics is brain swelling and possible death. Dr. Karp will be using the ADA funds to look at the causes of the potentially lethal swelling.

In 1985, the ADA funded \$30 million in grants. The association hopes to more than triple that figure by 1990.

## Course offered for secretaries

Secretaries and office personnel who want to update their skills and improve their earning potential can take advantage of a comprehensive program offered through Augusta College's Office of Continuing Education.

In the nine-month program which begins Sept. 13, participants will take five courses: business writing, general office procedures, interpersonal relations, records management, and economics and management. Classes will be held from 7 to 9 p.m. Tuesdays.

Although any of the courses may be taken separately, an individual who enrolls in the entire program, satisfactorily completes the coursework and attends 75 percent of the class sessions will receive a secretarial skills certificate and 5.6 continuing education units of credit.

## Two from Medical College on symposium committee

An associate professor and a post-doctoral fellow at the Medical College of Georgia are helping to organize an international symposium to be held Sept. 22-25, 1987, in Taormina, Italy.

Dr. Jerry J. Buccafusco, associate professor of pharmacology and toxicology, and Dr. Giuseppe R. Trimarchi, who is doing his post-doctoral fellowship at the Medical College, are members of the organizing committee for "Brain Acetylcholine: From Preclinical to Clinical Investigations."

Acetylcholine, one of body's key neurotransmitters involved in most major body processes from thinking to movement, will be pursued on both a basic science and clinical level at the meeting.

Scientific topics include acetylcholine neurons: pre- and postsynaptic aspects; plasticity of brain cholinergic system; central cholinergic mechanisms and arterial blood pressure regulation; and animal models as tools for studying cholinergic functions.

Clinical correlates include

sleep, aging brain and dementias, memory, neurological and psychiatric diseases.

The symposium should be of interest to psychiatrists, neurologists, neurosurgeons, psychologists, specialists in geriatrics, cardiologists, clinical pharmacologists and experts in hypertension, Dr. Buccafusco said.

Essentially, all basic scientists should find interesting the symposium on this key neurotransmitter, he said.

In addition to guest lecturers on each of the scientific topics, a number of volunteer papers are being accepted for discussion at the meeting.

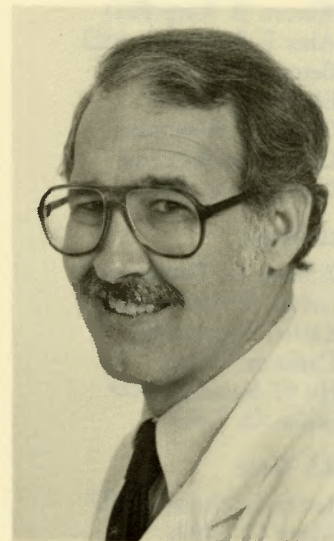
## Two named to trauma staff

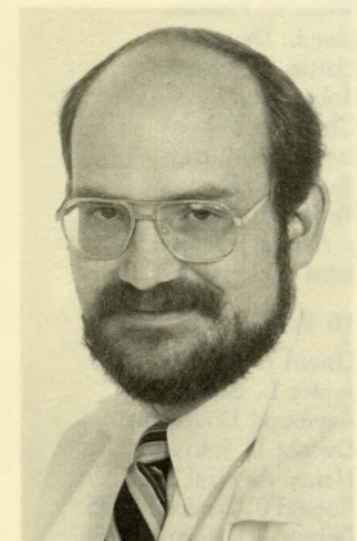
Dr. Durham, assistant professor of surgery at the Medical College, is a graduate of the
