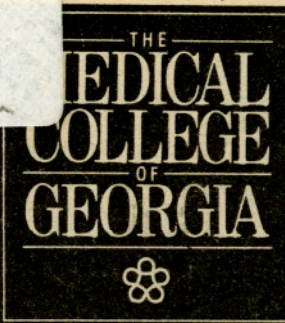

## MCG celebrates 160 years

The Medical College of Georgia turns 160 this year, and all students, faculty and staff are invited to join in the festivities.

But be advised that this is no ordinary anniversary party. The yearlong celebration will give MCG a chance to blow its horn as never before.

"We're an institution on the move, on the cutting edge of health care for the state of Georgia. This is a great opportunity to expose people to the past, present and future of this in-

stitution," said MCG marketing and public relations director George Foster.

The festivities will kick off with a Jan. 21 press conference at the Sacred Heart Cultural Center. John Anderson, MCG vice president for development, will preside and present a tape by President Ronald Reagan congratulating MCG for its accomplishments.

Augusta will roll out the red carpet

with dozens of billboards donated by Lamar Advertising Company touting MCG's message of caring, discovering and teaching. Billboards also will be erected statewide, and banners will hang across 15th and Harper Streets and Laney-Walker Boulevard.

MCG's five schools also will get into the act. Each will be featured during a month this year — allied health sciences in September, dentistry in May, graduate studies in November,

medicine in December and nursing in April. The months will feature local and statewide commemorative events sponsored by the schools' faculty, students and alumni. Hospital plans also are under way.

Dignitaries will pitch in, too. Proclamations from Gov. Joe Frank Harris and Augusta Mayor Charles DeVaney and a joint resolution from the Georgia Senate and House of Representatives will laud 160 years of

achievement.

Mr. Anderson stressed that everyone affiliated with MCG, even those not directly involved in the pomp and circumstance, should share in the acclaim.

"An institution is made up of people from varied walks of life, and without them, you can't function," he said. "Everybody has their niche, and they play an important part in making this place run."

## Bonds delayed, but projects to continue

The \$37 million in general obligation bonds to be used to fund construction of a new ambulatory care center and specialized care facility for the Medical College of Georgia are not in the governor's recommendations for the 1988 supplemental budget for the state of Georgia.

However, the lack of inclusion of

the bonds this year will mean only a slight delay — possibly a few months — in the construction of the facilities, Dr. Judson C. Hickey, acting president said in a called faculty meeting January 6.

Dr. Hickey received word earlier that day from Chancellor H. Dean Propst that the bonds were not in the 1988 supplemental budget.

"Although the chancellor and the Board of Regents requested approval

of \$37 million in general obligation bonds in the 1988 supplemental appropriation for MCG's ambulatory care and specialized care centers, we have been advised that these projects will not be included," Dr. Hickey told the faculty.

"They could not be included due to a limit to be imposed this year on the amount of bonds to be authorized and concerns that the bonds' proceeds

could not be used immediately for construction.

"However, the chancellor informed me this afternoon that he and the regents are still firmly committed to this project as a high priority item for the university system. They will work through the legislative process to obtain a commitment during this session so that we can proceed on schedule and with confidence with our planning," Dr. Hickey said.

"In fact, the chancellor encouraged us to proceed," the acting president said.

"By the end of January of 1988, that is this month, we should have functional programming of the facilities completed, at which time we will

select the architects. The architectural development will require approximately 12 months, which will take us well into the 1989 Legislative session," he said. Construction should begin no later than spring 1989.

"The chancellor and the regents expect this approach will have a minimal effect on the anticipated overall construction schedule for these important projects," Dr. Hickey said.

"I assure you that the interest by the chancellor, the interest by the governor, the interest by other persons that have approved this project ... has not lessened, nor has any of the work that any of you have done been in vain," he said.

## GeorgiaCare enrollment kicking off this month

Employee enrollment in GeorgiaCare, the new supplement to the University System of Georgia health care plan which eliminates out-of-pocket co-insurance expenses, will begin this month. Enrollment information will be mailed to employees.

The program is consistent with the goals of the Medical College of Georgia Hospital and Clinics to make patient-sensitive service a primary concern, said Ed Howell, hospital director.

"We are committed to making this program work," said Mr. Howell. "The employee who becomes our patient will be confident of receiving

quality care. That's the value of this program."

The program offers not only economic incentives, but the "additional confidence that there's no need to compromise the quality of care while saving money," Mr. Howell said.

Jan Menger, GeorgiaCare coordinator, is a part of the program's goal of providing sensitive service to the MCG family, Mr. Howell said. Because she has served MCG for many years, Mr. Howell said he felt she would provide responsive service to other MCG employees.

Mrs. Menger will monitor the effectiveness of the program and be accessible to plan participants in her of-

## Symposium features Greenbaum

Dr. Lowell Greenbaum recently made oral and poster presentations at the International Kinin Congress in Tokyo on his discovery of T-kinin and T-kininogen. The congress and a satellite symposium were held Nov. 29-Dec. 5.

T-kinins are peptides released in the body by injury or inflammation. They have been isolated in rat models

and have also been found in fluid accumulation in human ovarian cancer. Dr. Greenbaum proposes that blocking T-kinins may lessen that fluid accumulation.

Dr. Greenbaum holds a Ph.D. in pharmacology and is dean of the School of Graduate Studies and MCG vice president for research.

# MCG founder changed health care's course

Editor's note: This is the first of a monthly series highlighting contributors to the Medical College of Georgia's 160 years of excellence.

Ah, the good old days. Simplicity, vitality... That's what frontier times were all about, right?

Well, actually, Georgians of the late 18th and early 19th centuries might have slightly different perspectives — especially unhealthy Georgians.

A common "cure" at the time was the use of leeches to drain patients of up to 80 percent of their blood. Even the most educated physicians practiced dubious, sometimes fatal medicine, and untrained quacks abounded.

Enter Milton Antony.

Dr. Antony, a man from Wilkes County, Ga., who attended a University of Pennsylvania medical course but quit before graduating, seems an unlikely candidate for helping to change the course of health care. But that's exactly what he did.

Although he lacked a formal degree, as did most people practicing medicine at the time, Dr. Antony carved a career as a physician. He moved to Augusta after attending school in Pennsylvania and in 1821, he pioneered an operation for empyema, the accumulation of pus in a body cavity. A year later, he helped create the Medical Society of Augusta.

But his work had only just begun. In 1826, he and colleague Joseph Adams Eve began teaching apprentices in several rooms of Augusta's City Hospital of Augusta. Two years later, he campaigned for the establishment of a more ambitious school using the hospital as a focal point. He pushed for the charter of a state medical academy in which a bachelor of medicine degree would be awarded after a year of studies. On Dec. 20, 1828, Gov. John Forsyth signed the charter, and Augusta's medical

legacy was born.

A 24-member board of trustees was created, and in March 1829, the board assembled for first time. Drs. Antony, William Waring and Lewis deSaussure Ford were named faculty members, and the school began on Oct. 1, 1829, with seven students.

Dr. Antony taught midwifery and diseases of women and children. He also spearheaded authorization of a second year of lectures, approval of three additional faculty members and a name change to the Medical Institute of the State of Georgia.

He also established and became the first editor of the "Southern Medical and Surgical Journal." First published in 1836, the journal would become the longest-lasting and one of the most respected of antebellum southern medical periodicals.

This journal, along with Dr. Antony's insistence on quality health care and education, established the college as a true force in the medical world.

And Dr. Antony was at the helm until his death in 1839.

# Society accepts in vitro program

The Medical College of Georgia In Vitro Fertilization Program has been accepted as a member of the Society for Assisted Reproductive Technology, an affiliate of the American Fertility Society.

Society members' programs must meet strict criteria, including having three live births from three different mothers and having a board certified or board-eligible reproductive endocrinologist, a gynecological surgeon and a laboratory director-endocrinologist.

Also, services such as ultrasonography, hormonal assays, anesthesia and a laboratory for fertilization and embryo development near the operating room must be available on a 24-hour basis.

At present, 76 in vitro fertilization programs in the country have been accepted as members of the society.

The three-year-old MCG program offers a variety of options for treatment of infertility.

During in vitro fertilization, the husband's sperm and the wife's eggs are combined in the laboratory for fertilization. The growing embryos are then transferred to the uterus with the hope that the natural process of attachment will occur and a pregnancy will result.

MCG's laboratory doctors also can freeze embryos so that those not returned to the mother at the time of fertilization can be frozen indefinitely and returned later.

MCG also offers gamete intra fallopian transfer (GIFT) in which eggs and sperm are put into the fallopian tubes where fertilization naturally occurs.

The MCG program currently has three ongoing pregnancies, one of which is twins. To date, there have been three live births, one from a frozen embryo.

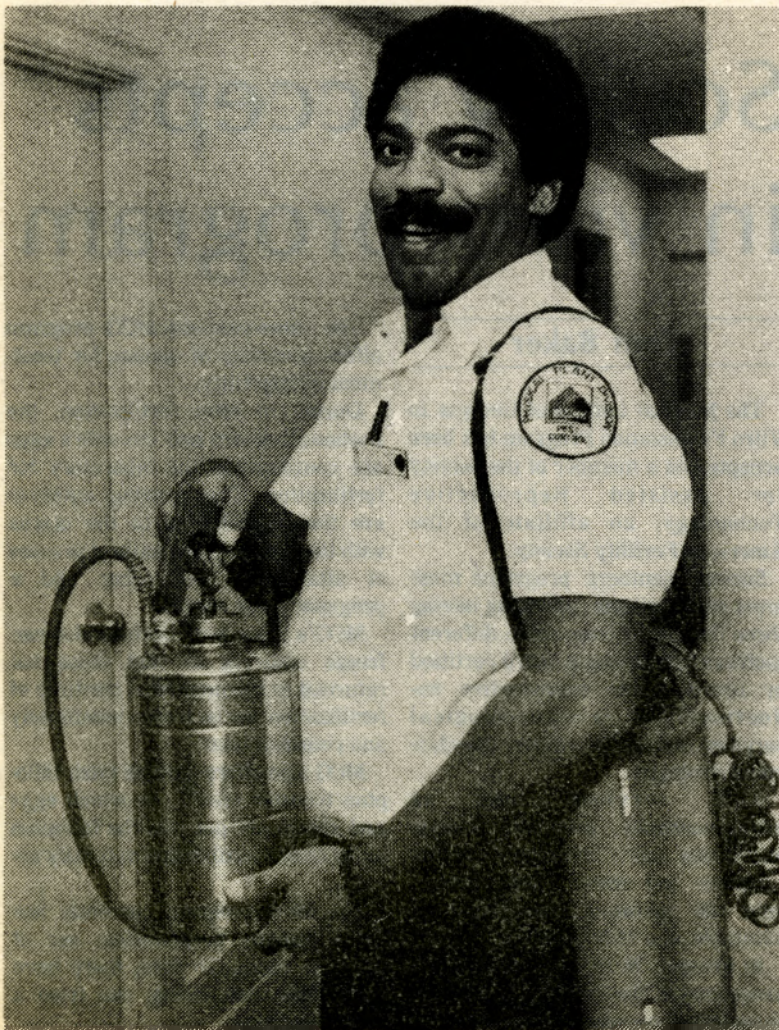

## Pest control specialist at MCG earns license

Joe Leverett, a pest control specialist for the Medical College of Georgia campus, has obtained his pesticide applicator's license from the Georgia Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Leverett, an MCG employee since 1970, was licensed Nov. 24 after nine years of study. He attended Georgia Pest Control Association classes twice a year in either Augusta, Atlanta or Macon and passed a two-part examination to become licensed. One part consisted of general pest control; the other consisted of industrial, institutional, structural and health-related information.

Licensure allows Mr. Leverett to buy pesticides and attest to his knowledge of pest control use, safety and equipment, and ability to identify insects.

## Applications for MCGRI grants should be submitted by Jan. 15

January 15 is the next submission deadline for grant applications to the Medical College of Georgia Research Institute, according to MCGRI executive director Dr. J. Russell Claybrook.

Grants are available in two areas: as interim support for faculty members whose grant applications to major funding agencies have been approved but not funded, and as support for new full-time faculty (employed three years or less at MCG) to establish pilot studies required to develop a grant application to a major funding agency. The eligibility period of three years' employment for new faculty has been extended from two years.

Maximum MCGRI funding is generally \$10,000. Alternate larger budgets and justifications may be submitted for projects with needs greater than \$10,000. The MCGRI Executive Committee will consider

these if the project is recommended for funding by the MCGRI Grants Review Committee.

Later MCGRI grants program deadlines are May 15 and September 15. Applications are available in the Office of Grants and Contracts or by calling ext. 2592.

National Institutes of Health deadlines are February 1 for new grant applications, Research Career Development Awards and Program Project and Center grant applications, and March 1 for Competing Continuation and Supplemental Research Grant applications.

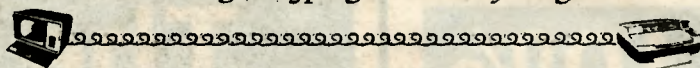

# Teacher carves niche at MCG

## Dr. Flannery paving way for new services

When medical student Ann Marie Flannery first spied the intricate and sometimes little-understood anatomy of the nervous system, it stirred and challenged her.

She had found her calling.

Neurosurgery resident Dr. Flannery then found that she most liked working with the developing nervous system of children.

"I found that the children did better, got better faster. That working with them and their parents suited me well and suited me much better than it suited most other people in neurosurgery," said the affable 33-year-old pediatric neurosurgeon who recently joined the Medical College of Georgia faculty.

Although there is, as yet, no official fellowship for pediatric neurosurgery, a subset of neurosurgeons have limited their practice to pediatric neurosurgery and obtained their own specialized training, such as the two years Dr. Flannery spent at The Children's Memorial Hospital in Chicago.

"Those of us who do pediatric neurosurgery define it as the surgery of the developing nervous system," she said.

"The problems that you see in the pediatric age group are entirely different than the problems that you see in the adult patients, with few exceptions."

A fetus' nervous system can experience problems that result in birth defects. Those types of congenital abnormalities provide much of the work for pediatric neurosurgeons.

"Spina bifida is a complex congenital anomaly which includes not only the exposed spinal cord that people think of, but also hydrocephalus and oftentimes some serious problems with the brain stem," Dr. Flannery said.

"These children require not only the services of the neurosurgeon in order to close their backs and treat the hydrocephalus, but also what we call a multidisciplinary approach to the problems that they have with orthopedic deformities, urologic problems and the services of brace makers and social services," she said.

"It's difficult enough for the family to cope. Life is made even more difficult if the family must go from doctor to doctor to doctor, literally have a doctor's appointment every week."

Dr. Flannery said the multidisciplinary spina bifida clinic will bring the specialists together for

the patients.

This centralized approach to care will permeate the new services she brings to MCG.

MCG had most of the parts: a whole group of pediatric subspecialists such as pediatric neurologists, pediatric hematologists-oncologists, pediatric intensivists, pediatric anesthesiologists and the like.

She is working with a lot of those other subspecialists now, seeing where she fits in with existing clinics and formalizing new clinics and programs for children with nervous system problems.

Dr. Flannery has plans for a new surgical procedure that will require the concerted efforts of many subspecialists before, during and after surgery.

The procedure is called selective dorsal rhizotomy and is available in only a handful of cities in the country.

Cerebral problems that occur in children, particularly premature babies, may result in a rigidity or spasticity, she explained. The spasticity can severely limit the movement and function of these children.

With this procedure, abnormal nerve roots that cause this unnatural stiffness are identified and cut.

The destruction of the abnormal

nerve root results in relaxation of spasticity and allows for greater motor function in these children.

"We can't make them normal, but we can make them more functional," she said. "It's not a panacea, but it does appear to enable these children to do more with the abilities they have."

Dr. Flannery plans to have many or all these new services operational about Jan. 1.

"I came here to start some programs that the hospital and the community needed. It will be step-by-step for each of them."
