Former MCG chief dies

Dr. William H. Moretz, president of the Medical College of Georgia from 1972 to 1982, died Dec. 27 at age 75.

He died at the MCG Hospital, the site of the last 27 years of his career.

Dr. Moretz, a native of Hickory, N.C., attended the North Carolina School of Medicine and Harvard Medical School. He spent his internship and residency in surgery at Strong Memorial Hospital in Rochester, N.Y.

He then served three years in the U.S. Army. He worked briefly in Rochester, then joined the University of Utah College

of Medicine as associate professor of surgery. He joined MCG in 1955 as professor and chairman of the Department of Surgery.

He was named MCG's fourth president in 1972 and embarked on a mission of expanding MCG's student body and physical plant. During his tenure, the number of MCG graduates almost doubled, and more than \$25 million in renovations and new construction were completed. Those additions included the Sydenstricker wing of the MCG Hospital; the Carl T. Sanders Research and Education Building; a radiation therapy center; enlarged

Colleagues say Dr. Moretz was gentleman, did his best

Dr. William H. Moretz's approach to the Medical College of Georgia presidency mirrored all other aspects of his life: he did his best and was always a gentleman in the process.

Such is the prevailing impression of those who knew him and mourned his death in December.

"One thing that can be said without any doubt: he was a man of great integrity," said Dr. Lois T. Ellison, associate vice president for planning (hospital and clinics) at MCG.

Dr. Ellison worked with Dr. Moretz since he joined the MCG faculty as chairman and professor of the MCG Department of Surgery in 1955. She was provost during most of his 1972-82 presidency. "I never knew him to be anything but fair. He

was totally committed to MCG and was highly respected."

That respect was felt throughout the community, but especially on campus, said Dr. Francis J. Tedesco, president of MCG. "He was a strong leader, always very clear in his approach," he said. "There was something in him that the faculty had come to know and love."

Dr. Arlie R. Mansberger Jr., chairman of the Department of Surgery, concurs. "The principal debt owed to Dr. William Moretz by those who knew him best and who worked intimately with him was, without question, philosophical — that of seeing the force of his character on a day-to-day basis."

His peers remember him as honest, hard-working and gracious characteristics he brought with him when

MCG breaks ground on \$37 million project

The weather was cold and rainy Dec. 19, but several Medical College of Georgia officials braved the elements to break ground on a \$37 million expansion of MCG Hospital and Clinics, the first major construction project on the campus in more than 10 years.

A luncheon and an indoor groundbreaking ceremony also were held that day to officially kick off the Ambulatory Care Center/Specialized Care Center project

The structure, which will span from the existing Sydenstricker wing of the hospital and stretch across Harper Street next to the Medical Arts Building, is expected to be occupied in early 1993.

"This is the end of the beginning," said Dr. Francis J. Tedesco, MCG president, during the ground-breaking ceremony. "As we turn this spade of soil, we're really two-thirds of the way down the project time line."

Others participating in the ground breaking were Joseph D. Greene, member and former chairman of the University System of Georgia Board of Regents; Charles A. DeVaney, mayor of Augusta; R. Edward Howell, executive director, MCG Hospital and Clinics; Dr. Charles W. Linder, chief of staff, MCG Hospital and Clinics; and Dr. Lois T. Ellison, associate vice president for planning, MCG Hospital and Clinics.

The "high-touch, high-tech" project will encompass 300,000 square feet and will consolidate MCG's 80 clinics now housed at 16 different sites on campus, Dr. Tedesco said

The structure also will house MCG's growing intensive care services with adja-

cent diagnostic and support services, he said.

Discovering

The project represents progress, Dr. Tedesco said, combining advanced team delivery of care with increased patient satisfaction and cost-effective delivery of

"I appreciate the confidence and support of the Board of Regents, and would like to express my gratitude to the legislature, especially the CSRA delegation, and the Governor for their continued confidence in our future," Dr. Tedesco said.

The project has been in the planning stages for four years, and has been a part of the MCG Hospital and Clinics Facilities Master Plan for about five years.

But instead of asking the state to totally fund the facility, MCG officials came up with a different plan — they asked the University System of Georgia Board of Regents and the state to issue bonds to finance the construction of these facilities.


The funds withheld from MCG by the state to pay the debt incurred by the bond issue are being replaced by revenue internally generated by the MCG Hospital and Clinics

The Ambulatory Care Center, a fivestory structure, will be across Harper Street from the hospital between the MCG Medical Arts Building and the Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center.

The ACC will be connected floor by floor to the Medical Arts Building, which will house faculty offices.

The first floor will contain a lobby, pharmacy, registration area and family practice center. The other four floors will accommodate other departments offering outpatient care.

The Specialized Care Center, to be located east of the existing Sydenstricker wing of the hospital, will have four stories.

The first floor will house an expanded emergency services and trauma center. The blood bank will move to the area now occupied by emergency services in the Sydenstricker wing

The second floor of the SCC will house diagnostic functions, including a clinical laboratory, a blood gas laboratory, a pulmonary function laboratory and new radiologic equipment.

The third floor will contain two 12-bed intensive care units. The fourth floor will contain a 12-bed intensive care unit and the capacity for a fourth unit.

The project should go out for bid later this month, according to Dr. Ellison.

Once the 26-month construction process begins, various changes will occur on the MCG campus. For example, Harper Street will be partially closed for a portion of that

hospital surgical suites; and expansion of the library.

He oversaw organization of the MCG Research Institute, which aids researchers in the search for funding, in 1981.

He stepped down from the presidency in 1982 and was named professor emeritus of surgery by the University System of Georgia Board of Regents in 1984.

Dr. Moretz was former vice chairman of the American Board of Surgery, a fellow of the American College of Surgeons and a member of the Society of University Surgeons and the American Surgical Association. He was a former president of the Southeastern Surgical Society, the Georgia chapter of the American College of Surgeons and the Georgia Surgical Society.

He was honored by the American College of Surgeons for a teaching film he coauthored. He was presented a Distinguished Service award in 1967 by the University of North Carolina Medical Association. The Moretz Surgical Society, established in 1972, was named in his honor to promote the exchange of scientific research and observation by surgeons affiliated with MCG who worked under Dr. Moretz when he was chairman of the department.

Dr. Moretz is survived by his wife. Laura, and their six children and 11 grand-

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

Baylor's Dr. O'Malley to give first Muldoon Lecture Jan. 30

Dr. Bert W. O'Malley, director of the Baylor Center for Reproductive Biology at the Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, will be the guest speaker at the first annual Thomas G. Muldoon Memorial Lectureship Feb. 5.

The lecture will be held at noon in room 108 of the Robert B. Greenblatt, M.D. Library at the Medical College of Georgia. Dr. O'Malley will discuss how hormones exert their biological action in his lecture, "Steroid Receptors and Transcriptional Regulation."

Dr. O'Malley, a summa cum laude graduate of the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine, is a Tom Thompson professor and chairman of the Department of Cell Biology at Baylor. He has received numerous awards for his work in reproductive biology, including the American Endocrine Society's 1975 Ernst Oppenheimer Award, the 1977 Lila Gruber Cancer Award and the 1979 Dickson Prize for Basic Medical Research.


He is past president of the Endocrine

Society and a member of several professional organizations, including the American Society for Biological Chemists, the American Society for Clinical Investigation and the American Institute of

The lectureship was formed in honor of Dr. Thomas G. Muldoon, professor of endocrinology at MCG until his death in 1989. Dr. Muldoon earned a doctorate degree in biochemistry from the University of Louisville School of Medicine and joined the MCG faculty in 1969 as an assistant professor. He was named associate professor in 1974 and full professor in 1978.

As a teacher, Dr. Muldoon specialized in courses on the chemistry of steroid hormones and mechanisms of hormone action. His research encompassed the field of estrogen and androgen steroid hormone action in neuroendocrine, uterine, mammary gland and ventral prostate tissues.

He was past chairman of the Biomedical Endocrinology Study Section of the National Institutes of Health and served on

the Cancer Center Support Review Committee for the National Cancer Institute. He was posthumously honored with the School of Graduate Studies' Outstanding Faculty Award and the School of Medicine Distinguished Faculty for Research

MCG now smokeless; more classes planned

It's official — the Medical College of Georgia is a smoke-free campus.

A policy that went into effect Jan. 1 prohibits any person, whether MCG employee, student, patient or visitor, from smoking in all MCG buildings and

And thus far, everyone seems to be adapting to the new policy, according to Allen E. Slavens, MCG comptroller who also is chairman of the MCG Smoking Policy Implementation Committee.

"It seems to have gone smoothly," he said. "I'm very pleased with the response of the students, faculty, staff and visitors, because we've had noticeably few problem areas."

Under the policy, smoking is permitted outside MCG facilities, but the smoker must not be within 25 feet of any building entrance or exit.

exceptions to the policy also are allowed for students living in residence halls, longterm care patients at Georgia War Veterans Nursing Home and any other MCG patient whose physician prescribes

A special telephone number -721-SMOK - has been established to respond to questions about the policy. People needing additional posters or pamphlets also can phone in their requests on that number, Mr. Slavens said.

Dr. Kanes wins top award at SMA meeting

Dr. George Kanes, senior fellow in pulmonary medicine at the Medical College of Georgia, won first place for the best presentation by a resident or fellow to the chest section of the recent 83rd Annual Scientific Assembly of the Southern Medical Association.

Dr. Kanes' presentation, "Pleural Thickening in Kaolin Workers," explored new information about the effects of kaolin

dust on the pleura, the outer lining of the

Dr. Bashir A. Chaudhary, professor in the MCG Department of Medicine, and Dr. Winford H. Pool, professor in the MCG Department of Radiology, were coinvestigators on the research project.

The doctors studied 350 workers at a kaolin plant in Augusta. They found that mild exposure to kaolin dust can result in changes in the pleura similar to the changes caused by asbestos exposure, Dr. Chaudhary said.

However, kaolin exposure is not associated with cancer as is asbestos exposure, he said. Kaolinosis, a collection of the clay dust in the lungs, is a relatively benign disease and the changes it causes in lung tissue are not indicative of any danger to the workers, Dr. Chaudharv

All 350 workers had chest X-rays and 32 of the workers had some changes in their lungs shown by the X-ray. Twenty patients

were found to have kaolinosis.

Fifteen patients had computerized tomography studies to further evaluate changes in the pleura, the outer lining of the lungs. These studies showed some pleural changes in six patients.

The doctors concluded that pleural changes such as thickening and plaques can be seen in some workers with mild

An abstract on the research also has been published in the Journal of the Southern Medical Association.

Grants are available for: interim support for faculty members whose grant application to major funding agencies have been approved but not funded; and support for new full-time MCG faculty (three or less years) to establish pilot studies required for the development of a grant application to a major funding agency.

Investigators who do not meet these criteria may request a waiver by memorandum to Dr. J. Russell Claybrook, executive director of MCGRI, at least two months prior to the submission date.

Maximum funding normally is \$10,000. For projects with needs greater than \$10,000, alternate larger budgets and justifications can be submitted, which the MCGRI Executive Committee will consider if the project is recommended for funding by the MCGRI Grants Review Committee.

For projects not corresponding to the two categories, a request for authorization to apply may be directed to Dr. Claybrook.

The requests should be submitted eight

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weeks prior grant submission deadlines in order to be considered by the MCGRI Executive Committee.

The executive committee meets regularly on the second Tuesday of each month.

The primary factor in this decision is the evidence of a realistic opportunity for specific, significant extramural support, which the MCGRI grant would facilitate.

he joined the MCG faculty. "He was a surgeon and taught surgery to be sure, but mostly he taught character by precept and example," Dr. Mansberger said.

He distinguished himself among the faculty almost immediately. "One of his major contributions was organizing the department of surgery, and he did a superb job of that," Dr. Ellison said. "He brought in a group of outstanding surgeons."

He recruited faculty to head sections including cardio-thoracic surgery, neurosurgery, ophthalmology, orthopedics and urology. Residency training programs were bolstered so well-qualified surgeons could be trained to practice in the area.

He also emphasized research, to which he and the faculty devoted themselves each summer. He did early work on arterial grafts and the biological activity of vessel walls. He developed the Moretz Clip, a device to prevent fatal pulmonary emboli, and sought a manufacturing company which shared his philosophy in producing it inexpensively.

He also established a non-invasive laboratory to pursue inexpensive, painless methods of diagnosing and assessing the treatment of vascular disease.

His hard work continued after being named president. During his 10-year


tenure, he almost doubled the number of MCG graduates and oversaw tremendous growth of the physical plant.

"He was an open president with good relations with the faculty and community," Dr. Tedesco said. "He had a lot of attributes that could be emulated by faculty and administrators." Dr. Tedesco benefited from those attributes after being named MCG's sixth president. "He was able to offer a historical perspective that I found invaluable."

Dr. Moretz stepped down from the presidency in 1982 but maintained his loyalty to MCG. He also continued to apply his unique personality to all other aspects of his life.

"Dr. Moretz is an avid tennis player and those that know him are amazed at his tenacity even when he knees are a constant source of pain," Dr. Charles Wray, professor of surgery, wrote shortly after Dr. Moretz's retirement. "While always a gentleman, he takes the sport seriously and plays to win."

His legacy of hard work mixed with graciousness will not be forgotten, his friends say. "MCG not only lost a great leader but a close and loyal friend," Dr. Tedesco said. "Only as time goes on will the enormity of his loss really be realized. He was a contributor."



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

The total collected was \$131,485,29. 106.9 percent of the MCG campaign
