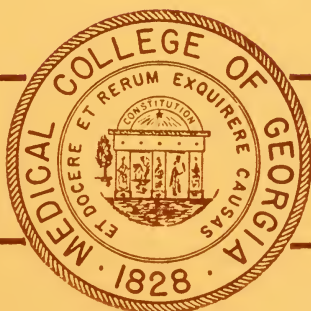

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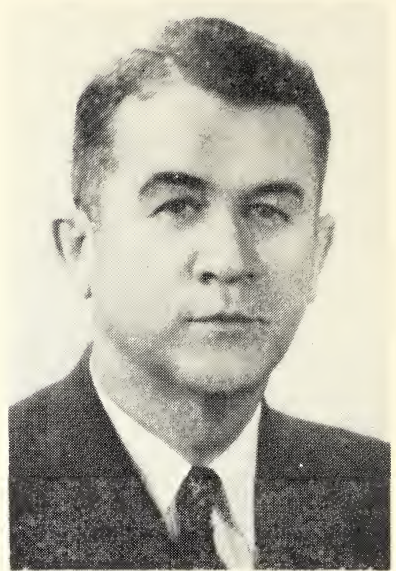

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TO THE ALUMNI

PARADE OF PROGRESS

THE DEPARTMENT OF GROSS ANATOMY

As is true with other departments in the Medical College, the Department of Gross Anatomy has also experienced many changes during these past four years of expansion. New teaching quarters located on the second floor of the new Administration Building provide more space than was available in the Newton Building and accommodate the increased student body. One large laboratory is now used for dissection, offering excellent facilities for good work. Adjacent to the laboratory is a combination student lounge and museum. Although much new equipment has been obtained, the old but sturdy and reliable slate tables remain as a link with the past. The tables which have served as a resting place for many cadavera, have been familiar to graduates for almost half a century. They are as serviceable as ever.

As you have probably noted from previous reports, the curriculum of the first and second years has undergone many changes. The course in Gross Anatomy is given during the first half of the freshman year, beginning in September and concluding in February. Students are in the laboratory five mornings a week and two hours on Saturday. The course runs concurrently with Microscopic Anatomy thus affording the student greater opportunity for correlation of these two divisions of Anatomical Science. The anatomy course formerly presented in the Sophomore year which consisted of cross section, topographic, and radiological anatomy has been deleted from the curriculum. Today the

more significant and beneficial portions are incorporated into the single first year course.

The principal teaching of Gross Anatomy is centered upon dissection. It is in this undertaking that the student is first exposed to scientific investigation. Here he begins to learn for himself discipline and technique. Above all he is afforded the opportunity to develop his own capacities. The course is taught on a regional basis and is divided into five sections: the upper extremity, the head and neck, the thorax, the abdomen and pelvis, and the lower extremity. At the end of each section the student receives an oral examination covering this dissection. This method of examination is unique, and the Medical College is one of the few schools employing this testing device—a method which permits maximum demonstration of knowledge by the student. Throughout the course a certain amount of clinical correlation is presented to emphasize the important and significant relationships of anatomical science to clinical medicine. This is probably best evidenced in co-operation with the Department of Radiology. View boxes are present in the smoking lounge where the student may at his leisure observe many different x-rays of the particular section that is being dissected at that time. In addition, with each section, a member of the Radiology staff presents and discusses certain anatomical principles pertinent to the radiological examination of that particular region of the body.

Dr. Lane H. Allen heads the

Department, having joined the faculty in 1935. He has served as chairman since 1945. Other members of the teaching staff are Dr. Harry E. Raybuck, who joined the faculty in 1953, and Dr. Tim Weatherford, who came to the Department in 1956. The staff is augmented by Dr. Emil Hummel and Dr. D. R. McRae who serve as visiting members.

Many former staff members familiar to countless alumni have become well known in the fields of Anatomy and Medical Education. Among them are Eliot Clark, Professor Emeritus of anatomy, University of Pennsylvania; Fred Mettler, Professor of Anatomy Columbia University; Charles Noback, Associate Professor of Anatomy, Columbia University; the late E. M. Bradley, Professor of Anatomy, Southwestern University; William F.

Alexander, Associate Professor of Anatomy, St. Louis University; and Warren Andrews, Professor of Anatomy at Bowman Gray Medical School. Of course no listing would be complete without mentioning the name of G. Lombard Kelly, who served the Medical College so devotedly and competently in his dual capacity of Professor of Gross Anatomy and Dean—later as the College's President.

Research interests in the Department are wide and varied. Dr. Allen is carrying on a research program concerned with the morphological and functional properties of the lymphatic system. Dr. Raybuck's major interest is the autonomic nervous system, particularly certain aspects of experimental embryology concerned with the development of the nervous system. Dr.

Weatherford's endeavors also are in the field of the nervous system. His investigations are specifically concerned with histo-chemical studies of the effects of vitamin deficiencies on the nervous system.

Continued expansion of both teaching and research facilities constitute the major aspiration of the staff for the future. Increasing

demands of post graduate medical education also are anticipated.

We should like to conclude this brief report of our activities with a welcome to the graduates and other physicians interested in medical education to visit the department at any time.

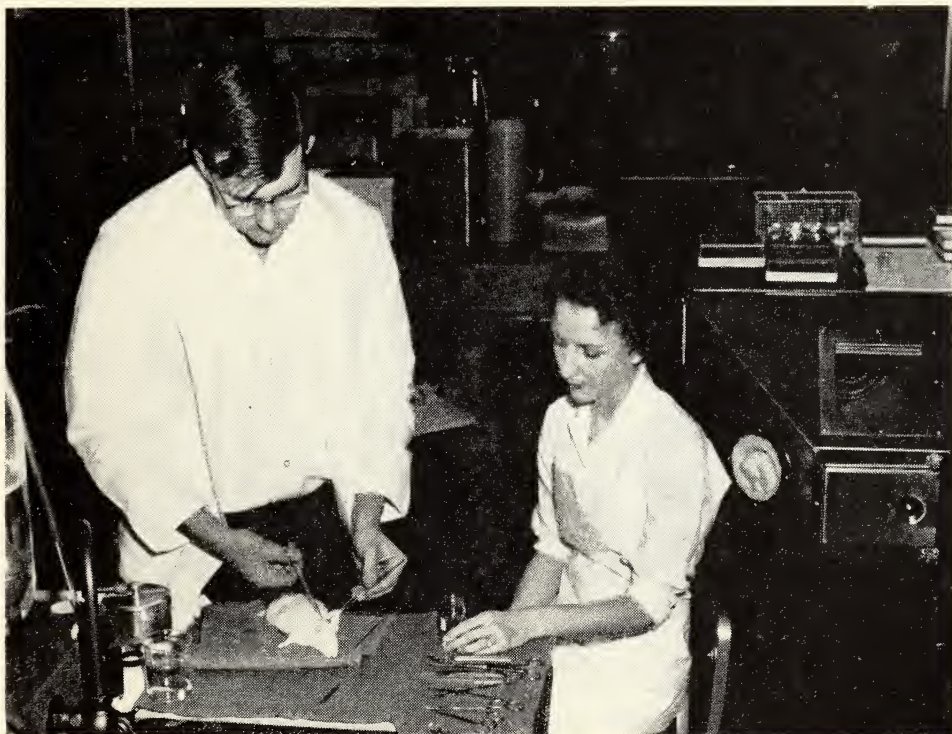


Figure 1—Mr. Kuglar, Student Fellow, and Mrs. League, Technician, examine an animal that has received a tumor transplant. This laboratory is in the surgical pathology area of the Eugene Talmadge Memorial Hospital.

DEPARTMENT OF PATHOLOGY

Recently a group of plaster models of human disease was placed again on display in a new wing of the Murphey Building. These models, still excellent depictions of disease, were brought over from France in 1834 by Dr. L. A. Dugas. This union of the old with the new serves to mark a period of much progress in the Department of Pathology. Major

changes in the department have paralleled the remarkable growth and expansion of the college in recent years. Laboratory, research, and teaching facilities have been greatly expanded. The faculty also has increased so that there are now seven full-time and six visiting faculty members in the department.

In 1953, Dr. Pund relinquished

the chairmanship of the department in order to assume his new duties as President of the College. In 1954, Dr. L. D. Stoddard, then at the University of Kansas Medical School, accepted the appointment as Professor and Chairman of the department. The Eugene Talmadge Memorial Hospital had already begun to rise and shortly after the arrival of Dr. Stoddard, new construction was started on the Murphey Building. In the same year, Dr. A. B. Chandler and Dr. F. R. Skelton became full-time members. The following year, Dr. A. W. Bailey, who had been on leave of absence in the Navy, and Dr. W. G. Rice were added to the staff. The division of clinical pathology, which had been part of the Department of Medicine, became incorporated in the Department of Pathology. Dr. W. L. Sheppard has remained in charge of the clinical laboratories.

The pathologists in the immediate area of Augusta are also associated with the school. Drs. C. P. Avato, E. V. Hastings, M. Ihnen, D. F. Mullins, Jr., W. R. Murphy, and F. G. Stephens are all visiting faculty members in the departments. These men give generously of their time in the teaching program.

In the Murphey Building several alterations and additions have been made. In addition to more office space and a new conference room, there is a newly equipped histological laboratory, an animal surgery room, quarters for animals, a specialized laboratory for histochemical work, and a chemical laboratory. The formerly large teaching laboratory has been converted into six smaller laboratories in order to facilitate small group teaching. These laboratories are used dur-

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ing the summer months by students for research projects.

The clinical laboratory, surgical pathology laboratory, and autopsy area are located in the Eugene Talmadge Memorial Hospital. The clinical laboratories have excellent facilities including such modern labor saving devices as an electronic cell counter. Recently, Dr. W. D. Boring of the Department of Microbiology has received a joint appointment in the Department of Pathology. Dr. Boring is currently supervising the microbiological work in the clinical laboratory. In the surgical pathology area a Tumor Registry is being started and it is anticipated that important information will be obtained with the cooperation of physicians throughout the state. In the autopsy area there are three autopsy tables and an adjoining morgue. An important addition to the staff has been a staff embalmer, Mr. H. M. Conner. Mr. Conner assists in the performance of autopsies, and is curator of the museum. Since embalming is done on every autopsied body, a more thorough and complete study can be made of every case.

Following the precedent established in this country by Drs. Welch and MacCallum at Johns Hopkins, the case method of teaching has been inaugurated in the second-year course of General Pathology and Human Disease. Dr. Stoddard, who is responsible for this program, received his training with a Hopkins graduate, Dr. W. D. Forbus of Duke University Medical School. In order to study disease as it naturally occurs the case method is ideal. Some 200 cases are arranged into broad categories of disease. With each case there is available to the student a copy of

the protocol including the clinical history and anatomical descriptions, the important gross organs which have been dissected, and a group of selected histological slides. These cases are thus practical examples of disease that the student will encounter later on. The laboratory teaching is done in groups of 16 - 18 students in the six teaching laboratories. Some of the periods are designed for individual study by the student, and on these days isolated gross specimens and histological slides are available. Recently the clinical laboratory exercises have been incorporated in this course. During the year several sessions are devoted to performing basic clinical laboratory tests. The class is further divided into groups of four in order that the students may participate in the current autopsies. The groups are on call in rotation just as the house officers. Some of these cases are presented by the groups to their classmates in the form of clinico - pathological conferences. During the past few summers, several students have worked in the department as student fellows either on a research project or on the autopsy service. This is considered one of the most important phases of our educational program.

The residency program offers opportunity for development of academic careers and preparation for the practice of pathology. Instead of the minimal four years as required by the boards, the department offers a six year residency program. Some of the residents have been conducting investigations and have received support from various agencies. Dr. W. A. Sherrer, while a fellow of the Damon Runyon Foundation, investigated experimental

hepatic tumors in the rat with the use of radioisotopes. Dr. R. B. Skelton and Dr. J. F. Brooks have recently conducted an experiment on the combined effects of ACTH and nitrogen mustard on the adrenal glands of the rat. With an expanded and lengthened residency program it is anticipated that every resident will be able to carry on investigative work.

Several members of the department are engaged in research covering a wide field. Dr. Stoddard with Dr. Chick, a third-year resident, and Mr. H. C. Sussman, a student fellow, have conducted investigations of experimental hypoxic and hemoglobinuric nephrosis in the rabbit. The experimental lesion that has been produced appears more consistently and more nearly resembles the human lesion than any other known experimental lesion. Dr. Rice has a substantial research program primarily directed toward the immunologic specificity of human neoplasms. Such techniques as electrophoresis, tumor transplantation in animals, and fluorescein labeling of antibodies are being utilized. Other experimental work on disturbances of growth is being done by Dr. Bailey. He has initiated a study concerning conditioned and autonomous neoplasms of the thyroid gland produced by the administration of antithyroid drugs in rats.

Recently Dr. Chandler has devised a technique for producing a thrombus *in vitro*. This technique utilizes a moving circular tube to produce a thrombus as it occurs *in vivo*. In association with Dr. Sherrer, an experiment has been carried out on extramedullary hematopoiesis by the use of tissue transplantation. In collaboration

with Mr. Conner, methods have been devised for vascular injection studies that also permit histological study of organs. Dr. H. J. Peters, who had part of his residency training in this department, became a full-time member of the faculty in July of 1957. He is especially interested in the field of neuropathology and is currently carrying out investigations of myelinization and senile pigmentary changes of the brain. Before moving to New Orleans in 1956 to become Director of the Urban Maes Research Foundation, Dr. Floyd Skelton developed a technique for producing endogenous endocrine hypertension in the rat. Two student fellows, Dr. James Guillebeau and Mr. Joseph Nichols, participated in this work which has received national recognition.

Reference was made earlier in this article to Dr. L. A. Dugas, the first Professor of Pathology and Physiology in this school. In the span of Dr. Dugas' career, pathology evolved from a science based largely on gross anatomical descriptions to a discipline much as we know it today. Virchow revolutionized medical science with his concept of cellular pathology. Cohnheim and his colleagues made significant contributions in the field of experimental pathology while Koch, Welch, and many others initiated the era of microbiological pathology. Dr. Dugas would identify these influences were he to visit the college today and he would undoubtedly recognize that the goal remains: The better understanding of human disease.

New Facilities:

1) Equipment has been installed in the orthopedic room within the operating suite which permits bi-plane films during such procedures as hip-nailing.

2) Angiocardiographic equipment is now being installed which will permit obtaining as high as 12 films in 1 second in each of two planes. Allied equipment for this work will also permit X-ray exposures at 1/1000 of a second.

3) There has been a gradual increase in the type of isotope equipment. This is permitting an expansion in the scope of work.

4) The Van de Graff therapy unit which operates in the range of 2 MEV is being effectively used and permits greater efficiency in some areas of radiation therapy.

5) Radiology will shortly have available an image intensifier. This unit increases the brilliance of the fluoroscopic screen approximately 300 times. This permits

motion picture photography of the images on the fluoroscopic screen.

Course Changes: An elective in Radiology is available for either 3rd or 4th year medical students. This is of 4 weeks duration. Briefly it introduces the students to some problems in technique, variational anatomy, fluoroscopy, film interpretation and radiotherapy and radioisotopes.

Added to the course in Roentgen Anatomy is a group of translights which are reproductions of X-ray films. These translights are placed in specially provided view boxes in the student day room and the type of material presented parallels the area of gross dissection.
