
EDITORIAL

MR. GREENE

MCG APPOINTS REGISTRAR

THE MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA HAS APPOINTED GEORGE ROBERT GREENE AS REGISTRAR, EFFECTIVE MAY 14, 1963.

AS REGISTRAR, MR. GREENE WILL PROCESS APPLICATIONS TO THE SCHOOLS OF MEDICINE AND NURSING, AND WILL SERVE AS CUSTODIAN OF STUDENT RECORDS. HE ALSO WILL PARTICIPATE IN STUDIES CONCERNING ADMISSIONS TO THE COLLEGE'S PARAMEDICAL PROGRAMS IN GRADUATE STUDIES, MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY, MEDICAL ILLUSTRATION, AND MEDICAL RECORDS LIBRARY SCIENCE.

MR. GREENE IS A GRADUATE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA WHERE IN 1958, HE RECEIVED THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION. IN 1961, HE WAS AWARDED THE DEGREE OF MASTER OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION WITH MAJOR WORK IN GENERAL BUSINESS AND A MINOR OF PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT. HE IS A FORMER COMER RESEARCH ASSISTANT IN THE GEORGIA TOURISM AND SOUTHEASTERN RIVER BASINS STUDIES FOR THE BUREAU OF BUSINESS RESEARCH OF THE UNIVERSITY DURING 1961–62.

HE IS A VETERAN OF THREE YEARS' SERVICE IN THE AIR FORCE WHERE HE SERVED AS ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER, REGISTRAR AND BUSINESS OFFICER OF AN AIR FORCE HOSPITAL, TURNER AFB, ALBANY, GEORGIA.

MR. GREENE IS THE SON OF DR. AND MRS. JAMES EDWARD GREENE, SR. OF ATHENS. DR. GREENE IS CHAIRMAN OF GRAD—UATE STUDIES IN THE COLLEGE OF EDUCATION AT THE UNIVER—SITY OF GEORGIA.

DR. MAHESH WINS RUBIN AWARD

DR. VIRENDRA B. MAHESH, ASSISTANT RESEARCH PROFESSOR OF ENDOCRINOLOGY AT THE MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA, HAS BEEN PRESENTED THE RUBIN AWARD. THE AWARD, PRESENTED ANNUALLY BY THE AMERICAN SOCIETY FOR THE STUDY OF STERILITY, WAS CONFERRED AT THE SOCIETY'S ANNUAL MEETING IN NEW YORK, APRIL 19–21.

DR. MAHESH'S MAJOR INTERESTS HAVE BEEN IN THE BROAD AREAS OF MECHANISM OF HORMONE AND BIOSYNTHESIS, AND SECRETION AND METABOLISM OF STEROID HORMONES IN VIVO AND IN VITRO IN NORMAL SUBJECTS AS WELL AS PATIENTS WITH ENDOCRINE ABNORMALITIES. HIS WORK HAS BEEN SUPPORTED BY A GRANT AWARDED BY THE NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH IN JUNE, 1960; AND NUMEROUS PAPERS CONCERNING HIS RESEARCH HAVE BEEN PUBLISHED IN THE PAST THREE YEARS.

THE FOLLOWING REPORT, WRITTEN BY DR. MAHESH, BRIEF-LY SUMMARIZES HIS FINDINGS AS OF APRIL, 1962, DISCUSSING THEIR SCIENTIFIC SIGNIFICANCE IN THE LIGHT OF THE PRESENT DAY CONCEPT OF THE POLYCYSTIC OVARY SYNDROME.

SECRETION OF ANDROGENS BY THE POLYCYSTIC OVARY AND ITS SIGNIFICANCE

EXTENSIVE CLINICAL AND BIOCHEMICAL RESEARCH HAS BEEN CARRIED OUT DURING THE LAST 3 DECADES IN AN ATTEMPT TO DETERMINE THE SOURCE OF ANDROGENS THAT CAUSE HIRSUTISM IN PATIENTS WITH THE POLYCYSTIC OVARY SYNDROME. THE MOST COMMON APPROACH TO THE PROBLEM HAS BEEN TO STUDY THE IN VITRO BIOSYNTHESIS OF STEROIDS IN THE POLYCYSTIC OVARY BY INCUBATION WITH VARIOUS STEROID PRECURSORS. ALTHOUGH SUCH STUDIES HAVE PROVIDED VALUABLE INFORMATION REGARDING VARIOUS ENZYMATIC ACTIVITIES PRESENT IN THE OVARY, IT IS VERY DIFFICULT TO PROJECT THESE RESULTS TO WHAT TAKES PLACE UNDER PHYSIOLOGICAL ENVIRONMENTS BECAUSE OF A NUMBER OF VARIABLES.

INATTEMPTS TO COMPARE STEROID SYNTHESIS IN THE POLY-CYSTIC OVARY TO THAT IN THE NORMAL OVARY UNDER PHYSIOLOG-ICAL CONDITIONS, A COMPREHENSIVE STUDY WAS CARRIED OUT. THIS INVESTIGATION COMPRISED (A) THE DETERMINATION OF VARIOUS URINARY STEROIDS BEFORE AND AFTER ADRENAL SUPPRESSION AND OVARIAN STIMULATION, (B) ESTIMATION OF STEROID CONTENT OF THE OVARY AND OVARIAN VENOUS BLOOD, AND (C) IN VITRO INCUBATION OF VARIOUS STEROID PRECURSORS WITH OVARIAN BLICES.

THE STUDY OF THE STEROID CONTENT OF THE OVARY RE-VEALED TWO TYPES OF POLYCYSTIC OVARIES. ONE OF THESE TYPES CONTAINED LARGE QUANTITIES OF ANDROSTENEDIONE WHILE THE OTHER CONTAINED DEHYDROEPIANDROSTERONE, BOTH OF THESE COMPOUNDS ARE ANDROGENS. HOWEVER, WITH THE PRESENT STAGE OF KNOWLEDGE ON THE SUBJECT IT WAS NOT POS-SIBLE TO DISTINGUISH THESE TWO TYPES FROM EACH OTHER EITHER CLINICALLY OR BY HISTOLOGIC TECHNIQUES. THE LEVELS OF URINARY DEHYDROEPIANDROSTERONE, ANDROSTERONE, AND ETI-CHOLANOLONE WHICH ARE GENERALLY TAKEN AS AN INDEX FOR AN-DROGEN SECRETION, REMAIN ELEVATED IN PATIENTS WITH THE POLYCYSTIC OVARY SYNDROME EVEN AFTER ADRENAL SUPPRESSION. THIS IS IN CONTRAST TO A MARKED DEPRESSION NOTED IN THE LEVELS OF THESE URINARY STEROIDS IN NORMAL FEMALES FOL-LOWING SUCH TREATMENT. FURTHERMORE, WHEN THE OVARIES WERE STIMULATED WITH EXOGENOUS HUMAN PITUITARY FOLLICLE STIMULATING HORMONE (HP-FSH) WHILE THE ADRENALS WERE KEPT SUPPRESSED WITH DEXAMETHASONE, THERE WAS A MARKED RISE IN THE ABOVE MENTIONED STEROIDS IN THE URINE OF PA-TIENTS WITH THE STEIN-LEVENTHAL SYNDROME, WHEREAS IN NORMAL SUBJECTS THERE WAS ONLY A VERY SMALL INCREASE. THE ABOVE OBSERVATIONS INDICATE THE SECRETION OF LARGE AMOUNTS OF ANDROGENS BY THE POLYCYSTIC OVARY.

DEHYDROEPIANDROSTERONE OR ANDROSTENEDIONE WAS DETECTED IN THE OVARIAN VENOUS BLOOD OF PATIENTS WITH THE STEIN-LEVENTHAL SYNDROME. THE FORMER STEROID WAS PRESENT IN VENOUS BLOOD FROM OVARIES THAT CONTAINED DEHYDRO-EPIANDROSTERONE WHILE THE LATTER WAS OBTAINED FROM THE VENOUS BLOOD OF OVARIES CONTAINING ANDROSTENEDIONE. SMALL AMOUNTS OF ANDROGENS WERE DETECTABLE IN NORMAL OVARIAN VENOUS BLOOD ONLY AFTER STIMULATION WITH HUMAN PITUITARY

FSH. THIS OBSERVATION FURTHER CONFIRMS OVARIAN SECRETION OF ANDROGENS IN THE POLYCYSTIC OVARY SYNDROME.

TWO TYPES OF OVARIAN ENZYMATIC ABNORMALITIES WERE INDICATED BY IN VITRO INCUBATION OF OVARIAN SLICES WITH RADIOACTIVE ANDROSTENEDIONE AND DEHYDROEPIANDROSTERONE. THEY ARE (A) FAILURE OF CONVERSION OF ANDROSTENEDIONE INTO ESTROGENS WHICH IS THE NORMAL OVARIAN PATHWAY FOR ESTROGEN SYNTHESIS, AND (B) FAILURE OF THE 3β -OL-DEHYDROGENASE RESULTING IN THE PRODUCTION OF DEHYDROEPIANDROSTERONE INSTEAD OF ESTROGENS.

THESE ENZYME A BNORMALITIES ACTUALLY EXIST UNDER PHYSIOLOGICAL CONDITIONS. THIS WAS SHOWN BY THE VERY LOW ESTROGEN-ANDROGEN RATIO IN THE OVARIAN VENOUS BLOOD OF PATIENTS WITH POLYCYSTIC OVARIES AS COMPARED TO THAT IN NORMAL SUBJECTS. THIS DIFFERENCE WAS ALSO DEMONSTRATED IN A NORMAL SUBJECT AND A PATIENT WITH POLYCYSTIC OVARY SYNDROME AFTER STIMULATION OF THE OVARIES WITH HUMAN PITUITARY FSH. IT WAS FELT, HOWEVER, THAT THE LARGE NUMBER OF OVARIAN FOLLICLES CONTRIBUTING TO ESTROGEN SYNTHESIS IN PATIENTS WITH THE POLYCYSTIC OVARY SYNDROME, THE PRESENCE OF HIGH SUBSTRATE CONCENTRATIONS (ANDROGENS) WITHIN THE FOLLICLES THEMSELVES, AND THE TRANSFORMATION OF ANDROGEN TO ESTROGENS BY EXTRA OVARIAN TISSUES SUCH AS THE LIVER, MAY EXPLAIN THE NORMAL EXCRETION OF ESTROGENS IN THE URINE OF SUCH PATIENTS.

THE QUESTION HAS BEEN RAISED REPEATEDLY WHETHER THE SECRETION OF WEAK ANDROGENS SUCH AS ANDROSTENEDIONE .AND DEHYDROEPIANDROSTERONE CAN ACCOUNT FOR THE HIRSUTISM IN IN THE POLYCYSTIC OVARY SYNDROME. THE DEMONSTRATION OF THE IN VIVO CONVERSION OF ANDROSTENEDIONE AND DEHYDROEPI—ANDROSTERONE TO TESTOSTERONE, THE MALE TESTICULAR HORMONE, IN NORMAL WOMAN MADE IT VERY TEMPTING TO POSTULATE THAT THE ANDROGENIC ACTIVITY OF THESE WEAK ANDROGENS WAS MEDIATED BY THEIR CONVERSION TO TESTOSTERONE.

BRUMBAUGH, WELL KNOWN FOR HIS CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA, WAS DIRECTOR OF THE 1956-1957 SELF-STUDY GROUP OF THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA.

WILLIAM T. FREEMAN, '17, WHO HAD PRACTICED MEDICINE IN ASHEVILLE, N. C. SINCE 1926, PASSED AWAY IN ASHEVILLE IN MARCH. FUNERAL SERVICES WERE HELD AT THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH THERE ON MARCH 22. DR. FREEMAN SPECIALIZED IN PEDIATRICS AND HAD BEEN ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR OF PEDIATRICS AT EMORY UNIVERSITY FROM 1922 TO 1925. HE WAS 72 YEARS OF AGE AT THE TIME OF HIS DEATH.

MALCOLM MOSTELLER, '27, OF COLUMBIA, S. C., DIED JANUARY 9, 1963. DR. MOSTELLER TRAINED IN RADIOLOGY WITH THE LATE DR. PALMER HOLMES, HERE, AND THEN SERVED AS RADIOLOGIST AT THE COLUMBIA HOSPITAL, COLUMBIA, S. C. UNTIL 1949. IN 1936-37, DR. MOSTELLER TOOK SPECIAL TRAINING IN RADIOLOGY AT JOHNS HOPKINS HOSPITAL. IN 1941, HE WENT INTO PRIVATE PRACTICE AND WAS A CONSULTANT WITH THE VETERANS ADMINISTRATION. HE WAS A MEMBER OF THE RADIOLOGICAL SOCIETY OF NORTH AMERICA AND OF THE AMERICAN COLLEGE OF RADIOLOGY. HE WAS A CHARTER MEMBER OF THE S. C. RADIOLOGICAL SOCIETY AND SERVED AS PRESIDENT OF THAT SOCIETY IN 1940 AND 1953.

HAROLD E. MILLER, '29, CHIEF OF STAFF OF THE LIBERTY MEMORIAL HOSPITAL, HINESVILLE, GA., DIED APRIL 21, 1963 FOLLOWING A LONG ILLNESS. HE HAD BEEN PRACTICING IN HINESVILLE SINCE HIS DISCHARGE FROM THE SERVICE FOLLOWING WORLD WAR II. HE WAS 60 YEARS OF AGE.

LEAPHART WAS 54 YEARS OF AGE.

THE DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHIATRY IS PLANNING A SERIES OF WEEKLY SEMINARS FOR 12 SESSIONS IN PSYCHOSOMATIC MEDICINE.

IN ADDITION TO THESE SHORT COURSES, THE DEPARTMENT OF CONTINUING EDUCATION PROVIDES INDIVIDUAL SPEAKERS OR TEAMS OF THE FACULTY TO VARIOUS MEDICAL GROUPS IN THE STATE. A NEWLY ESTABLISHED SPEAKERS BUREAU HAS BEEN CREATED TO ACT AS A LIAISON BETWEEN MEDICAL SOCIETIES AND GROUPS, AND THE MEDICAL COLLEGE FACULTY.

MECHANICAL WORKSHOP AIDS MCG MEDICAL RESEARCH GEOFFREY E. KING, M.D.

TODAY, VERY LITTLE RESEARCH IS BEING DONE BY MAKING RECORDS ON A SMOKED DRUM WITH A SIMPLE LEVER ATTACHED TO A PREPARATION WITH THREAD AND MODELLING CLAY. SOME MAY REGRET THE PASSING OF THE DAYS WHEN SIMPLE APPARATUS, A LITTLE DEXTERITY AND SOME INGENUITY, TOGETHER WITH A PROBING MIND, WERE THE BASIC TOOLS FOR RESEARCH.

WITH MORE REFINED TECHNIQUES FOR INVESTIGATING LIVING PROCESSES, APPARATUS HAS BECOME MORE AND MORE COMPLEX, AND THE LONE RESEARCHER CAN NOW RARELY RELY SOLELY ON HIS OWN RESOURCES TO COMPLETE A PROJECT. ONE ASPECT OF THIS PROBLEM, THE NEED FOR SPECIALIZED SKILLS IN BUILDING AND MAINTAINING RESEARCH INSTRUMENTS, HAS BEEN OVERCOME AT THE MEDICAL COLLEGE WITH THE PROVISION OF A MECHANICAL WORKSHOP STAFFED BY A SKILLED MACHINIST.

ALTHOUGH THE PERSONNEL IN THE BASIC SICENCES OF THE MEDICAL COLLEGE HAVE HAD ACCESS TO WORKSHOP FACILITIES FOR MANY YEARS, THE VAST EXPANSION OF CLINICAL RESEARCH GAVE RISE TO AN URGENT NEED FOR A MECHANICAL CENTER IN WHICH NEW RESEARCH EQUIPMENT COULD BE FABRICATED FOR THE CLINICAL DEPARTMENTS, AND WHICH WOULD AUGMENT THE FACILITIES AVAILABLE TO THE BASIC SCIENCE DEPARTMENTS.

LAST YEAR, A FAIRLY EXTENSIVE WORKSHOP WAS SET UP IN THE BASEMENT OF THE TALMADGE HOSPITAL RESEARCH ANNEX. FROM LIMITED AVAILABLE FUNDS, BASIC EQUIPMENT CONSISTING OF A LATHE, DRILL PRESS, AND GRINDER WERE PURCHASED. IN JANUARY, 1962, MR. THOMAS LAMB WAS ENGAGED AS A MACHINIST TO OPERATE THE SHOP. MR. LAMB SERVED HIS APPRENTICE—SHIP IN A RAILROAD MAINTENANCE SHOP, AND SINCE THEN HAS HAD WIDE EXPERIENCE IN MECHANICAL WORK. HE IS AN INVETERATE TINKERER IN HIS WELL-EQUIPPED HOME WORKSHOP.

UNDER HIS SUPERVISION, A CAREFUL SELECTION OF MEASUR-

ING EQUIPMENT AND HAND TOOLS, AS WELL AS AN EXTENSIVE STOCK OF RAW MATERIALS RANGING FROM MINUTE STAINLESS STEEL SCREWS TO PLASTIC SHEETS, HAS BEEN ACQUIRED. MACHINERY FOR SHEET METAL WORK, A POLISHING MACHINE, A HIGH PRECISION METAL LATHE, AND A MILLING MACHINE HAVE BEEN ADDED MORE RECENTLY, SOME OF THIS EQUIPMENT HAVING BEEN ACQUIRED AS GOVERNMENT SURPLUS AT A FRACTION OF ITS TRUE COST.

TO LAUNCH A PROJECT IN THE RESEARCH MACHINE SHOP, THE RESEARCHER MUST COMPLETE A WORK REQUISITION, AND AN ESTIMATE OF THE COST OF THE PROJECT MUST BE CLEARED WITH BUDGET OFFICIALS BEFORE THE PROJECT CAN BE CONSIDERED.

THE VERSATILITY OF MR. LAMB IS GIVEN FULL PLAY IN THE TRANSLATION OF AN IDEA ON THE PART OF THE RESEARCH WORKER INTO USABLE APPARATUS MADE OF PLASTIC OR METAL. A PROJECT MAY BEGIN AS A SIMPLE STATEMENT OF A NEED FOR AN APPARATUS TO ACHIEVE A PARTICULAR END, OR MAY BEGIN AS A WORKING DRAWING WITH DETAILED DIMENSIONS. CONSULTATION WITH MR. LAMB MUST OCCUR AT EACH STAGE OF THE CREATION OF A NEW PIECE OF EQUIPMENT. AT FIRST, THE IDEA MUST BE CONCEIVED AS A WORKING ARRANGEMENT, AND SNAGS IN THE TENTATIVE DESIGN ON THE PART OF THE RESEARCHER MUST BE IRONED

OUT. THE FEASIBILITY OF ITS MANUFACTURE WITH EXISTING MACHINE FACILITIES AND AVAILABLE RAW MATERIALS HAS TO BE CONSIDERED, AND NUMEROUS OTHER DETAILS SUCH AS THE POSSIBILITY OF CHEMICAL REACTION WITH REAGENTS, FINISH ON THE APPARATUS, AND SO ON, MUST BE THOUGHT OF BEFORE WORK CAN BEGIN.

AS THE IDEA TAKES SHAPE IN REALITY, THE ULTIMATE DESIGN BECOMES CLEARER AND IT MAY BE POSSIBLE TO USE SIMPLER MACHINE OPERATIONS OR EMPLOY ALTERNATIVE MATERIALS. ON THE OTHER HAND, THERE MAY BE SOME OBJECTION TO THE DESIGN THAT THE RESEARCHER HAD NOT FORESEEN. SO CONSULTATION MUST OCCUR BETWEEN THE RESEARCH WORKER AND THE MACHINIST DURING THE MAKING OF THE APPARATUS TO MUTUALLY AGREE ON DESIGN CHANGES.

IN THE YEAR AND A HALF SINCE THE WORKSHOP OPENED, AN INTERESTING VARIETY OF WORK HAS BEEN UNDERTAKEN. AN IMPRESSIVE LIST OF COMPLETED PROJECTS RANGES FROM A STEEL
TANK BUILT TO WITHSTAND TWO ATMOSPHERES PRESSURE TO KEEP
MICE AT SIMULATED HIGH ALTITUDES FOR THE PRODUCTION OF EXPERIMENTAL POLYCYTHEMIA, TO A GUARD LESS THAN A HALF-INCH
IN LENGTH TO PLACE ON A SCALPEL TO PROTECT BRAIN TISSUE
DURING INCISION OF THE DURA.

OTHER WORK HAS INCLUDED MODIFICATIONS TO STEREOTAXIC EQUIPMENT FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF NEUROSURGERY, MECHANICAL CHANGES IN THE HEART-LUNG MACHINE FOR THORACIC SURGERY, CONSTRUCTION OF A RECORDER FOR MAGNETIC-TO-OPTICAL SOUND TRANSFER FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHIATRY, MAKING AN ARTIFICIAL KIDNEY FOR EXPERIMENTAL SURGERY, AND A SPECIAL RESTRAINER FOR STING-RAYS UNDERGOING NEURO-PHYSIOLOGICAL EXAMINATION FOR THE ANATOMY DEPARTMENT.

ONE UNUSUAL JOB WAS THE CONSTRUCTION OF SPECIAL STAIN-LESS STEEL PANS TO COLLECT STOOLS FROM PATIENTS IN FOOD INTAKE-OUTPUT IN THE METABOLIC RESEARCH UNIT.

SINCE NONE OF THIS SPECIALIZED APPARATUS CAN BE OBTAINED THROUGH NORMAL COMMERICAL SOURCES, THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE RESEARCH WORKSHOP HAS EXTENDED THE FACILITIES AVAILABLE TO OUR RESEARCH WORKERS, AND SHOULD PROVE OF BENEFIT TO ALL DEPARTMENTS OF THE MEDICAL COLLEGE.

MINUTES, FOUNDATION TRUSTEES' MEETING MAY 6, 1963

TRUSTEES OF THE MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA FOUNDATION MET MONDAY, MAY 6, 1963, AT THE CARRIAGE INN, JEKYLL ISLAND, GEORGIA.

THE MEETING WAS CALLED TO ORDER AT 1:00 PM BY THE VICE PRESIDENT, DR. G. LOMBARD KELLY, WHO PRESIDED IN THE ABSENCE OF THE PRESIDENT. PRESENT WERE TRUSTEES KELLY AND SAM E. PATTON. REPRESENTING THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE FROM THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION WAS DR. W. J. WILLIAMS (WHO WAS AUTHORIZED TO CAST ABSENTEE VOTES IN BEHALF OF TRUSTEE LAMAR B. PEACOCK). ALSO PRESENT WAS DR. HARRY B. O'REAR, PRESIDENT, MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA; AND MR. WARREN HITES, EXECUTIVE SECRETARY, MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA FOUNDATION.

MINUTES OF THE TRUSTEES' MEETING OF OCTOBER 14, 1962, WERE APPROVED AS READ.

THE FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE FISCAL YEAR EXTENDING FROM MAY 1, 1962 TO APRIL 30, 1963, WAS REVIEWED AND AC-CEPTED. SPECIAL NOTICE WAS TAKEN OF A SETTLEMENT WITH THE GEORGIA REVENUE DEPARTMENT OF A SALES TAX ASSESS-MENT. THE SETTLEMENT HAD BEEN AUTHORIZED AT A MEETING OF OCTOBER 14, 1962. IT ALSO WAS NOTED THAT POOR ATTENDANCE AT POSTGRADUATE SHORT COURSES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CON-TINUING EDUCATION DURING THE 1962-1963 ACADEMIC YEAR MAY HAVE RESULTED FROM CONFLICTING MEETINGS, AND THAT THE SCHEDULING OF FUTURE SHORT COURSES AT THE MEDICAL COL-LEGE WOULD ATTEMPT TO AVOID SUCH CONFLICTS. Dr. KELLY OBSERVED THAT INVESTMENTS AND SAVINGS WERE ACCUMULATING IN THE GENERAL FUND AT A DISAPPOINTINGLY SLOW RATE. HE URGED THAT EXPENDITURES AND COMMITMENTS BE KEPT AT A MINIMUM, AND THAT CONTRIBUTIONS BE ALLOWED TO ACCUMU-LATE.

DR. O'REAR REPORTED ON THE FACULTY RETREAT HELD AT HILTON HEAD DURING EARLY 1963. HE SAID THE VALUE OF SUCH

MEETINGS HAS BEEN RECOGNIZED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS, AND THAT FUNDS TO SUPPORT THE 1964 FACULTY RETREAT PROBABLY WOULD BE MADE AVAILABLE FROM INSTITUTIONAL SOURCES. HE EXTENDED AN INVITATION TO THE TRUSTEES TO ATTEND THE NEXT RETREAT, AND DR. PATTON SAID THAT HE AND AT LEAST ONE OTHER TRUSTEE WOULD ATTEMPT TO BE PRESENT.

A LETTER FROM DR. EDGAR R. PUND WAS READ, SUGGEST-ING THAT THE FOUNDATION CONSIDER A BUILDING PROJECT OR FACULTY CHAIR AS FUTURE PROJECTS. AFTER CONSIDERABLE DISCUSSION, IT WAS MOVED THAT A COMMITTEE OF FIVE MEMBERS (THREE FROM THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION AND TWO FROM THE FOUNDATION) BE APPOINTED TO STUDY THE COLLEGE'S NEEDS IN A STUDENT UNION. ONE SUGGESTION WAS THAT THE FOUNDATION AND ALUMNI ASSOCIATION CONSIDER FURNISHING AND EQUIPPING SUCH A CENTER.

DR. O'REAR REPORTED THAT THE RECENTLY—COMPLETED MEDICAL COLLEGE LIBRARY WAS OFFICIALLY ACCEPTED BY THE STATE FOR THE SCHOOL IN APRIL. IT IS CONSIDERED LIKELY THAT IT WILL BE PUT INTO SERVICE DURING EARLY SUMMER, 1963. DR. DR. PATTON MOVED THAT THE FOUNDATION ENDORSE A REC-OMMENDATION THAT THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION PROVIDE PLANNING FUNDS FOR AN ALUMNI DAY. THE MOTION WAS PASSED WITH THE PROVISO THAT IF AN ALUMNI DAY IS SCHEDULED, THE FOUNDATION WILL PROVIDE A SPEAKER.



THE ELECTION OF DR. JOHN DEATON OF COLUMBUS TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA FOUNDATION WAS CERTIFIED. DR. DEATON SUCCEEDS DR. G. LOMBARD KELLY, WHOSE TERM OF OFFICE EXPIRED MAY 6, 1963.

IN THE ELECTION OF OFFICERS FOR THE 1963-64 FISCAL YEAR, THE FOLLOWING WERE ELECTED: DR. SAM E. PATTON, PRESIDENT; DR. C. MARK WHITEHEAD, VICE-

PRESIDENT; AND DR. NEAL F. YEOMANS, SECRETARY-TREASUR-ER. AN ANNUAL AUDIT OF THE FOUNDATION'S BOOKS WAS APPROVED, AND MR. HAROLD GERARDOT OF THE COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE WAS AUTHORIZED TO PROCEED WITH AN AUDIT AT HIS EARLIEST CONVENIENCE, AT A COST NOT TO EXCEED \$25.00.

DR. O'REAR REQUESTED THAT THE FOUNDATION PROVIDE AN ADDITIONAL \$1,000 TO THE MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA STUDENT LOAN FUND. HE REMINDED THE TRUSTEES THAT THIS SUM, TOGETHER WITH MATCHING FUNDS FROM THE NATIONAL DEFENSE EDUCATION ACT (NDEA) WOULD TOTAL \$10,000; THAT SINCE THE FOUNDATION ALREADY HAD GIVEN A PREVIOUS \$1,000 TO THE STUDENT LOAN FUND DURING THIS CALENDAR YEAR, THE FOUNDATION ACTUALLY WOULD CAUSE SOME \$20,000 IN NEW MONEY TO BE AVAILABLE FOR STUDENT LOANS. THE REQUEST FOR THE ADDITIONAL MONEY WAS APPROVED.

MR. HITES THEN REQUESTED THAT A SUM OF APPROXIMATELY \$1,500 BE PROVIDED BY THE FOUNDATION FOR THE MAKING OF AN INSTITUTIONAL MOTION PICTURE. THE FILM, ACCORDING TO THE REQUEST, WOULD BE MADE AVAILABLE FOR SHOWING TO PROFESSIONAL GROUPS, CIVIC CLUBS, AND OTHER ORGANIZATIONS AS PROGRAM MATERIAL. DR. WILLIAMS SUGGESTED THAT THE FILM BE PREPARED FOR PROFESSIONAL GROUPS. IT ALSO WAS RECOMMENDED THAT A GROUP CONSISTING OF DR. O'REAR, DR. WALTER G. RICE (DEAN OF THE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE), DR. DAVID B. MCCORKLE (DIRECTOR OF STUDENT AFFAIRS), MR. HITES, AND OTHER APPROPRIATE MEDICAL COLLEGE PERSONNEL DETERMINE THE CONTENT OF THE FILM. ON A MOTION BY DR. PATTON, THE REQUEST WAS APPROVED.
