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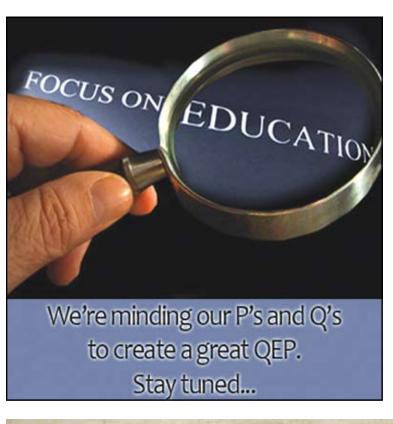

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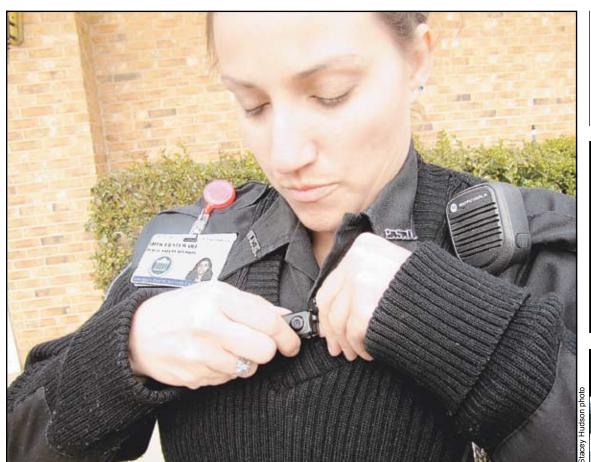






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Officer Robin Stewart adjusts one of the MCG Police Department's new body cameras.

New equipment increases officer safety, accountability

The MCG Police Department is implementing new safety equipment. Each officer in the department has been equipped with body cameras and will begin using Tasers with built-in cameras in the next

Both the body cameras and the Tasers serve a dual purpose, according to Chief of Police William McBride. They allow officers to carry out their duties with greater accountability and with greater regard for public safety.

The cameras allow the department to analyze interaction between officers and the public.

"Complaints from citizens about alleged officer conduct are typically a one-on-one situation, where a citizen might say that the officer was rude, or did this or that," McBride said.

The digital footage from the cameras and Tasers will document the behavior of all parties involved. For example, MCG Police made 28 arrests during November and they issue hundreds of traffic tickets each year. Each interaction represents the possibility of misunder-

standing, which the body cameras are intended to minimize. Officers must turn on the camera at any traffic stop or field interview and download those incidents to the department's storage device at the end of each shift. They are unable to erase footage.

The cameras have already allowed McBride to adjust procedures, such as altering how officers approach vehicle occupants stopped for a traffic violation.

We can use them as a training tool to help the officers be safe," McBride said.

Officers will complete Taser training this month. The non-lethal electroshock weapon disrupts voluntary muscle control long enough to subdue and arrest an unruly suspect, minimizing safety risks to all parties involved, including bystanders. "You can't use your muscles for the five seconds you're being Tased," McBride said. "It does hurt. But it doesn't leave any permanent damage. Within 15 to 20 seconds, they're back to normal."

These models are also equipped with cameras that automatically turn on when an officer removes the Taser from its holster.

"In a really quick, adrenalized situation, an officer may not have the time to turn on the camera. So as soon as you pull it out of the holster, the camera goes on," McBride said.

The exchange can then be dissected later for training purposes, or it can be used in court.

"I think, in general, my officers are very focused and they know what I want from them," McBride said. The bureau recently updated vision and mission statements that officers carry on duty.

"Our new Vision Statement is simple and still very ambitious," McBride said.

"It states that our goal is 'to set the standard for law enforcement excellence in the CSRA."

The department is a certified State of Georgia Law Enforcement Agency. Certification, which is voluntary, gives qualifying agencies 119 operating policies and procedures that optimize professional standards. Agencies are inspected every three years to ensure compliance. Only about 20 percent of the chartered police agencies in Georgia have qualified for this certification.

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Evidence-based nursing conference returns to Augusta

"Connecting the Pieces: Bringing Evidence to the Bedside," the second annual conference highlighting evidence-based nursing practices, will be held Saturday, Jan. 22 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Medical College of Georgia Health Sciences Building, 987 St. Sebastian Way.

Evidence-based practice applies the latest evidence when making patient care decisions to improve quality and safety. This systematic approach incorporates a critical appraisal of the most relevant evidence available, the nurse's own clinical expertise and the patient's preferences and values.

More than 300 participants attended last year's conference, said Dr. Corliss Derrick, president of MCG's Beta Omicron Chapter of Sigma Theta Tau International and conference planning team leader. "We are excited to offer another such conference to bring the latest evidence for excellence in patient care to the bedside nurse. This year, a wide range of patient care areas and interests will meet the needs of a large variety of nurses."

This year's keynote speaker is MCG alumnus Dr. June H. Larrabee, a professor at West Virginia University School of Nursing and clinical investigator at West Virginia University Hospital in Morgantown. Dr. Larrabee wrote the how-to handbook "Nurse to Nurse: Evidence-Based Practice," based on her experiences guiding direct-care nurses in making evidence-based practice changes. She is currently investigat-

ing the relationship between nurse fatigue and patient safety.

The conference is a partnership between MCGHealth, the MCG School of Nursing, the CSRA Chapter of the Georgia Nurses Association, the Academy of Nurse Scholars in Education and the Beta Omicron Chapter of Sigma Theta Tau. Attendees are eligible for seven contact hours from the Georgia Nurses Association.

Go red for women's health

Take it to heart: Cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of death for both women and men in America. But not all is the same for both Dick and Jane.

"There is growing awareness that diseases in men and women are different," said Jennifer Sullivan, Assistant Professor in the Vascular Biology Center.

To combat misconceptions about heart and vascular disease, Sullivan is coordinating the second annual GO RED for Women Symposium Feb. 4 to encourage discussion and research collaboration pertaining to women's health issues.

GO RED for Women was created by the American Heart Association to raise awareness of heart disease as the number-one killer of women and to encourage women to take charge of their heart health.

The symposium will feature keynote speaker Dr. Chris Baylis, J. Robert Cade Professor of Physiology in the Department of Physiology and Functional Genomics at the Univer-

sity of Florida. Baylis will discuss the expansion of blood volume in pregnant women, and how pregnancy-related illnesses can be linked to cardiovascular health.

Following the keynote address, five researchers—Drs. Babak Baban, Eric Belin de Chantemele, Darrell Brann, Joseph Cannon and David Pollock-will highlight ongoing MCG research that relates to women's cardiovascular health.

'We have a number of people on campus who are doing this, but there is a lack of awareness that

there are others on campus with similar interests. So part of our goal is to get all of these people together," Sullivan said.

Afternoon poster presentations will cap off the day.

"These more casual informational mini-sessions offer an opportunity after the oral presentations to mingle, to talk about things, to get ideas flowing and to form collaborations," Sullivan said.

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Cancer Clinical Research Unit offers treatment and hope

In Walter E. Stuckey's decade long battle with chronic lymphocytic leukemia, he's also helped fight the war against the blood cancer diagnosed in about 15,000 people annually.

"It's very important for me to do this because naturally I want to help myself, but in so doing I might be able to bring this to other patients who need it," said the affable 74-year-old from Martinez, Ga., who has participated in two major clinical drug trials for his disease.

He was living in Thomson, Ga., when CLL first hit. When it returned after two chemotherapy regimens at the Medical College of Georgia, he needed a novel approach, traveling to Houston and M.D. Anderson Cancer Center to participate in the study of the first immunotherapy for the disease.

The drug, rituximab, helps rally the immune system's attack on CLL, a condition that turns infection fighting white blood cells into leukemic cells that leave patients infection vulnerable. In fact, pneumonia is the leading cause of death from CLL, said Dr. Farrukh Awan, an MCG hematologist/oncologist and leukemia specialist. "The immune system gets compromised over time and your white cells are completely

taken over by the cancerous clone... so the factory is now only producing bad leukemia cells."

Rituximab's ability to help Stuckey and others beat back the clones and recover white blood cell production earned the drug FDA approval last year. "I feel real proud of that," Stuckey acknowledged. But about the same time, Stuckey was also experiencing the familiar recurring infections such as sinus infections and bronchitis.

His disease was back and the need for another new weapon this time brought Stuckey to the Cancer Clinical Research Unit at the MCG Cancer Center. The five-year old unit specializes in the earliest-phase studies of cancer therapies, as new drugs are making the first steps from the laboratory into humans. It's truly a place where rubber meets the road and, for many patients who have exhausted other options, a place of last hope that, as with Stuckey, happens to be close to

"Phase 1 studies particularly are very specialized in the fact that most of the drugs are first-in-man drugs; they have only been tested in the laboratory so you get a lot of attention and monitoring simply because we don't know how this is going

for the International Salute for the Life and Legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., and the Women in Medicine Leadership Development Award from the Association of American Medical Colleges.

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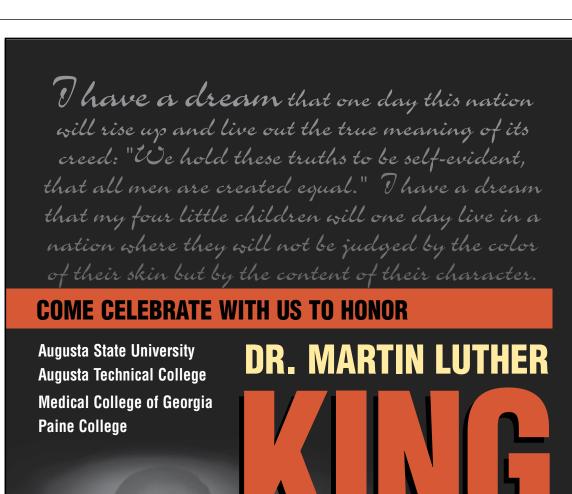

to affect you," said Pam Bourbo, the manager who helped start the unit. "We have an idea from what happens in animal studies but you never truly know until you give these drugs to patients." If a drug isn't helping, they stop it and try to identify other options. Patients return the favor of invaluable infor-

"Everything they tell us, every side effect we see, everything that it does to our patients - good or bad helps us get closer to either having a new drug available or going in a different direction if we see evidence that it's not going to help the patient or that it's too toxic," Bourbo said.

The original unit started small on the fifth floor of MCGHealth Medical Center; the current unit, with two private infusion rooms, a dozen treatment stations and room to grow, is on the second floor of MCGHealth's year-old cancer treatment facility. Private rooms are great, particularly for new patients who may spend many hours multiple days a week at the Cancer Clinical Research Unit, Bourbo said. Patients in infusion chairs can look through the wall of windows at the rooftop gardens and share the view - and the time - with a family member or friend. Onsite laboratories ease the extensive ongoing monitoring, such as checking blood levels of the study drug at regular intervals, said Dr. Thomas Samuel, an MCG hematologist/oncologist and breast cancer specialist.

The unit, which started with a handful of patients, studies and staff, now has nearly 60 patients enrolled in a number of Phase 1 and

2 trials for a wide range of cancers, including breast, lung, prostate, ovarian and liver as well as leukemias and lymphomas. Cancers lacking good treatment options, such as pancreatic cancer and glioblastoma multiforme (a brain tumor), are of particular interest.

Our aim here is to really provide something for the patient," said Samuel, a member of the Scientific Review Committee, which determines which protocols to pursue. Bourbo uses her cell phone number as the first point of contact for patients wanting to know if the unit has anything to offer them. Such personal but intense care is invaluable to Awan, who joined the MCG faculty in July 2009 and already is enrolling patients in about a half dozen of these early-phase studies.

While Stuckey had other options, including another course of chemotherapy, he and Awan agreed that he might benefit more - and suffer less - from one of the new immunotherapy agents. They opted for TRU-016, a drug Awan had studied in the lab that targets leukemia cells by targeting the CD37 receptor. The receptor, expressed primarily on the surface of leukemia cells, "holds its head up high" so it's a solid target. The fact that there are less of the visible receptors on normal cells reduces side effects as well as healthy cell loss. Yet Awan describes the drug as a "leaner, meaner" immunotherapy that delivers a double whammy by directly killing leukemia cells and prompting the immune system to do the same. Side effects have included fleeting nausea and a temporary dip in white cell counts, No patient has

experienced hair loss. Awan recently began another trial that packages TRU-016 with one of the new chemotherapy drugs to see if that further enhances response.

Inspired early in his career by a leukemic cell that he describes as "big ... bulky ... it's almost uglylooking," Awan is also busy in his lab across the street at the MCG Cancer Research Center looking for more answers like how to better personalize therapy. He wants to be able to tell a patient not only what drug will work best for him but how well it should work for him based on his cancer cells rather than making therapy choices and outcome predictions solely based on other patients' experiences. He's also a member of the National Cancer Institute's working group on CLL that is identifying new approaches to the disease. "It's very interesting to develop a mouse with CLL," Awan said. "It gives you a model to study, but that knowledge has to be translated to my patients and what we are trying to do is develop those bridges.'

On one of his last treatment visits to the Cancer Clinical Research Unit, Stuckey and his white blood cell counts were looking good. Preparing for a television interview about his study, he wanted infusion nurse Carol Rauch, who spoils him anyway, to ensure that his hair looked good. "On my days off, I'd still rather come here," said Stuckey, where he knows he'll always find a warm blanket and friendly faces.

With his media debut and treatment complete, he headed across town to his small used-car lot to

take care of another kind of business. The man who has retired from careers as a rural mail carrier and nursing home owner/operator has no plans to stop working or smiling any time soon.

Neither do the doctors and nurses at the Cancer Clinical Research Unit. In fact, they expect the advent of even more targeted yet gentler therapies to provide more reason for optimism and appreciate the help of patients such as Stuckey in the lifesaving pursuit.

"It's what gets me up in the morning," said Samuel. Awan, a year out of his fellowship and research training at Ohio State University, doesn't bat an eye at the possibility of curing cancer in his professional lifetime. "We are curing cancer right now but it comes at a price. So the goal is not only to cure everyone, but do it without side effects and unless we are there we should keep improving."

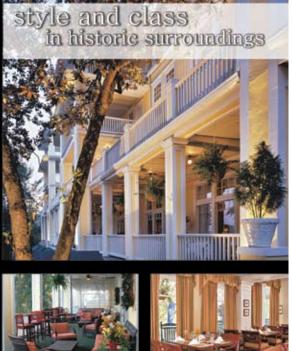

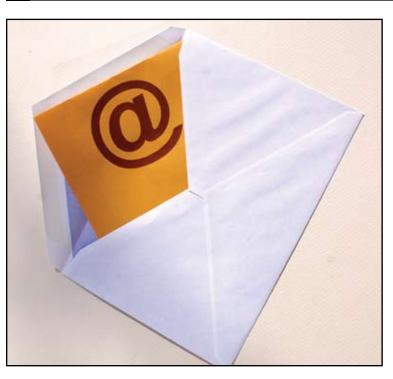

Email users will not be able to access the new email address prior to this date. However, users will be able to receive email messages at the old mcg.edu email address until Sept. 30.

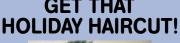
Listserv users should unsubscribe

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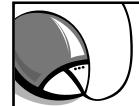

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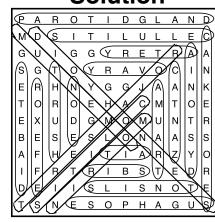
