## 18th Century Gravid Uterus donated to Historical Collections & Archives

On Monday, February 18, Dr. Leslie Wilkes (Medical College of Georgia, Class of 1965) presented to Historical Collections & Archives his copy of William Hunter's historical book *Anatomia uteri humani gravidi tabulis illustrata* [The anatomy of the human gravid uterus exhibited in figures] published in 1774. Dr. Wilkes' mother was a librarian in a county public library and he began collecting rare books by William Hunter's brother, John Hunter, during his fellowship in Scotland.

William Hunter was a famous anatomist, surgeon and obstetrician in 18th Century Great Britain and author of numerous articles on anatomy, surgery, and midwifery. The Gravid Uterus is Hunter's most well-known work and is considered to be one of the best anatomical atlases ever published. The

script is in Latin and English, which is a unique feature of the book. The engraved plates were produced by several engravers using the artistic anatomical drawings by Jan van Rymsdyk. Due to the size of the book, 26"x19" the drawings are presented life-size.



The presentation of the Gravid Uterus was attended by Dr. Peter Buckley, Dean of the Medical College of Georgia, as well as representatives from Univer-

## New Resources and Changes for 2013

### DynaMed Canceled

**DynaMed was canceled effective March 1, 2013.** Essential Evidence Plus is a comprehensive clinical decision support system database that will replace DynaMed. More information about Essential Evidence Plus is provided below.

### Essential Evidence Plus

Essential Evidence Plus (EE+) is a comprehensive clinical decision support system that features over 13,000 topics, guidelines, abstracts, tools, images, and summaries.



These cover the most common conditions, diseases, and

procedures clinicians encounter on a daily basis. EE+ also provides a number of diagnostic calculators and daily delivery of POEMs (Patient Oriented Evidence that Matters). POEMs examine a clinical question, provide a bottom line, and review the pertinent information to help guide practice. EE+ recommendations are based on the evidence available in the relevant literature and each recommendation comes with a strength-of-evidence rating. EE+ provides summaries of Cochrane Reviews, but also links to the Cochrane Databases to provide more in-depth information on topics. EE+ is optimized for mobile devices, so the web-version will adapt to iPad, iPhone, Android or other device.

## ProQuest Public Health Database

Greenblatt Library and the College of Allied Health are pleased to now provide the health sciences campus access to [ProQuest Public Health](#).

ProQuest Public Health specifically indexes information from the perspectives of community health and prevention as opposed to clinical diagnosis and treatment of individuals.



The ProQuest database uses a set of public health terminology to improve searching retrieval instead of MEDLINE medical subject headings based on disease, anatomy, organisms, and medical procedures. A similar comparison could be demonstrated by MEDLINE vs CINAHL. There is some overlap in content, however, CINAHL has unique journal literature and subject terms specifically for nursing and allied health professions. It is possible to download ProQuest databases search results into EndNote to continue building a customized research library on specific topics.

ProQuest Public Health includes journal information that is not indexed in MEDLINE, for example, Population

Health Metrics and Mycotoxin Research. The database includes sources of information other than journal publications such as government publications, technical reports, economic surveys and health industry reports.

## The Cochrane Library - New Home for Evidence Based Medicine Databases

Since January 1, 2013 EBM Databases have been accessible through The Cochrane Library directly instead of through OVID.

The Cochrane Library offers access to 6 databases:

Cochrane Database of Systematic Reviews (CDSR)

Database of Abstracts of Reviews of Effectiveness (DARE)

Cochrane Controlled Trials Register

Cochrane Methodology Register (formerly called the Review Methodology Database)

Health Technology Assessment Database

National Health Service (NHS) Economic Evaluation Database.

## Searching Information

The default search is all databases within the Cochrane Library. Within the default search results users can toggle between different databases result sets. Narrow search results by adding a second or third subject term, or use the expand (+) symbol to broaden the search. Add the search strategy to the Search Manager for more searching options. Search Manager is an advance

search feature to combine multiple search strategies together or identify medical subject headings. Additional limits include word variations, status, and date ranges.

Cochrane reviews have three different printing formats: a summary (abstract only), standard (full Cochrane review), and full (added supplementary material).

Save or share search results by creating a Wiley Online Library user account. Registered users can access saved publications, articles and searches. Saved search alerts target specific search strategies.

The Cochrane Library home page features browse by topics, podcasts of selected Reviews, and Cochrane Methods, the Cochrane Collaborative Group supplement annual publication of methodological issues.

### Interlibrary Loan Price Changes

Effective January 1st, 2013, Interlibrary Loan (ILL) fees increased from \$5.00 to \$7.00 per request. Interlibrary Loan has been proud to maintain its fee schedule, without increase, for 12 years. The new fee is comparable to like institutions and is reflective of average ILL service fees nationwide. ### King Honored by Medical Library Association



Professor David N. King, MS, PhD, has received a unique recognition by the Medical Library Association. In celebration of 100 years of publication, a special centennial issue of the *Journal of the Medical Library Association* has reprinted 10 of the most important articles of its history, one from each decade. Dr. King's article reporting research on the contribution of libraries to clinical decision making was selected as one of the 10 for the special issue. The article is one of the most heavily cited in the history of the journal and remains a landmark in evidence-based practice for the profession.

### Greenblatt Library Receives NLM Disaster Health Information Outreach Award

Greenblatt Library has been awarded funding for a disaster health information outreach project to provide training and resources for health professionals and disaster man-

agement personnel. This award will strengthen the existing relationship between Georgia Regents University (GRU) and the Georgia East Central Health District (ECHD), and facilitate a partnership to respond to disaster-related emergencies. Health science librarians will lead the effort to provide information to public health partners in the 13 county ECHD in Georgia through needs assessment, training, and the creation of disaster information section on the existing Greenblatt Library website. Public health partners, including hospitals, community health centers, emergency management, social service and volunteer organizations such as the Red Cross and Salvation Army, will receive hands-on training to improve access to current disaster-related health information from the National Library of Medicine and local sources. Training will focus on key resources as determined by the needs assessment and emphasize the use of mobile information tools for use in the field. Librarians will also coordinate efforts with volunteer community public information liaisons identified in the 13 counties to assist with dissemination of information during disasters/emergencies.

This 4-day workshop is designed to help clinical leaders and educators enhance their Evidence-Based Medicine skills. The workshop consists of larger group lectures, small groups sessions for practicing and free study time for consultations and short classes on effectively using EBM resources.

Julie was chosen for the **Woods Hole BioMedical Informatics Fellowship Program** for May 2013. This is a week-long course, which takes place at Marine Biological Laboratory in Woods Hole, MA and is fully supported by the National Library of Medicine, NIH. The course is for medical educators, medical librarians and medical administrators interested in the application of computer technologies and information science in biomedicine and health science. Through a combination of lectures and hands-on computer exercises, fellows are introduced to the conceptual and technical components of biomedical informatics.

Greenblatt Library is pleased to be selected as a host for the National Library of Medicine (NLM) Fellow Spring Practicum Week during March 4-8.



The NLM Associate Fellow, Karen Gutzman, is a recent graduate from North Texas with a MS degree in Library Science with an emphasis in Health Informatics. While completing her degree she worked as a research assistant for

the National Children's Study. Ms. Gutzman completed an internship with the University of Houston's digital library and received a MLA Scholarship. Karen holds a Masters of Arts degree in Educational Leadership from Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN. Her undergraduate degree from South Dakota State University is in Biological Sciences.

The National Library of Medicine Associate Fellowship Program is a one-year postgraduate training fellowship at the NLM in Bethesda, with an optional second year component. The program is designed to provide a broad foundation in health sciences information services, and to prepare librarians for future leadership roles in health sciences libraries. The Spring Practicum Week is an opportunity for NLM Associates to meet academic health sciences center library staff and medical center staff and be exposed to experiences beyond what NLM can offer. ## Southern Medical and Surgical Journal available in Scholarly Commons

The Greenblatt Library is pleased to announce that the recently digitized volumes of the *Southern Medical and Surgical Journal* are available for viewing in the GRU institutional repository, **Scholarly Commons**. The digitization of this 19th Century publication was made possible through the Express Library Digitization and Conservation Award given by the National Network of Libraries of Medicine Southeastern/Atlantic Region.


The *Southern Medical and Surgical Journal (SMSJ)* was first published in June 1836 by the faculty of the newly established Medical College of Georgia. The *SMSJ* presented scholarly work in the art of medicine to urban and rural medical practitioners in the southeast region of the US and was a vibrant reflection of middle 19th Century American medicine.

Significant articles that appeared first in the *SMSJ* were Dr. Crawford W. Long's use of ether during surgery and Dr. Louis A. Dugas' theory for diagnosing dislocations of the

shoulder joint, referred today as the "Dugas Sign". The journal was published from June 1836 to December 1839, Volumes I-III; 1845-1861, Volumes I-XVII, New Series; and resumed for only a brief time from July/August 1866 to July 1867, Volume XXI, Whole Series. Each volume is indexed by author/contributor and title/subject.
