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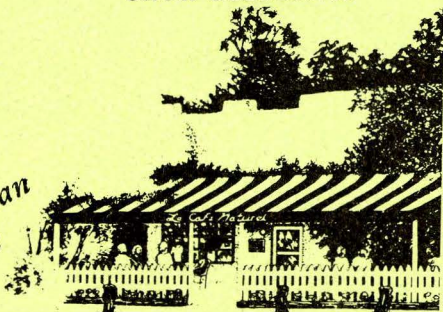
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Medical College Of Teabeaut Founded

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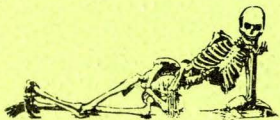

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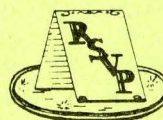
MEDICAL SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Rat Race Planned for May 4

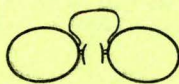
