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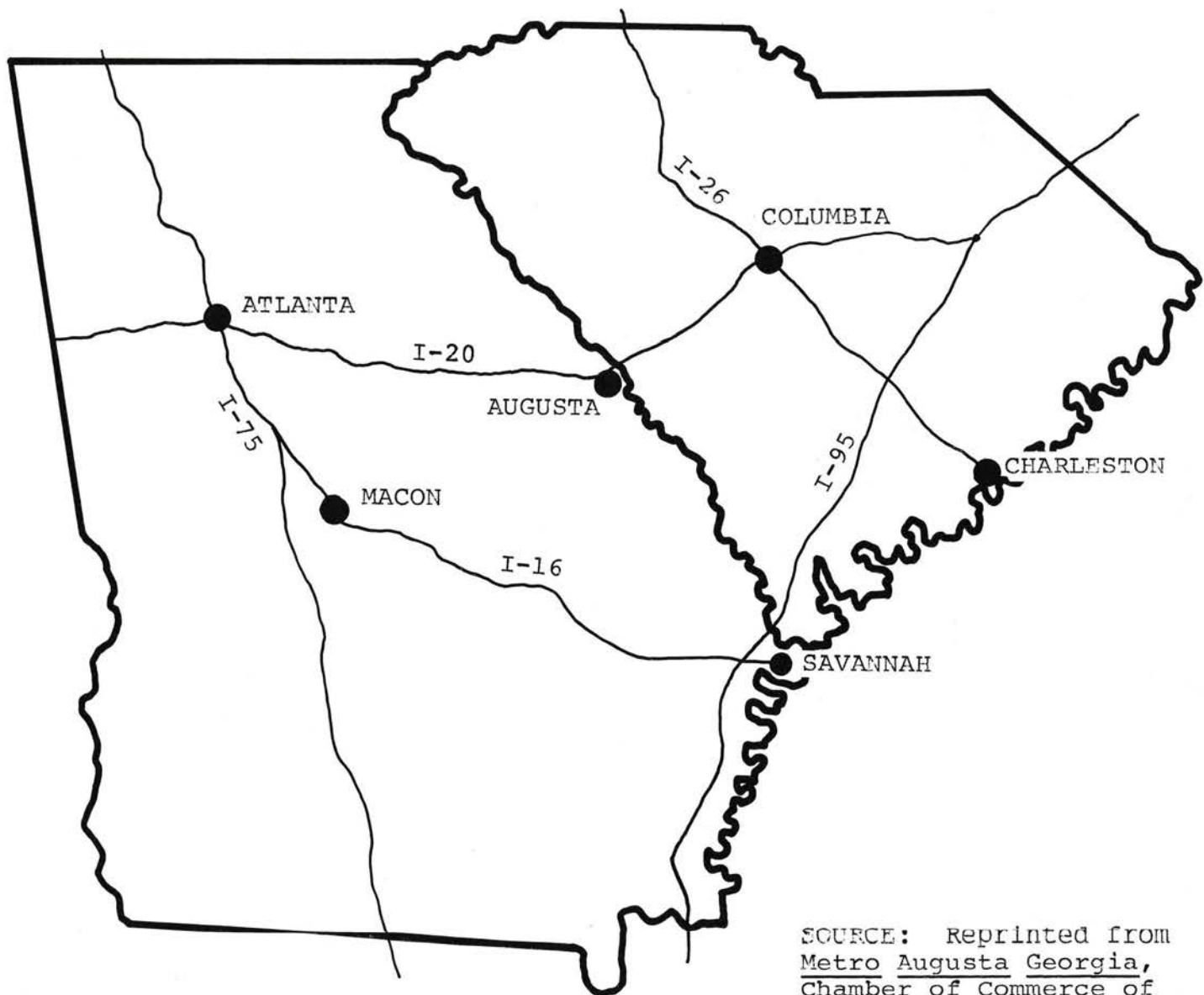


## AUGUSTA, GEORGIA

Clark Hill Reservoir offers a 1200-mile shoreline and 80,000 acres of impounded water area, with sailing, swimming, camping, waterskiing, fishing, and boating. All major professional sports in Atlanta, within easy reach. Full schedules of intercollegiate spectator sports.

#### TRANSPORTATION

## MEDICAL MARVELS

The medical complex of Metro Augusta is, indeed, complex. It ranks as the largest single enterprise in the area, employing more than 10,000 persons. The operating budget for MCG alone runs to \$76 million annually. But the humane and compassionate care offered the ailing transcends dollar considerations. Within the roster of teaching hospitals, community hospitals, proprietary and governmental institutions, health service ranging from the routine and conventional through the rarest and most exotic are available.

This hardly ought elicit surprise if one were speaking of a major metropolitan center, Atlanta, New York, Boston, or Los Angeles. But it surely marks Augusta as a rarity among communities of its size.

The Medical College of Georgia (MCG) in Augusta is the health-science university for the state. Its general teaching hospital is Talmadge Memorial, a 750-bed institution.

University Hospital, a 700-bed general, acute-care community hospital located near MCG, served at one time as the teaching hospital for the college. Today, it serves as a clinical training institution for MCG, and has a formal affiliation with the college for that purpose, but it is not part of the college.

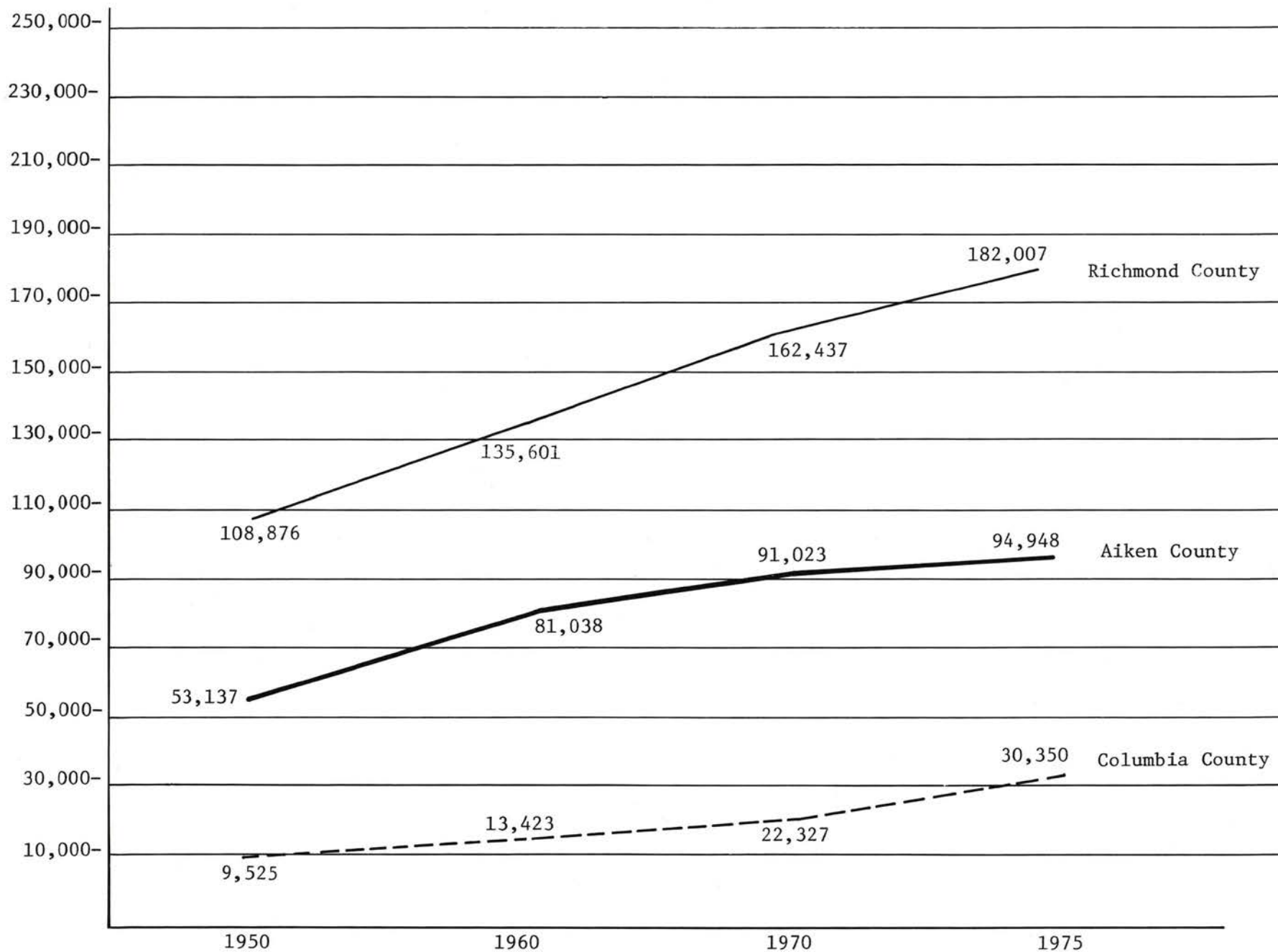
In addition to Talmadge and University Hospitals is St. Joseph's Hospital, a newly renovated 250-bed institution of the Catholic church, but operated as a non-profit community hospital. Also, Doctors Hospital, a 200-bed proprietary facility is located just northwest of the city.

Georgia Regional Mental Hospital is a state institution with its own staff of psychiatric specialists and serving as a clinical training hospital for MCG. Gracewood State Hospital is a specialist in custodial care for the mentally retarded and also serves as a clinical training site for MCG students.

Lenwood Hospital is operated by the Veterans Administration. An ultra-modern 420-bed structure is rising in the city to replace a second, older VA hospital, Forest Hills. Dwight David Eisenhower Army Medical Center at Fort Gordon is a Class II military hospital, the classification given Walter Reed Hospital in Washington. It serves the military personnel at the fort, their dependents, and the large corps of retired military personnel of the area. It also serves as a military referral center for difficult and unusual cases. Its staff consists of military doctors, nurses, and technicians, some of who have a clinical faculty appointment at MCG.

GROWTH RATE - 1950-1975

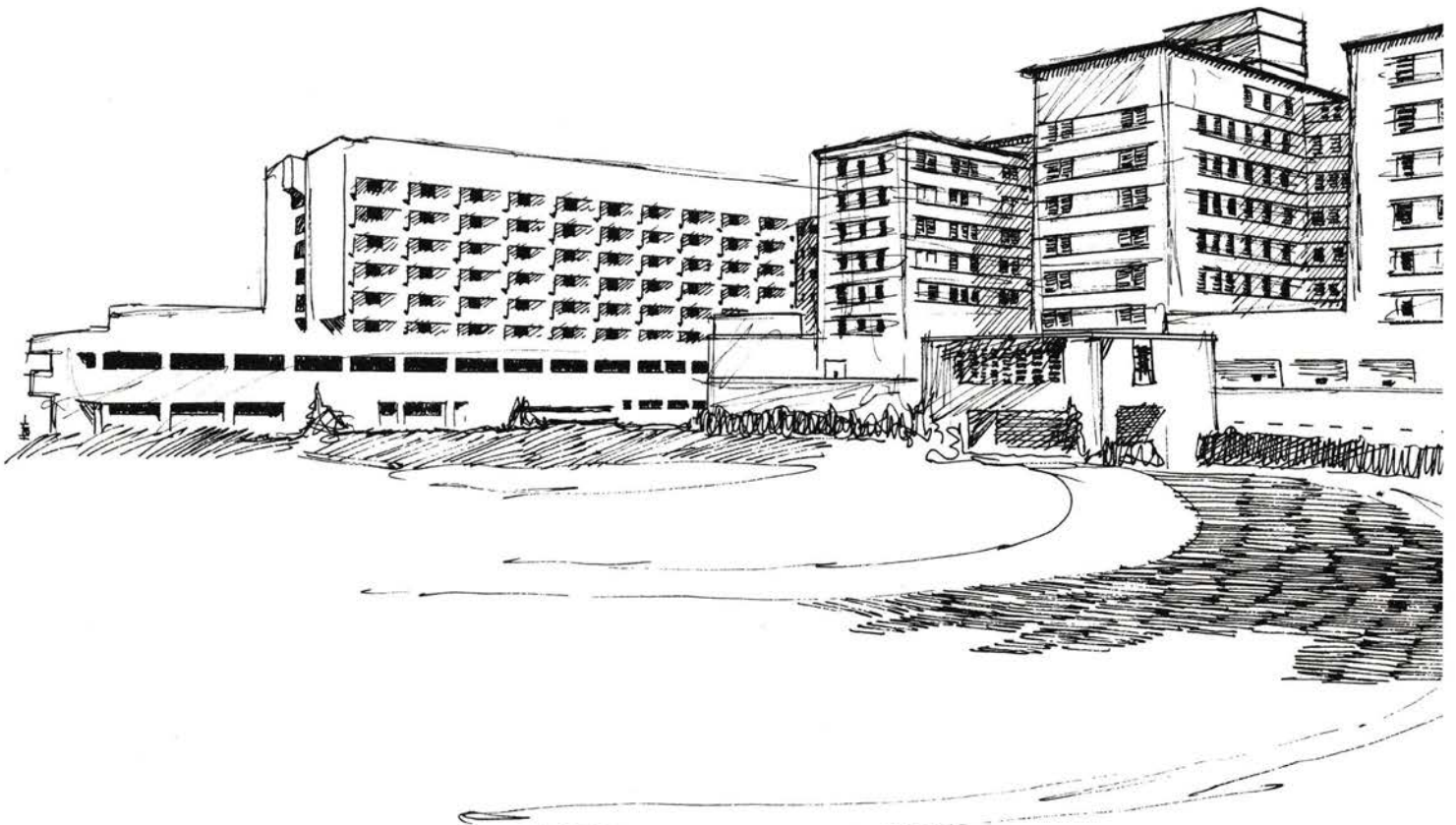

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## PROFILE OF THE MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA

**TYPE:** The Medical College of Georgia is a state-supported institution - unique in the fact that it is the only public health sciences university in Georgia. It is a unit of the University System of Georgia.

**PURPOSE:** To provide health education and training for prospective practitioners, scientists, and educators at the undergraduate, graduate, postgraduate and continuing education levels.

To promote scholarly inquiry in the biological sciences and provide leadership in the generation of basic knowledge of human biology in health and disease.

To exercise leadership in the development of new educational approaches for the health professions and in the application of new knowledge and technology.

**LOCATION:** The campus is situated in the approximate center of Augusta and is convenient to downtown and accessible to suburban businesses and shops.

**SIZE:** It has grown in 25 years from two buildings on a little more than two acres of land to 47 buildings on approximately 78 acres of land today.

## A HISTORY OF THE MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA

The Medical College of Georgia in Augusta is the eleventh oldest among existing medical schools in the United States. Founded in 1828, it is Georgia's primary institution of higher education for training health professionals.

The college has experienced rapid growth, particularly during the past quarter century. For example, in 25 years the campus physical plant has grown from just two buildings on little more than two acres of land to 47 buildings on approximately 78 acres of land today. And, construction or expansion of facilities planned over the next few years will continue that growth trend.

In 1950 there was one school - the School of Medicine, the core upon which the Medical College of Georgia was founded. Today, there are four additional schools - Graduate Studies, founded in 1951; Nursing, moved to Augusta from Athens in 1956; Allied Health Sciences, founded in 1968; and Dentistry, founded in 1969.

The beginnings of this medical center were somewhat less impressive than the present modern campus. The college was started in two borrowed rooms at the rear of Augusta's old City Hospital 149 years ago, with its assets consisting of little more than the vision of its founders. It was in those early years that Drs. Milton Antony, Joseph Adams Eve, Lewis D. Ford, and later L. A. Dugas and Paul Eve, with the support of many Augusta citizens, began building the rich heritage that the Medical College now enjoys.

In 1833 members of the first graduating class received their doctor of medicine degrees. There were four students in that graduating class. In 1976 the college graduated approximately 160 physicians, 60 dentists, 415 undergraduate and 140 graduate nurses, 20 biomedical scientists, and 175 professionals trained in fields of allied health science. Additionally, MCG now provides graduate education for more than 250 interns and residents each year.

Even in the early days of the Medical College, changes came quickly. In 1835 the college moved into its first permanent home at the corner of Telfair and Sixth streets in Augusta. This building, now called the Old Medical College and presently operated as a garden center, was vacated by the college in 1913, when the institution moved to its present mid-city campus consisting then of two buildings. Except for a brief interim during the Civil War, the Medical College has operated continuously since its founding.

From 1913 to 1950 the college experienced good times and bad. Faculty members as well as students were called to service in World Wars I and II. The college received varying accreditation ratings from the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association. There were fat years and there were lean years for State appropriations, and the depression did not spare the Medical College either. There were battles about the relocation of the college from Augusta to both Atlanta and Athens, and there were dynamic changes in curriculum. Also during this period, the University System of Georgia was established and the college celebrated its 100th anniversary.



In 1950 the Board of Regents of the University System made the Medical College an independent unit of the University System, and for the sixth time in 125 years the institution received a new name - Medical College of Georgia.

A vital adjunct to the Medical College's programs is its 750 teaching hospital, Talmadge Memorial Hospital, with the newly completed Virgil Sydenstricker Wing, and its various clinics. The founders of the college certainly could not have foreseen the rise of a great teaching hospital, as a part of the MCG medical complex known today. Talmadge Memorial Hospital is the major referral center for the State; patients come to Augusta from throughout Georgia, and many other states, because of Talmadge's reputation for the care of complex and difficult diseases.

## THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

The University System of Georgia was established in 1931 when control and operational authority over state-aided schools of higher learning were vested in the University System Board of Regents, a constitutional body appointed by the Governor and approved by the Senate. There are fifteen Regents, all serving terms of seven years. Members of the Board are appointed from each of the state's Congressional Districts and the remainder from the state-at-large. The Regents select their own officers and appoint a chancellor as chief administrator of the University System. The system consists of 33 institutions including the Medical College of Georgia.

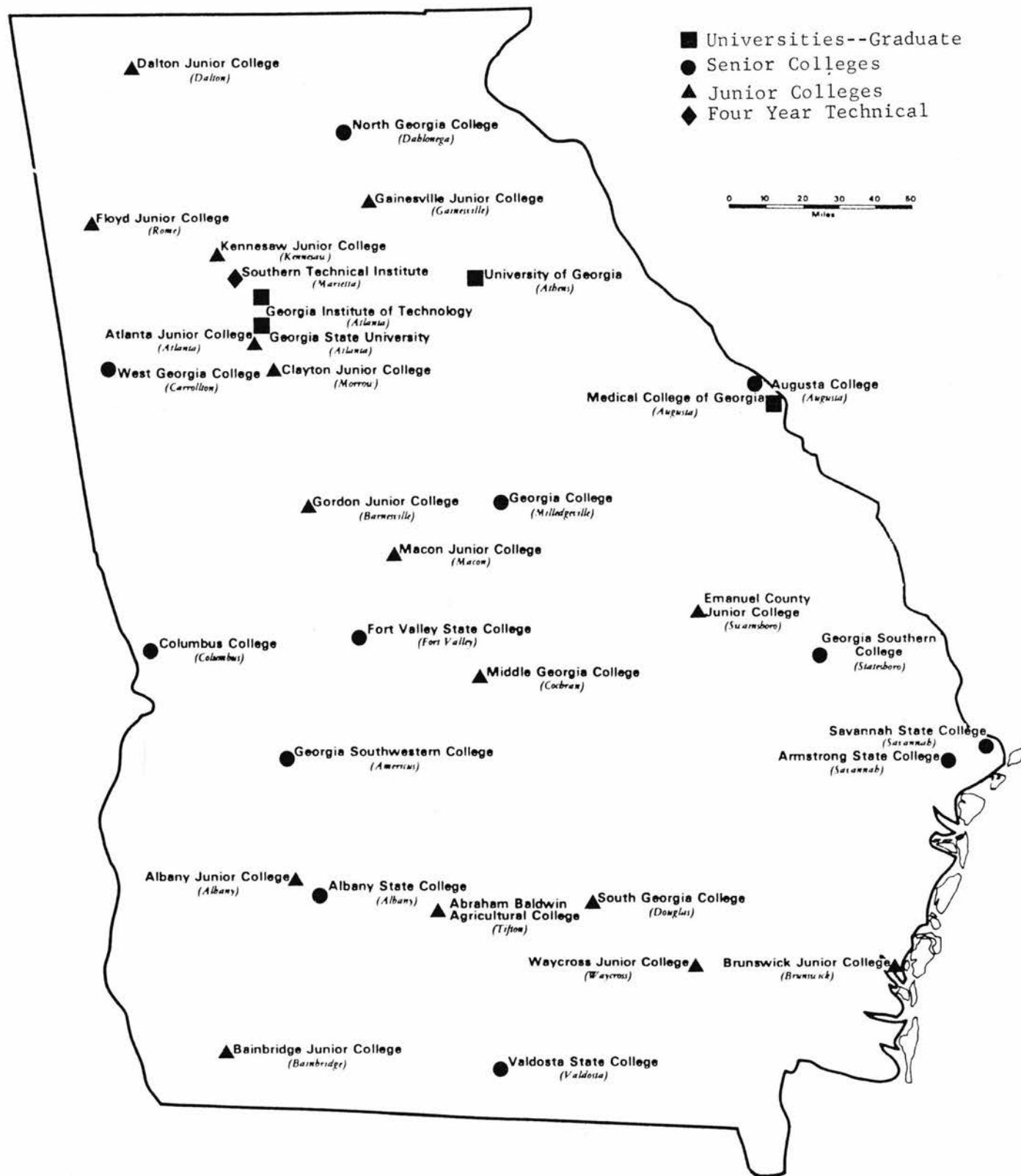

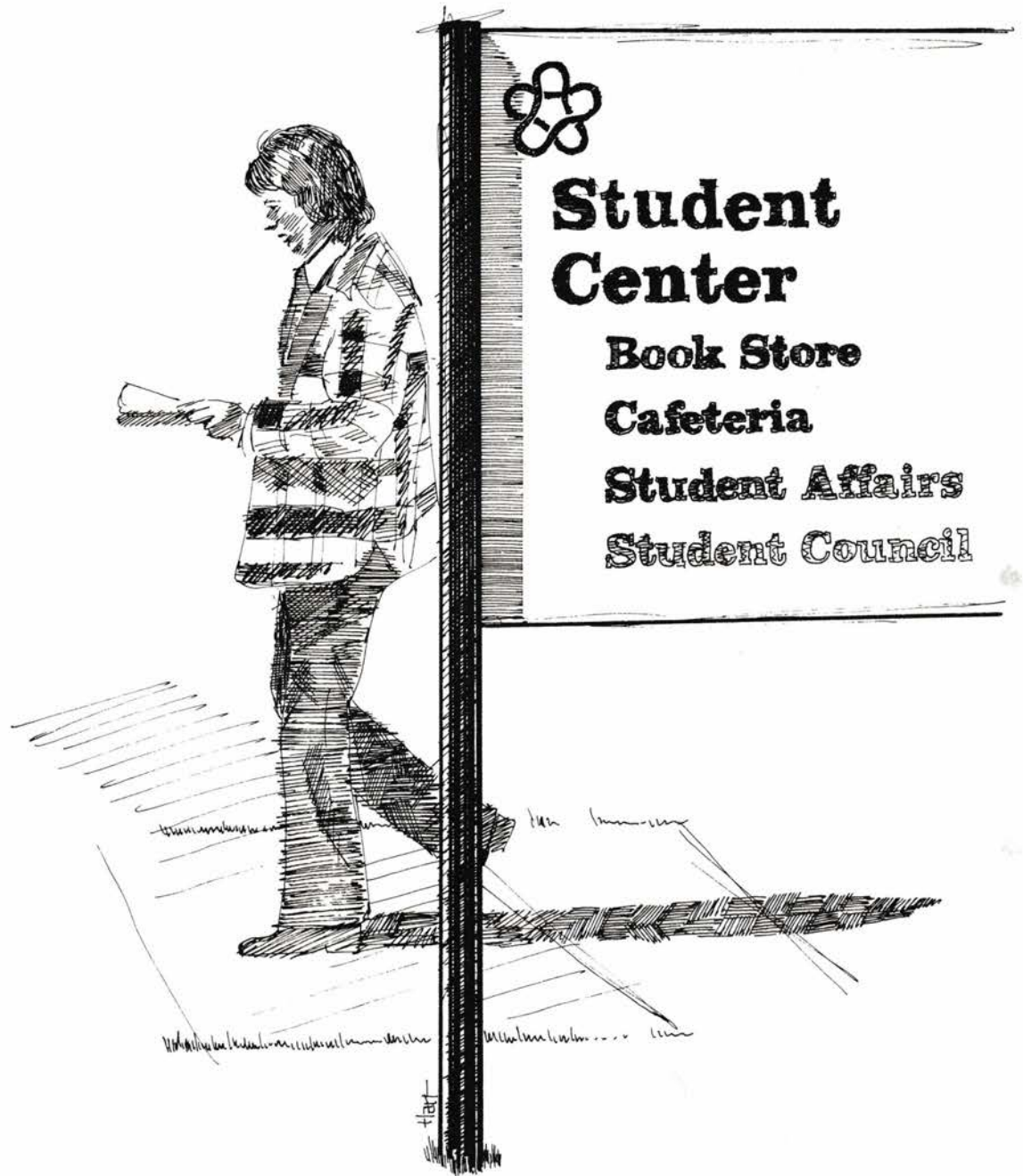


# INSTITUTIONS OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA

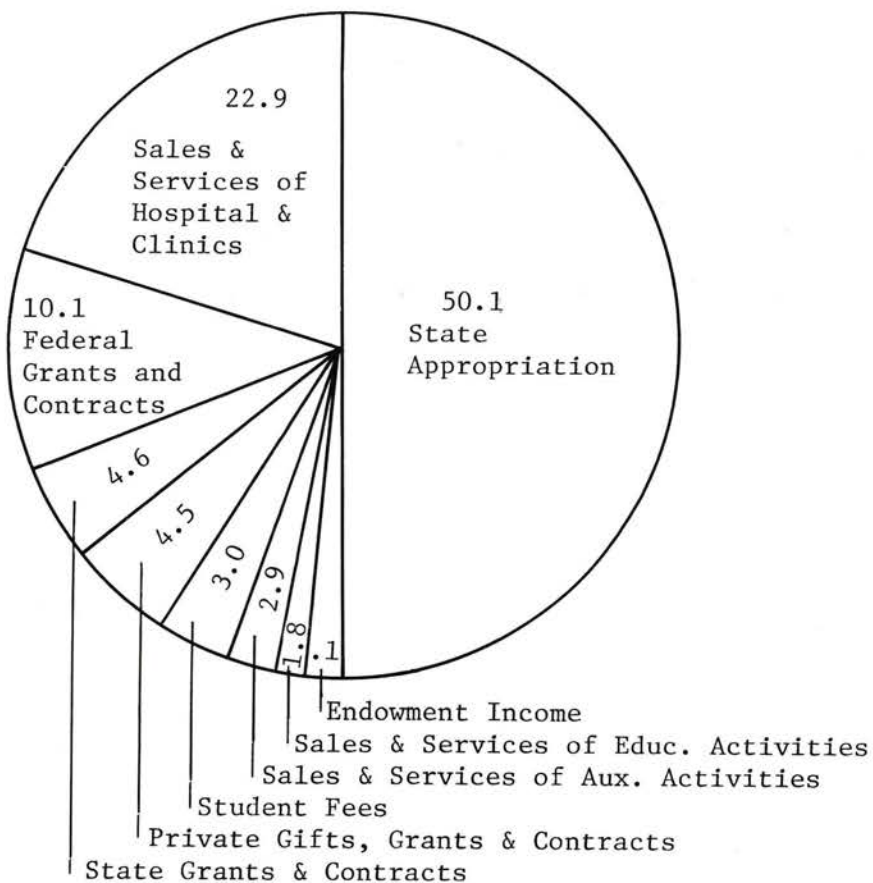




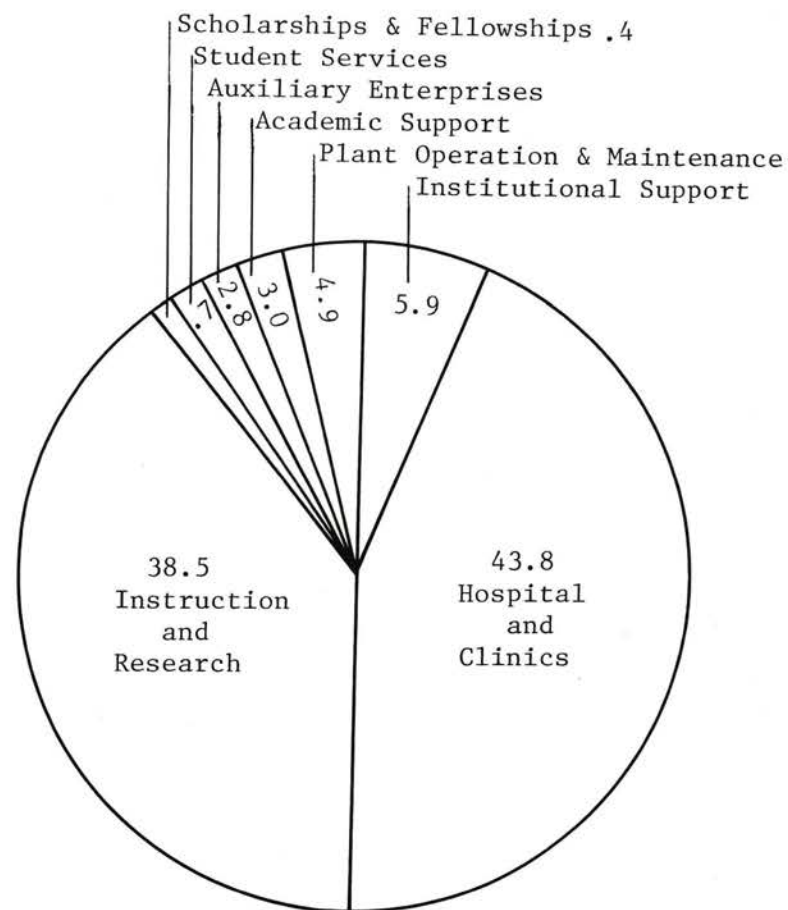


FUNDS AVAILABLE AND FUNDS APPLIED (BY PERCENTAGES)

Funds Applied



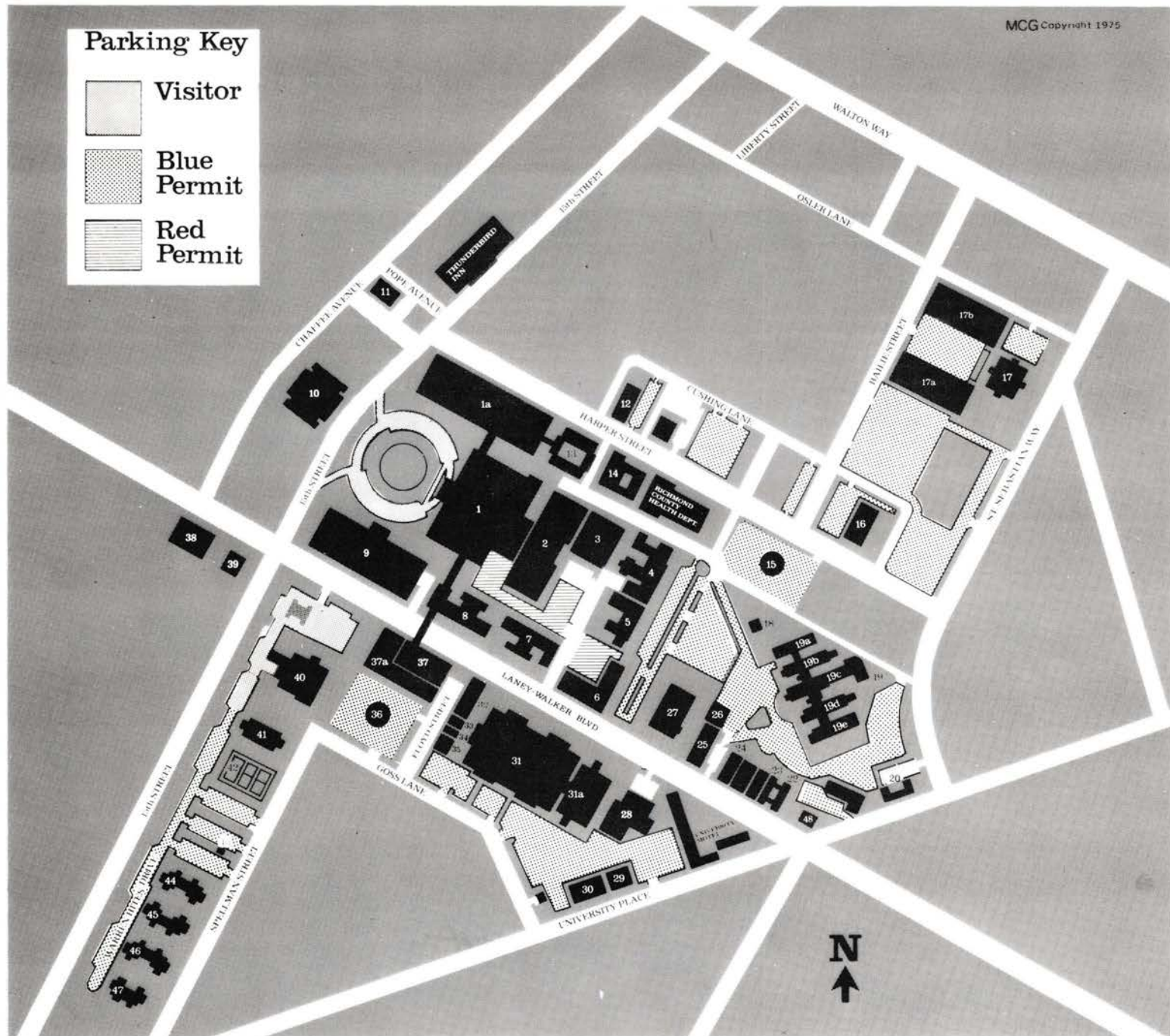
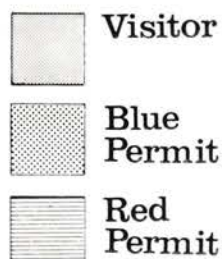

## FACULTY DEFINITIONS

Discrepancies in faculty definitions throughout the University System of Georgia make it impossible to use a standardized definition at this time. For this reason, the Office of Educational Research and Development has arbitrarily assigned definitions to the faculty at MCG. The Office has attempted in all cases to consistently use these definitions throughout this Fact Book.

### 1. Administrative Faculty

- a. With rank - all faculty above the rank of department head; includes directors and associate directors of divisions, deans, associate and assistant deans of schools, the President and the Provost
- b. Without rank - all personnel who hold faculty title but no rank; includes some assistant deans, assistant directors, and administrative officers

### 2. Clinical Faculty

Faculty whose title includes the word clinical and whose services are on a voluntary basis

### 3. Instructional Faculty

All faculty with rank at the level of department chairman or below who hold rank in one of the five schools at MCG

### 4. Research Faculty

All MCG faculty with rank whose title includes research

### 5. Veterans Administration Faculty

Instructional faculty with work commitments at both MCG and the Veterans Administration Hospital; considered 1.00 EFT for institutional purposes

### 6. General Programs Faculty

Faculty with academic rank whose primary academic appointment is not within one of the five schools at MCG

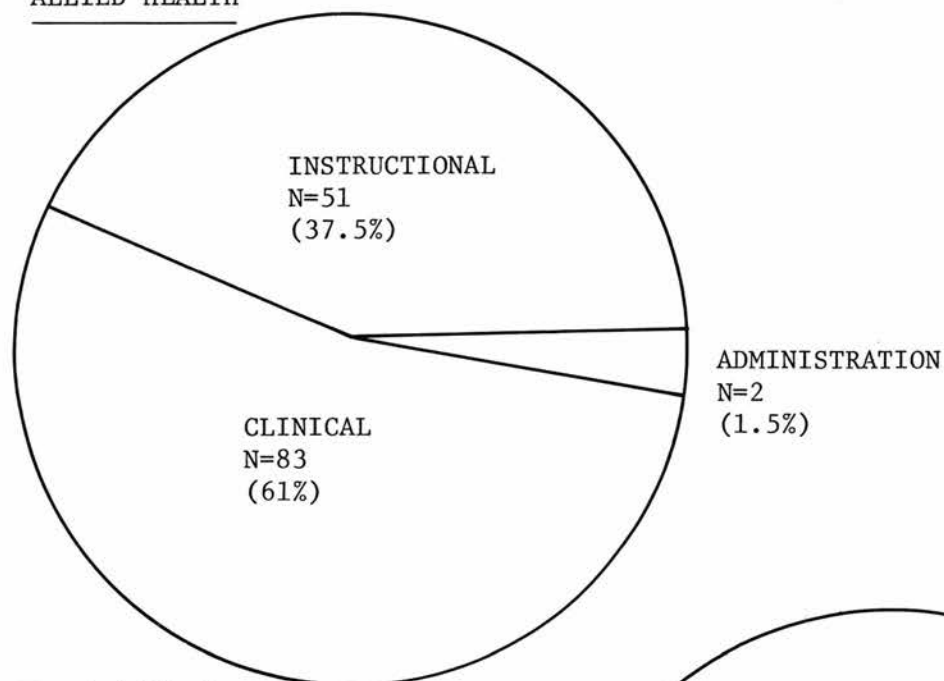

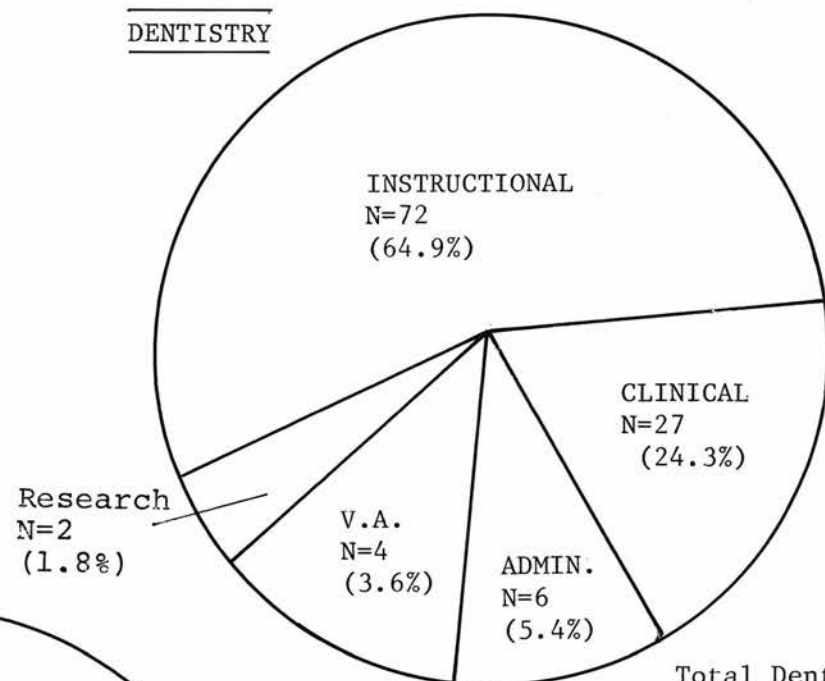
FACULTY DISTRIBUTION (.50 EFT OR GREATER)

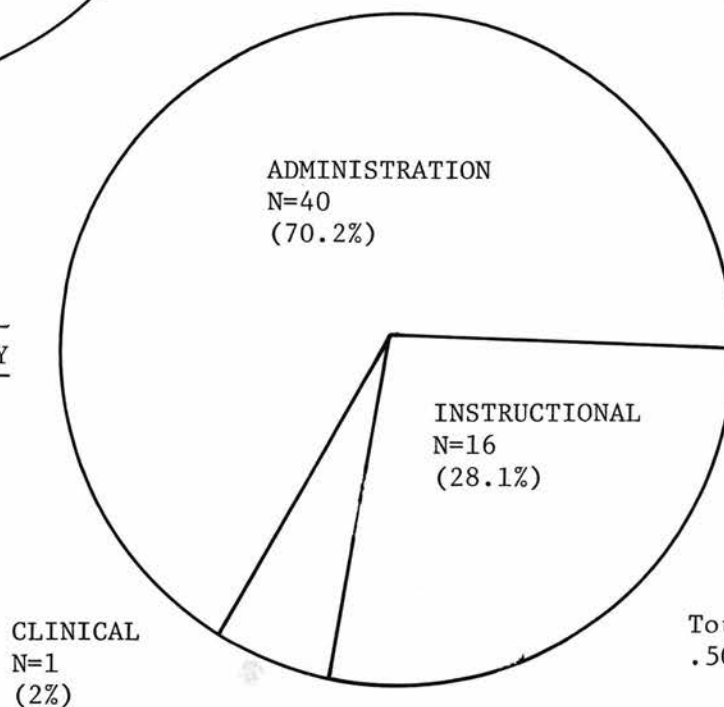

or greater = 111

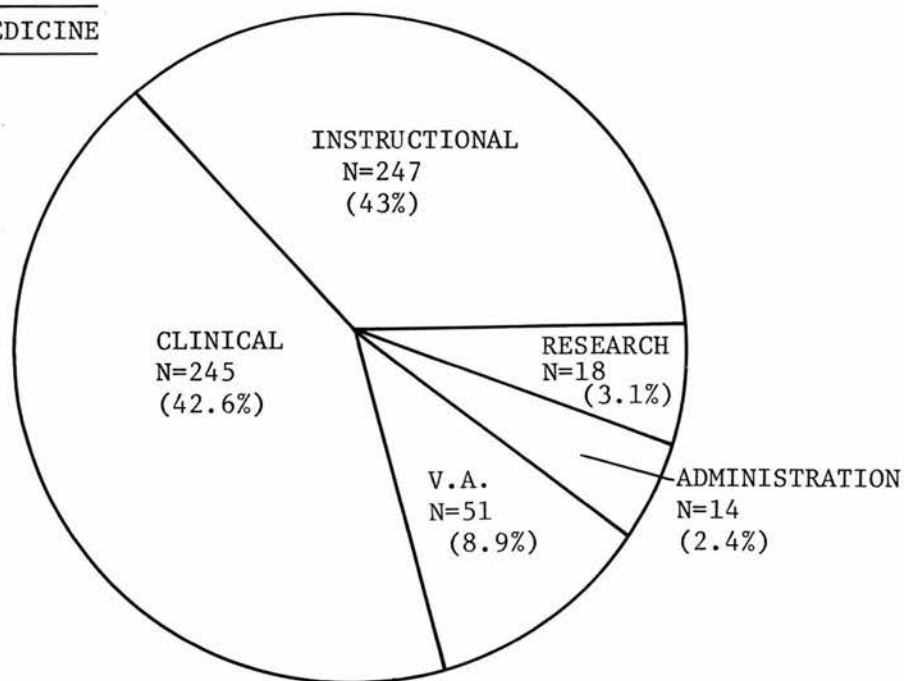
GENERAL PROGRAMS FACULTY

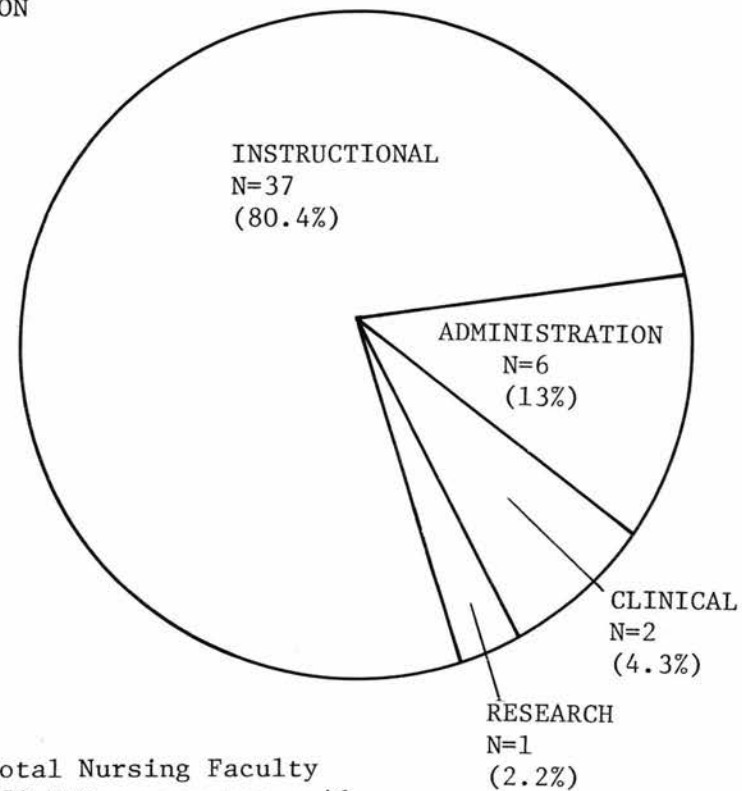

SICK LEAVE: Full-time faculty incapacitated by illness shall have their salary continued as a matter of course for the duration of the illness in accordance with the following provisions:

If the individual has been employed:

Less than one year, two weeks salary;

At least one year but less than four years, one month's salary;

At least four years but less than eight years, three month's salary;

At least eight years but less than 12 years, three month's full salary and an additional three months at one-half salary unless eligible for disability retirement (after ten years);

Twelve years or more, three month's full salary and an additional six months at one-half salary unless eligible for disability retirement.

Part-time faculty with a work commitment of half-time or more are authorized sick leave as outlined above in an amount equivalent to the ratio of the percentage of time employed (work commitment). Only the number of years of continuous employment at a work commitment of half-time or more may be applied.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE: The president may, with the approval of the chancellor and the Board of Regents, grant leaves of absence, with or without pay, to members of the faculty. Leaves are granted only for the purpose of promoting scholarly work and encouraging professional development. The Medical College does not have a sabbatical leave policy at this time.

RETIREMENT PLAN: Participation is required for all who have a work commitment of half-time or more. Members contribute 6% of monthly gross salary and the State contributes an additional amount (ranging from 6.83% in 1945 to 9.35% currently). The minimum requirement for service retirement is ten years of creditable service and age 60. Minimum requirement for disability retirement and survivors benefit is also ten years of creditable service. Members under age 60 who leave our employment with ten or more years of creditable service may freeze their membership and credits until they reach age 60. Members who leave our employment with less than ten years of creditable service may withdraw member contributions and earned interest upon application.

DEATH BENEFITS: After one year of service, a sum equivalent to one month's gross salary is paid to the surviving spouse; after two years, two month's salary; after three or more years, three month's salary.

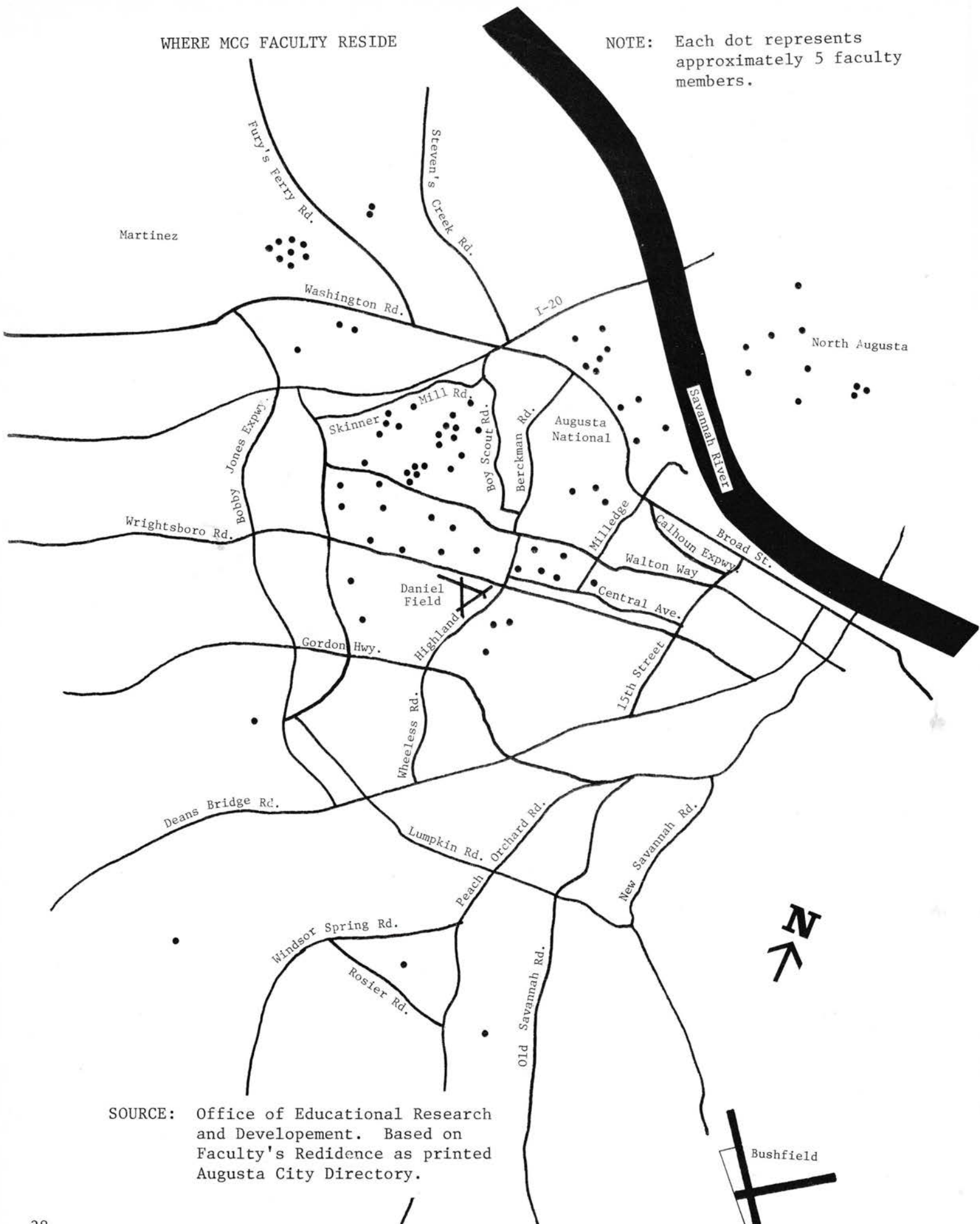

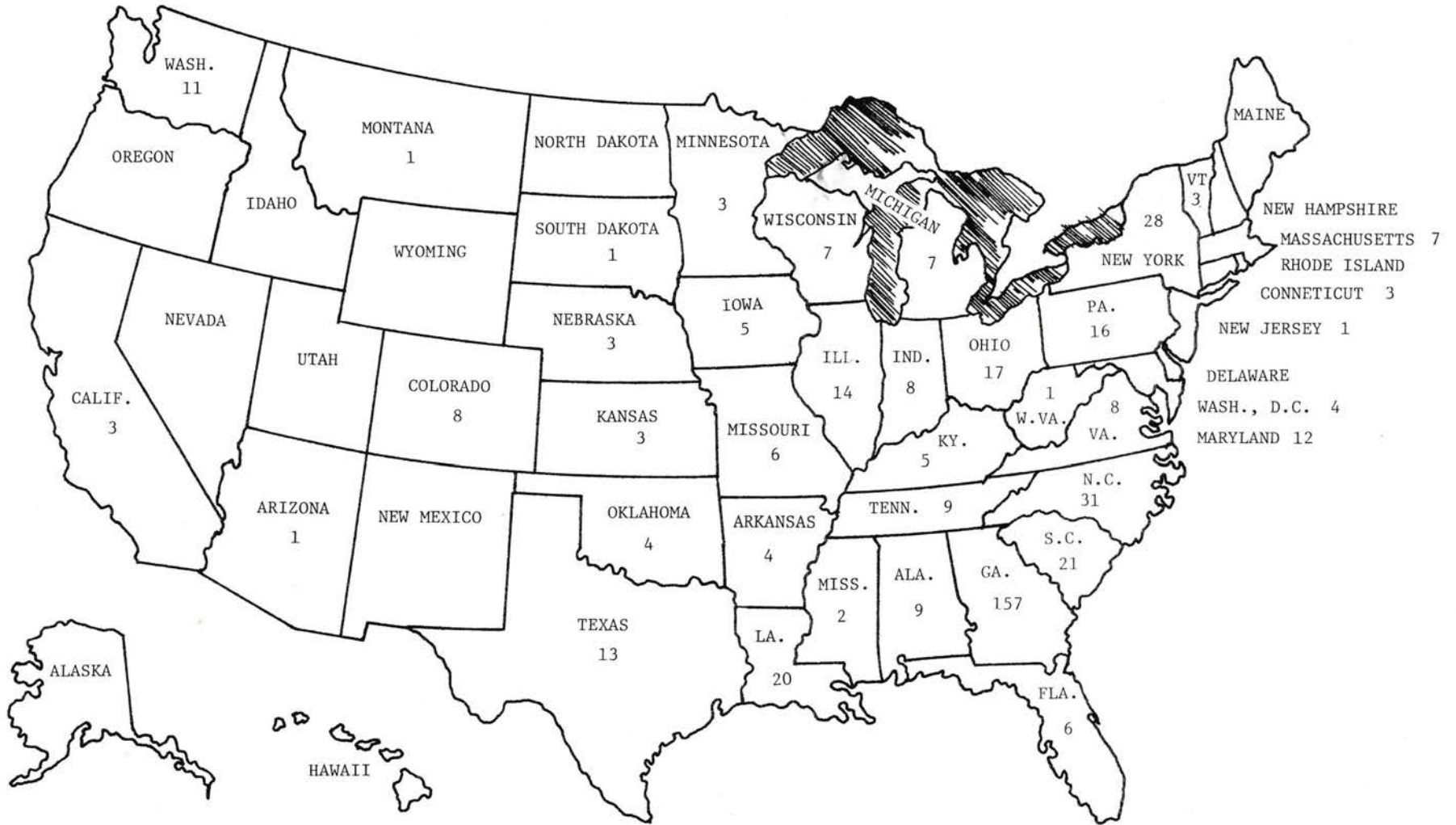

### Location of Institutions Conferring Highest Degree to Teaching Faculty

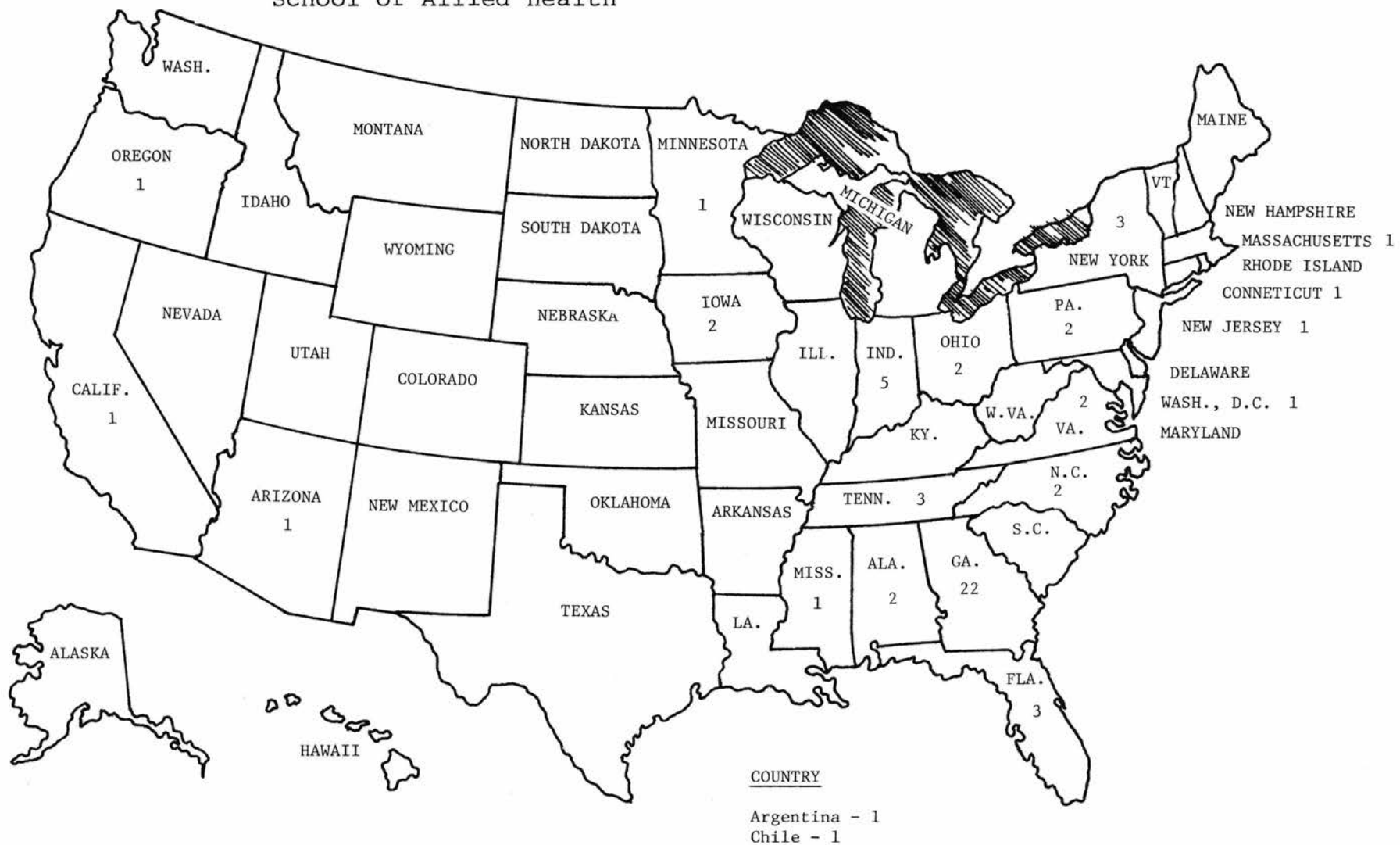

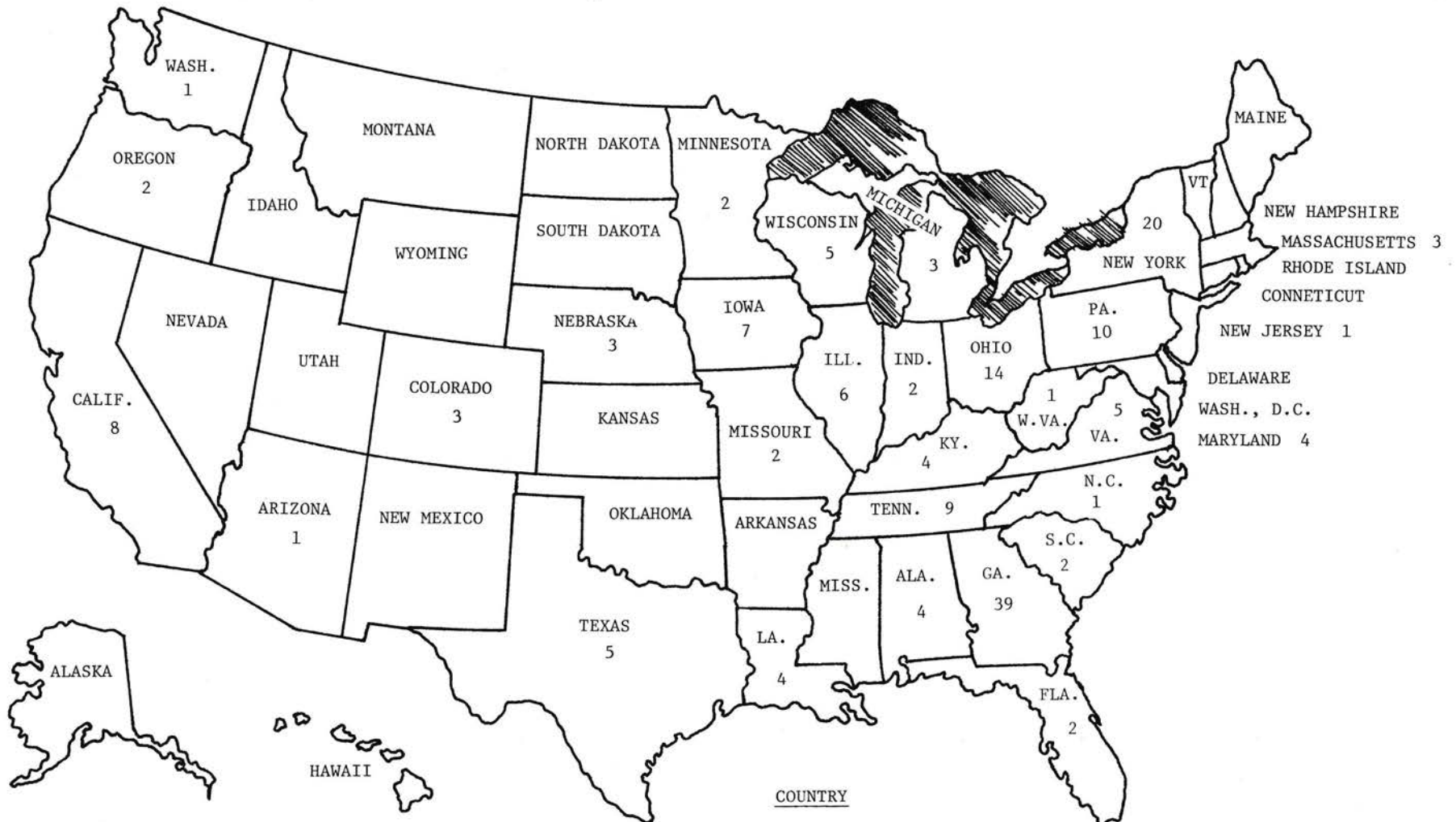
# Location of Institutions Conferring Highest Degree to Teaching Faculty

## Location of Institutions Conferring Highest Degree to Teaching Faculty

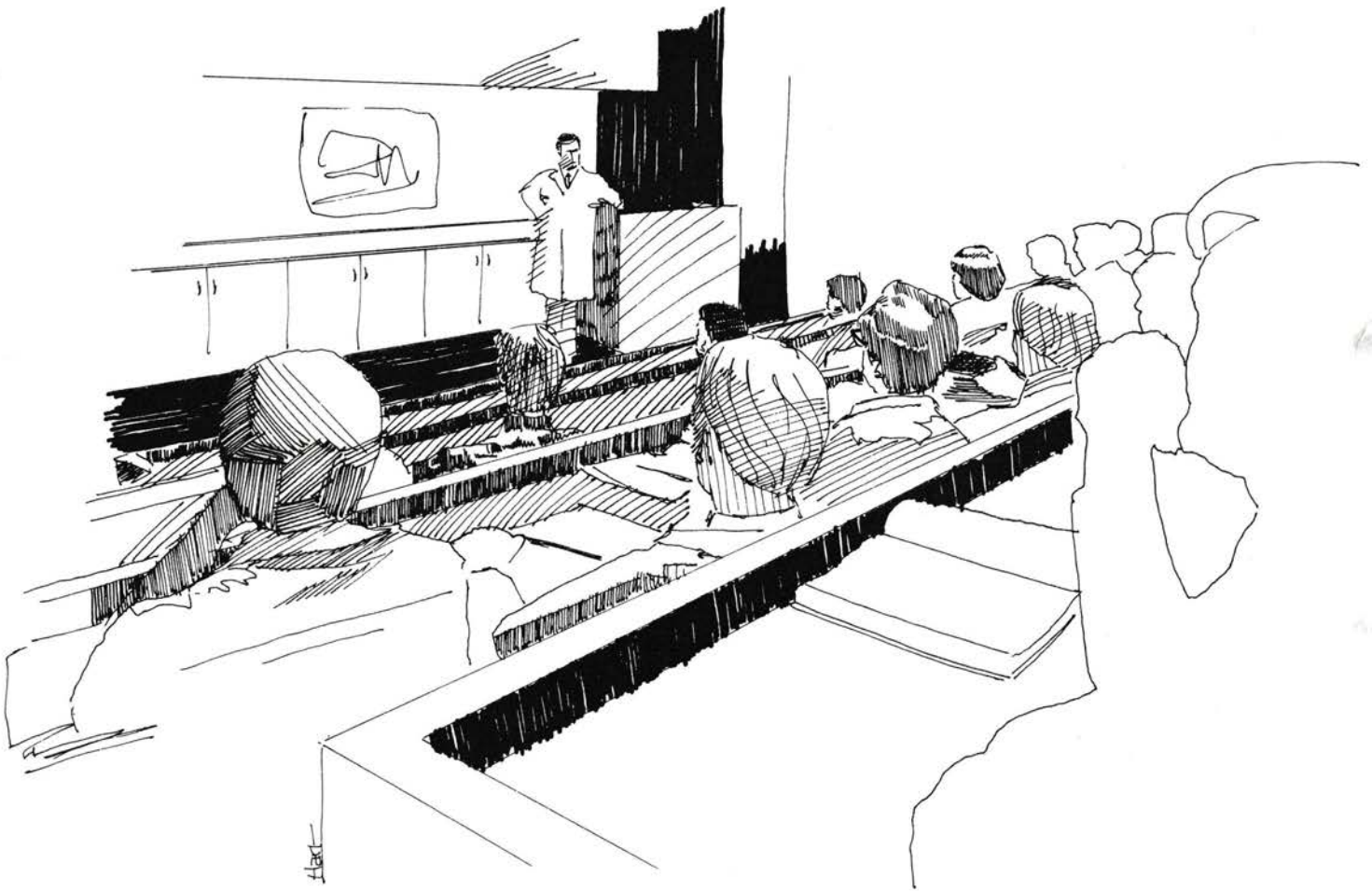

# Continuing Education 6

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CONTINUING EDUCATION INFORMATION  
1976 - 1977

In accordance with the policies of the University System of Georgia, continuing education at the Medical College of Georgia officially includes all education and training designed for all individuals and groups with the exception of education developed for students enrolled in MCG degree-credit courses and MCG employees. However, when it is considered desirable, educational activities designed for faculty and/or other employees of the Medical College of Georgia may be classified as continuing education provided that the training meets the established criteria for continuing education courses.

At the Medical College of Georgia, the Division of Continuing Education is assigned the major responsibility for compliance with the various administrative, academic, and financial policies relating to the presentation of continuing education programs. In addition, the Division of Continuing Education is to make the presentation of continuing education courses as attractive and as easy as possible for the various schools and other institution-wide divisions.

Most continuing education programs presented by the Medical College of Georgia are originated and planned within one of its schools, and these courses are announced as being presented by the school that develops the course. The administrative officer for continuing education in each school must agree for his school to be designated as presenting or sponsoring a course before this designation is made. Units of the Medical College of Georgia other than a school may originate and plan continuing education courses provided that they have the appropriate administrative approval to perform this function, and the course developed by these other units are presented under the sponsorship of the Medical College of Georgia. In addition, it should be emphasized that the Medical College of Georgia enthusiastically recognizes that the most effective way to present many courses is to develop them with other organizations and to share the sponsorship of these courses with the other organizations.

All announcements and/or advertisements of continuing education courses presented by the Medical College of Georgia are to be made through the Division of Continuing Education. This procedure is essential for adherence to the policies of MCG and the University System of Georgia.

The individuals eligible to attend each continuing education program of the Medical College of Georgia are determined jointly by the course director, the administrative officer for continuing education in the respective school, and the Division of Continuing Education.

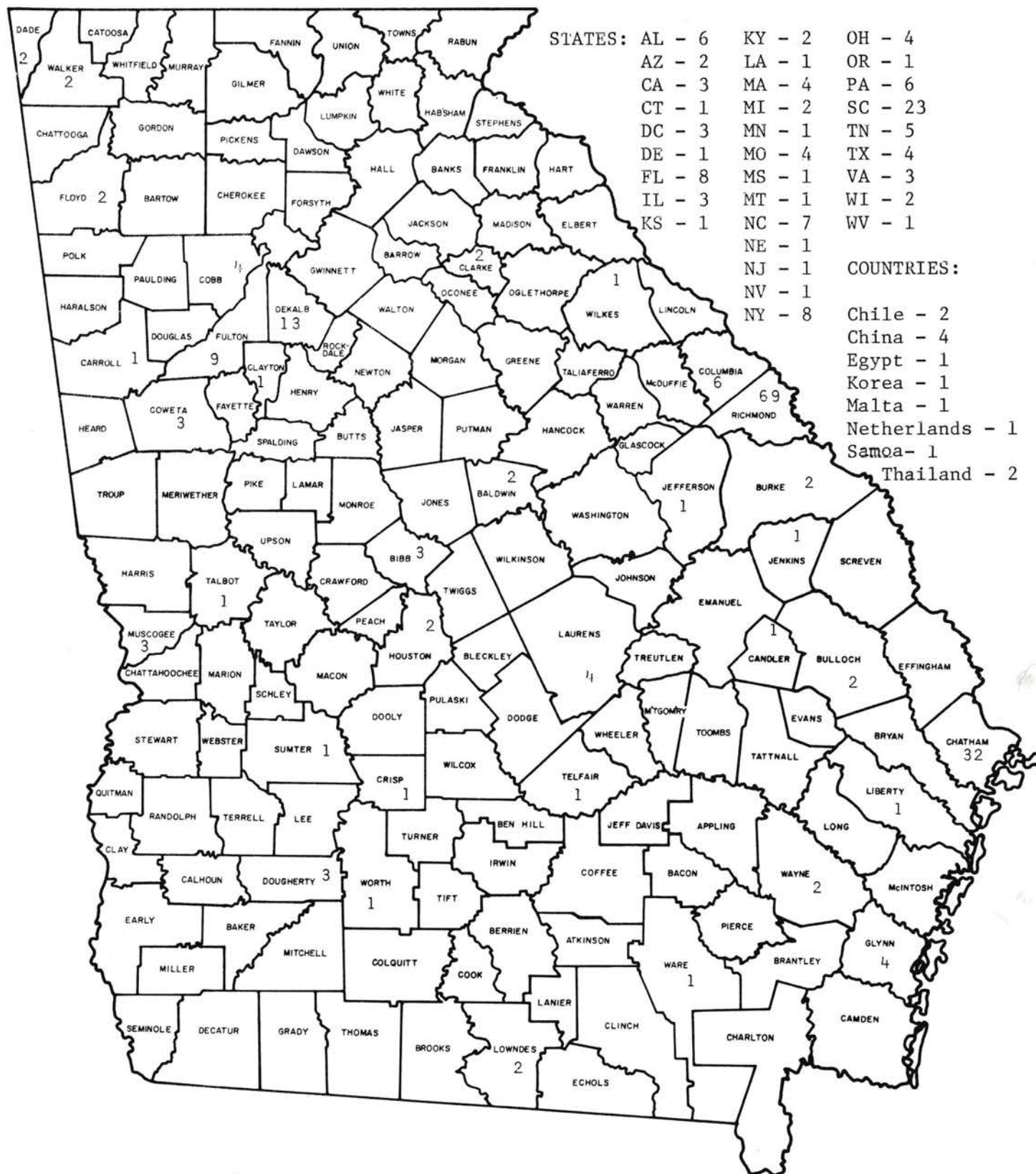

## STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS AND ACTIVITIES

The Medical College of Georgia has a variety of student organizations and activities available for interested students. In addition to those shown below, students are encouraged to contact the Office of Campus Activities for information on other available activities.

### Student Council

As an effort to unify and more adequately serve the entire student body of the Medical College, the Student Council was formed in the academic year of 1967-68. This governmental body has been given complete authority for the administration of the student activity fees within the general guidelines for the use of State funds. The Student Council is made up of elected representatives from each of the schools and departments of the college.

The Student Council sponsors many activities including athletic programs, social and cultural entertainment, Cadaver and Aesculapian, and a broad area concerning student health, student housing and parking areas. Hence, the Student Council is responsible for many of the benefits and privileges each MCG student enjoys.

The Student Council also serves as a primary link between students, administration and faculty. Numerous changes have been brought about through meaningful discussion with the receptive faculty and administration of MCG.

Meetings are held monthly in the Student Center and are open to any student who wishes to attend. Information of meeting times is posted around campus and/or may be obtained by calling the Student Council Office on the 2nd floor of the Student Center, extension 3357.

### American Student Dental Association

The local American Student Dental Association chapter was organized on campus in May, 1970. Objectives of this organization are to further the dissemination of dental knowledge among the members and to inculcate an appreciation of the benefits and responsibilities of dental organization.

### Student American Medical Association

The local chapter of the Student American Medical Association was founded in 1950 with the following objectives: to represent and promote the collective interests of this society to advance the profession of medicine, to contribute to the welfare and education of medical students, interns and residents, to familiarize its members with the purposes and ideals of medicine, and to prepare its members to meet the social, moral and ethical obligations of the medical profession.



### Student Nurses Association

All students in the School of Nursing are eligible for membership in the State and National Student Nurses Association.

### Graduate Student Association

The Graduate Council was formed by the students of the School of Graduate Studies for the purpose of promoting recognition of the graduate school, to formulate and submit recommendations reflecting the will and best interests of the graduate student body to the faculty and administration of the college, and to promote closer relations among graduate students, faculty, administrators and all other students at the Medical College of Georgia. Membership is open to all students enrolled in the School of Graduate Studies.

### Other Student Organizations

Other student organizations to which a student may belong include the Black Student Medical Alliance, Campus Crusade for Christ, Christian Medical Society, Wesley Foundation, Duplicate Bridge Club, various clubs related to specific allied health fields (Junior American Dental Hygienists' Association, Student Occupational Therapy Organization, etc.) and special interest clubs.

### Publications

MCG students publish the Aesculapian (the yearbook) and the Cadaver (a newspaper printed several times annually). These publications are made available to all students, and any MCG student interested in becoming a member of a publication staff should contact the appropriate editor.

The editors of the Aesculapian and the Cadaver are selected by the Publications Board which is composed of student members from each school, the Student Council Chairman, and the Chairman of the Faculty Student Affairs Committee. The Coordinator of Campus Activities and the faculty advisors for each publication are ex-officio members. Editors are chosen by the Board in the spring after appropriate notice has been made through campus publicity about the application process and deadline.

Offices for both the Cadaver and the Aesculapian are located on the second floor of the Student Center.

### Student Affairs Committee

The MCG Faculty Senate has established, as one of four standing faculty committees, a Committee on Student Affairs. In part, this committee is responsible for:

1. Working via the director of student affairs and the Student Council chairman to coordinate committee activities with the activities of the Student Council and other student groups.
2. Reviewing and making recommendations concerning regulations regarding student life and activities, insofar as they are properly subject to the jurisdiction of the college.
3. Reviewing and making recommendations concerning general college policies relating to student disciplinary action, including standards and hearing

3. procedures, and to consider student disciplinary questions concerning more than one school.

Students are encouraged to contact committee members with ideas and suggestions related to committee areas of responsibility.

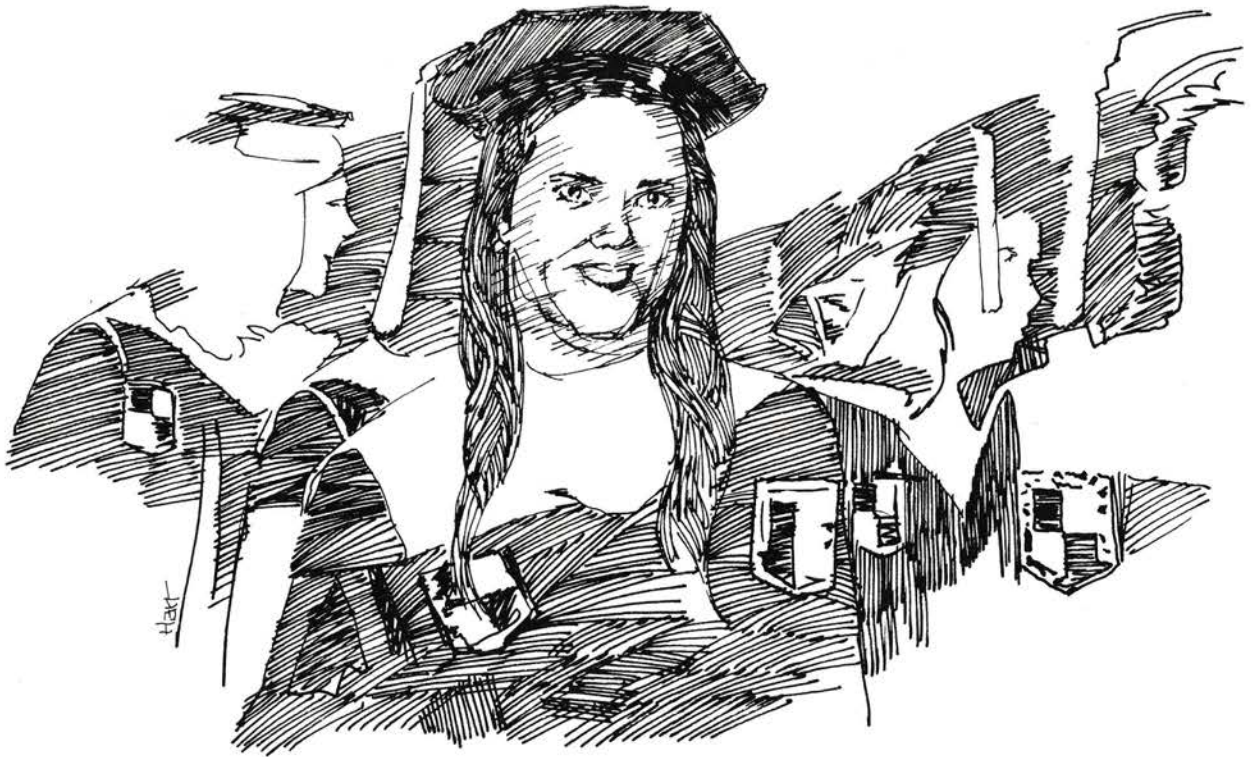

## MCG CLASSIFIED EMPLOYEES - DEFINITIONS

The following definitions of MCG classified employees are based on federal Equal Employment Opportunity guidelines.

### 1. Executive, Administrative and Managerial

Includes individuals whose assignments require primary (and major) responsibility for management of the institution, or a customarily recognized department or subdivision thereof. Assignments may require the performance of work directly related to management policies or general business operations of the institution or the performance of functions in the administration of a department or subdivision thereof directly related to academic instruction. It is assumed that assignments in this category customarily and regularly require the incumbent to exercise discretion and independent judgment, and to direct the work of others. Included in this category are supervisory personnel of the technical, clerical, craft, and custodial force.

### 2. Professional

Includes individuals whose assignments require knowledge of an advanced type in a field of science or learning associated with research, business, health, guidance, etc., and which are not classified as administrative or faculty. Included are persons whose principal activity is of a professional nature associated with original and creative work in an artistic field, or with organized research projects. Assignment in this category requires bachelor's, master's or doctoral degrees or their equivalent. Included are full-time librarians and graduate research assistants whose research is not primarily for the purpose of fulfilling the requirements for an advanced degree but for whom the employer-employee relationship can be clearly established or defined.

### 3. Clerical and Secretarial

Included are individuals whose assignments typically are associated with clerical activities and those which are specifically of a secretarial nature. Included are assignments in which personnel are responsible for internal and external communications, recording and retrieval of data

(other than computer programmers) and/or information and other paper work required in an office, such as bookkeepers, stenographers, clerk typists, office-machine operators, statistical clerks, payroll clerks, etc. Included also are sales clerks such as those employed full-time in the bookstore, and library clerks who are not recognized as librarians.

#### 4. Technical and Paraprofessionals

Included are individuals whose assignments require specialized knowledge or skills which may be acquired through experience or academic work such as is offered by many technical institutes, junior colleges or through equivalent on-the-job training. Included are computer programmers and operators, draftsmen, engineering aides, junior engineers, mathematical aides, licensed, practical or vocational nurses, dieticians, photographers, scientific assistants, radio operators, technical illustrators, technicians (medical, dental, electronic-physical sciences), and similar occupations not properly classifiable in other occupational-activity categories but which are institutionally defined as technical assignments. Included also are personnel who may lack the usual educational requirements but who, due to some special skill, experience or need of the institution, hold positions and perform functions generally held by professionals only and therefore are classified as paraprofessionals.

#### 5. Crafts and Trades including Maintenance

Includes individuals whose assignments typically require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the process involved in the work, acquired through on-the-job training and experience or through apprenticeship or other formal training programs. Included are mechanics and repairmen, electricians, stationary engineers, skilled machinists, carpenters, compositors and type-setters, etc.

#### 6. Service Workers

Includes individuals whose assignments require limited degrees of previously acquired skills and knowledge and in which workers perform duties which result in or contribute to the comfort, convenience, hygiene or safety of personnel and the student body or which contribute to the upkeep and care of buildings, facilities or grounds of the institutional property. Included are chauffeurs, laundry and dry cleaning operatives, cafeteria and restaurant workers, truck drivers, bus drivers, garage laborers, custodial personnel, gardeners and groundskeepers, refuse collectors, construction laborers, etc.

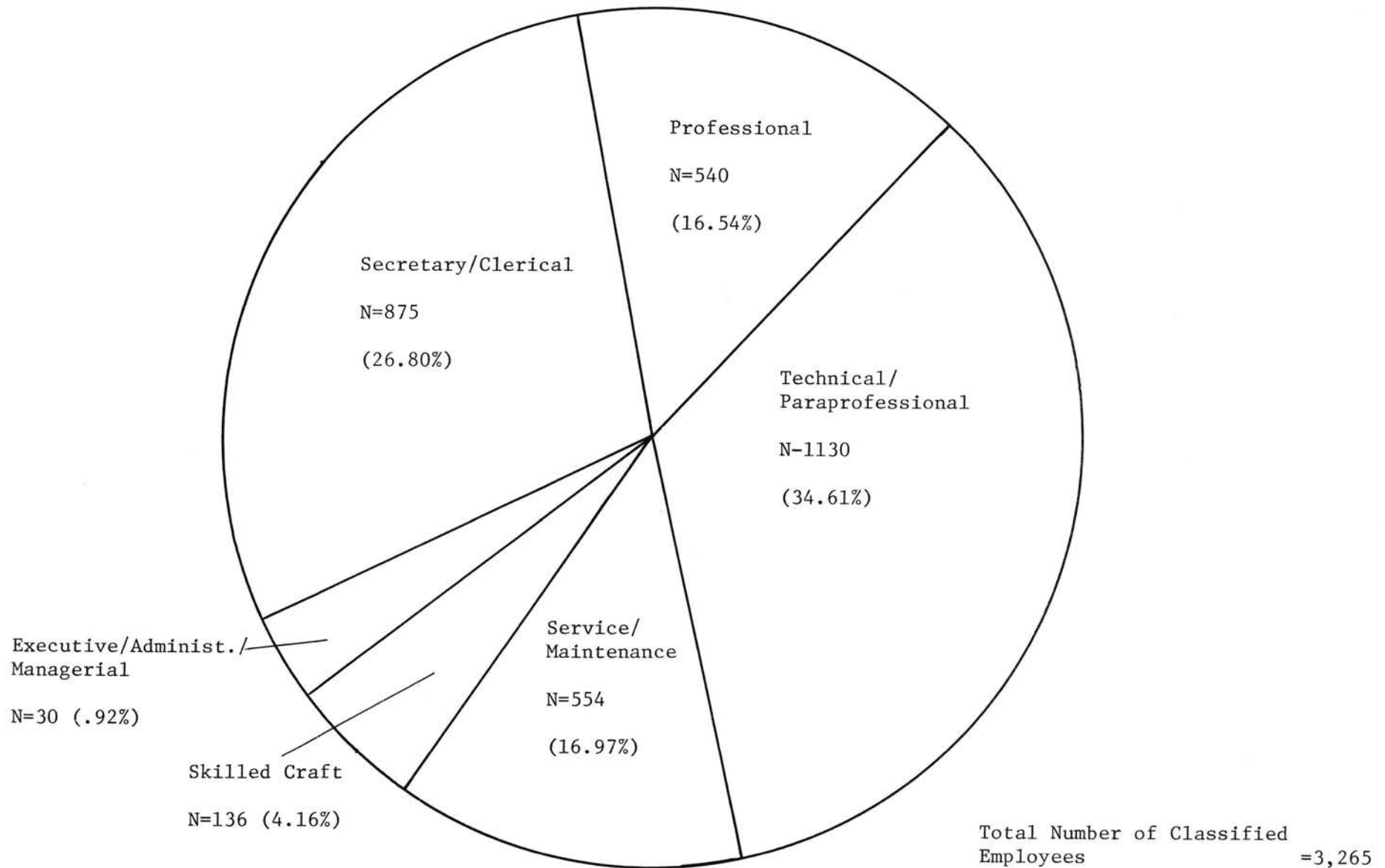

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION	Full coverage for on-the-job injuries as specified by the Georgia Employment Security Law.
HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE	Regular/Permanent employees with a work commitment of half-time or more have their choice of two Blue Cross/Blue Shield hospitalization insurance plans, including dependent coverage and major medical benefits. The Medical College of Georgia pays the cost of the <u>individual</u> employee coverage in full and \$33.40 towards the cost of family coverage.
LIFE INSURANCE	MCG provides free Basic Life and Accidental Death and Dismemberment Insurance. Supplemental Life Insurance and Dependent Life Insurance available at reasonable group rates.
LONG TERM DISABILITY INSURANCE	Available at group rates to all employees earning \$15,000 PA. Must have a work commitment of half-time or more.
GROUP ACCIDENT INSURANCE	Available at group rates to all employees working half-time or more.
DEATH BENEFITS FOR SURVIVING SPOUSE	Employed: 1 year but less than 2 = a sum equivalent to one month's salary 2 years but less than 3 = a sum equivalent to two month's salary 3 years or more = a sum equivalent to three month's salary

NOTE: Completion of the Ga. State Security Questionnaire, Loyalty Oath, pre-employment physical exam (or employee Statement of Health, where applicable), and participation in Teacher's Retirement by all eligible employees are conditions of employment.

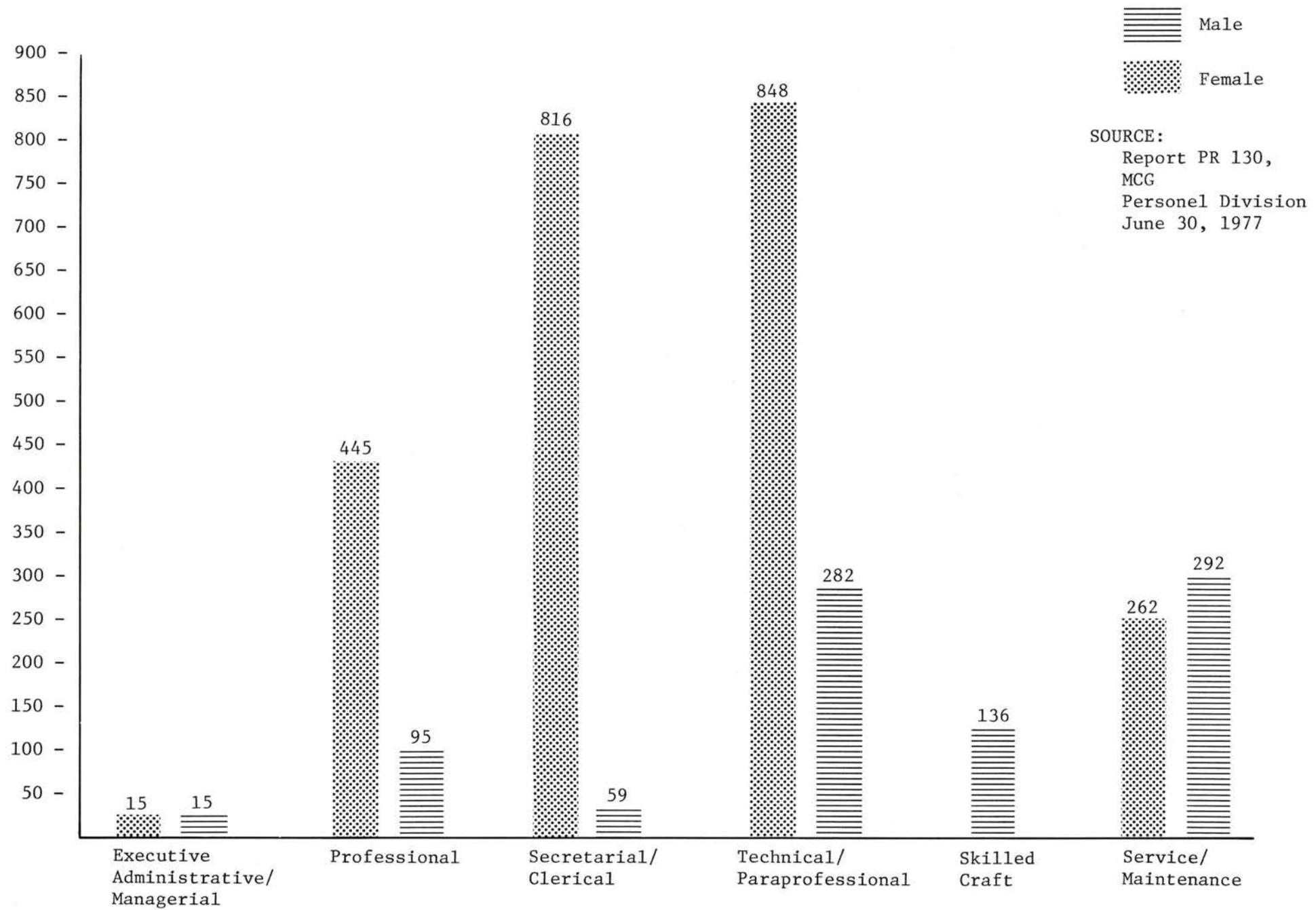

1976-1977

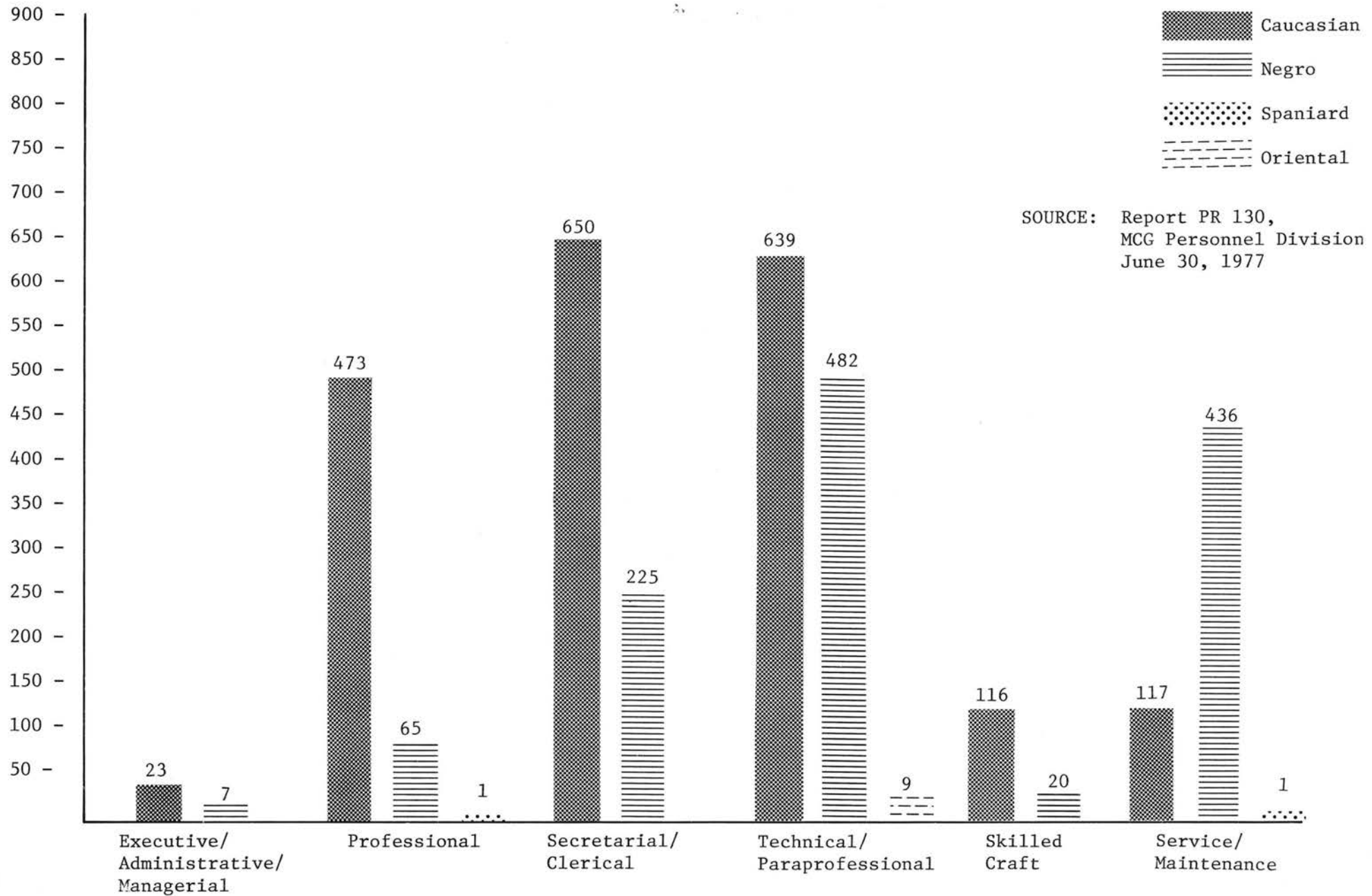

## CLASSIFIED PERSONNEL SAMPLE SURVEY

In October, 1977, the Office of Educational Research and Development compiled data on a ten percent sample of Medical College Classified Employees to determine age, education, and experience at MCG. A systematic sample was chosen by selecting every tenth classified employee from Report PR 220 (Alphabetical Employee Listing). Information on education, years of experience at MCG, and sex was then obtained from Personnel on each employee in the sample with data current as of October, 1977. A total of three hundred and thirty-seven classified employees were included in the study.

Findings based on the sample population only were as follows:

- 86.6% of the classified employees in the sample had at least a high school degree and 23.8% had an associate college degree or higher.
- 48.7% of the employees in the sample were under age 30.
- 71.0% of the employees in the sample had been employed five years of less.

Findings according to job category yielded the following results:

Of the total 329 employees who could be categorized\*, 3% were Executive/Administrative/Managerial, 14.9% were Professional, 27.4% were Secretary/Clerical, 31% were Technical/Professional, 4.9% were Skilled Craft, and 18.8% were Service Maintenance. A summary of the data on the classified employees in the sample study can be read in the following Table.

## RELATIONSHIP OF LIBRARY AND INSTITUTION

The Medical College of Georgia Library functions primarily as a support unit for the Schools of Medicine, Dentistry, Nursing, Allied Health, and Graduate Studies, in the general areas of instruction, research and patient care. The Library acquires catalogs, stores, retrieves, and generally exercises bibliographic control over both print and non-print information materials in support of the above programs. The staff works side by side with students and health care practitioners to determine their needs and the availability of information to satisfy those needs. Being responsible for the knowledge of availability of health information requires the Library to form a close relationship with the Divisions of Health Communications, Computer Services, and Institutional Relations, since these divisions are interested in the production and distribution (usually electronic) of health information. Being responsible for providing the resources to expand the knowledge of not only students, but also health care practitioners around the state, necessitates the Library to form a bond with the Division of Continuing Education, thereby establishing programs designed to promote the Library as a state-wide information resource. Students may provide feedback to the Library directly, or through the Division of Student Affairs. This latter feedback normally occurs through student representation on the Library Committee. This committee reports to the Provost and meets on a regular basis. Its members are charged to act as a liaison with library users and to make policy recommendations to the Provost.

Since the Library must respond to the needs of its users, it must be in a position to anticipate these needs and thereby build its collection to provide the most usable resources. In order to do this, the library faculty need to be kept abreast of the workings of curriculum committees where curriculum modifications and new programs are approved, so that materials can be purchased, collections developed, and services begun or discontinued in close support of the curriculum. (At this time, only the School of Allied Health Sciences has identified the same need to have a member of the Library act as an ex-officio member of the school-wide Curriculum Committee.

The Director of Libraries reports directly to the Provost. It is here that plans regarding both budget and program direction are developed. The Library is also represented on the Executive Committee which consists, for the most part, of Deans and Division Directors, and serves as a monthly meeting for exchanging ideas and information on items of school-wide interest. No representation is currently available with the Senior Administrative Group.

All library staff members with faculty status are represented in the Medical College of Georgia Faculty Organization as part of a body currently numbering fifty-seven members, referred to as non-school faculty. The rights in the organization are similar to all other groups. Members may hold elected office and are encouraged to participate in committee activities.

## FISCAL ASPECTS

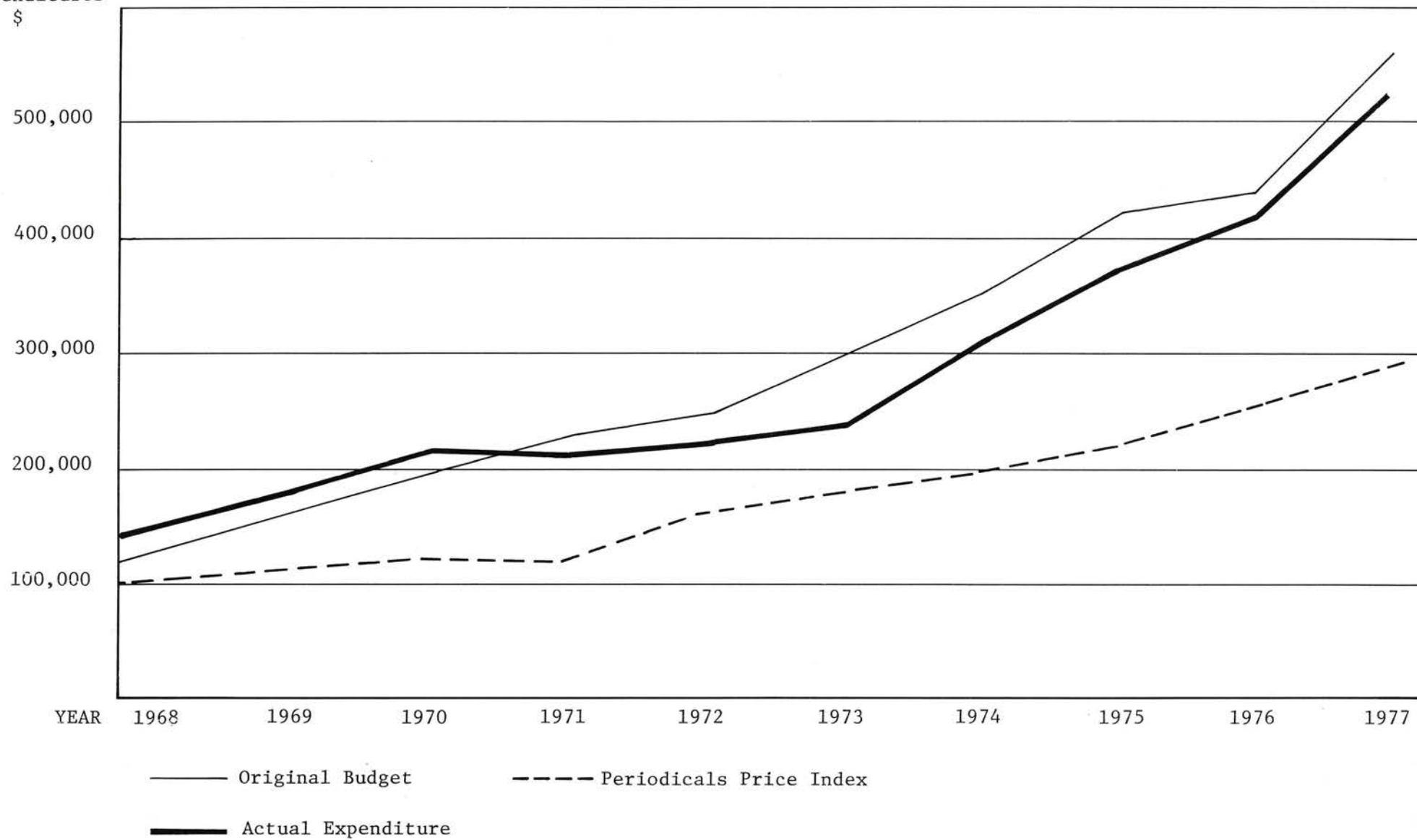
The MCG Library has been traditionally modestly supported with the growth in the 1960s to a health sciences university library. The support became less than adequate. Recent support has allowed for growth relative to the past situation; however, there is much more support needed.

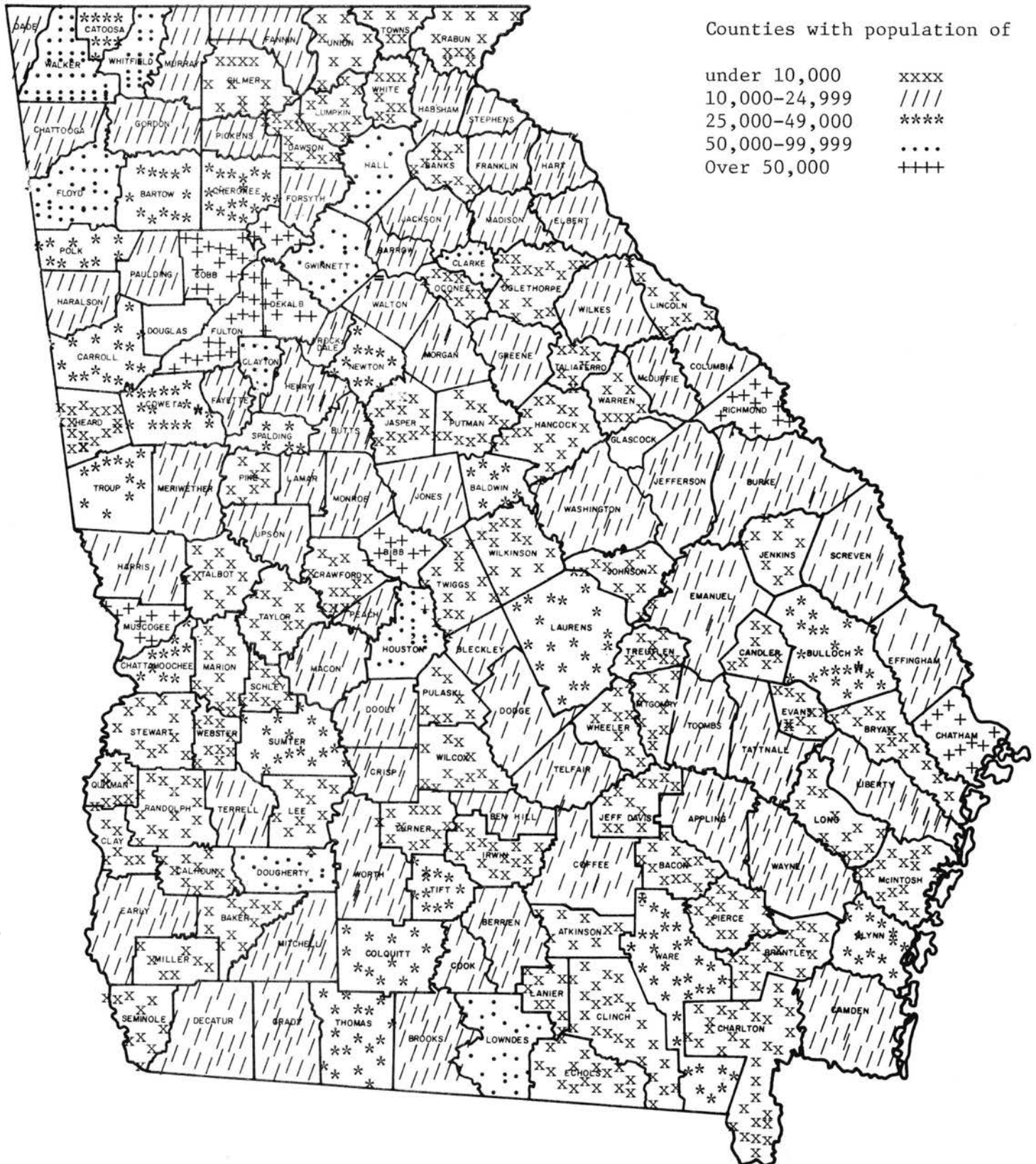

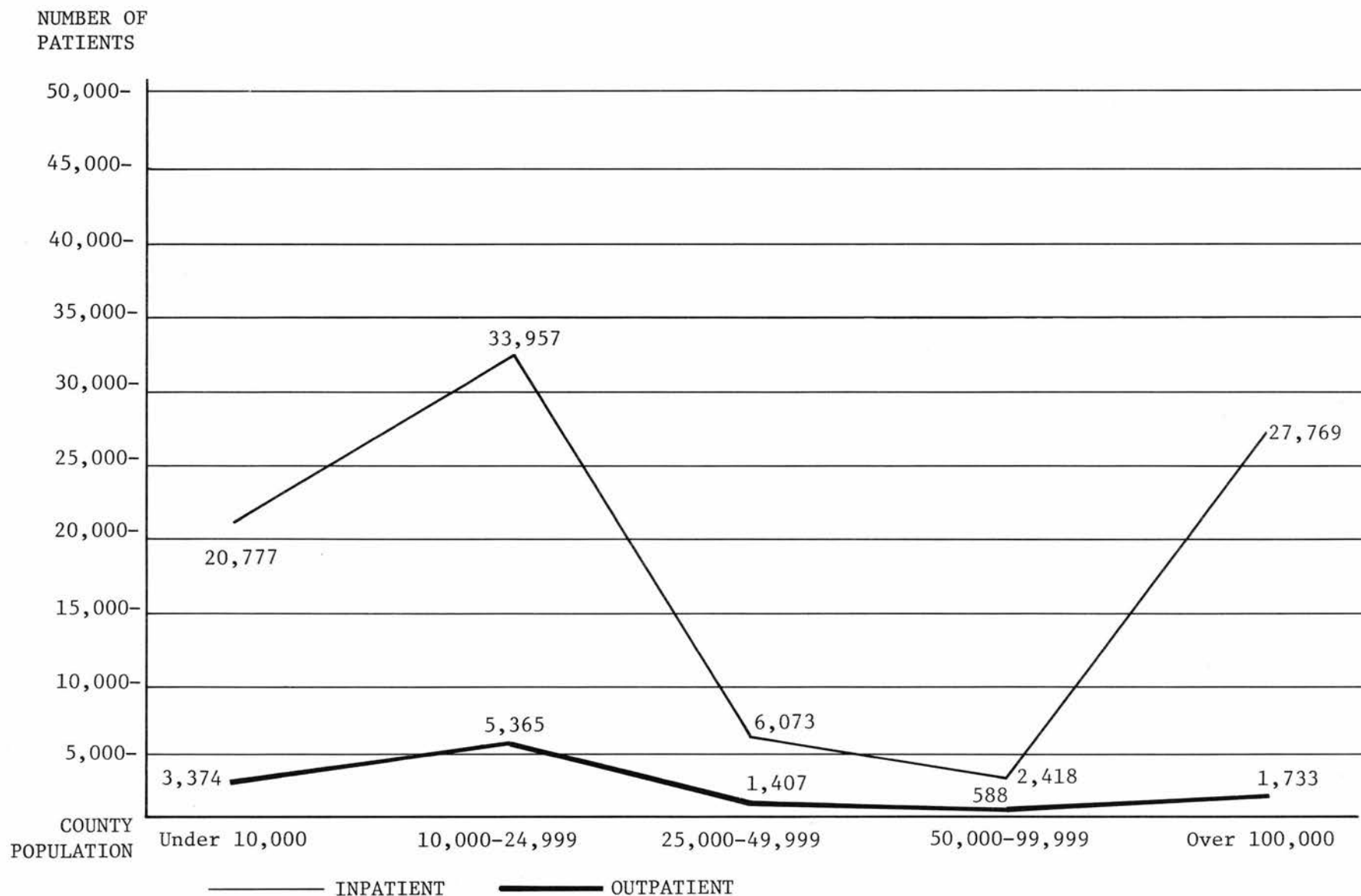

BY COUNTY POPULATIONS



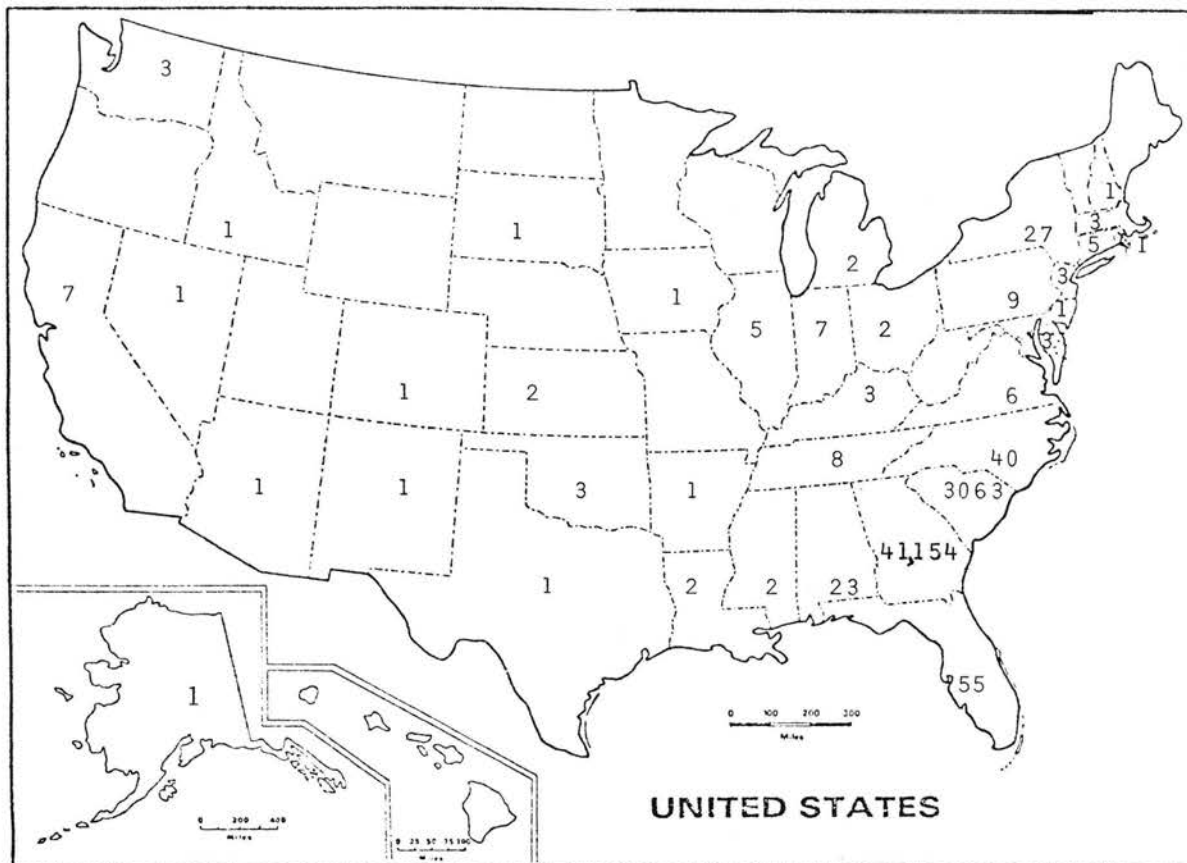
