


AUGUSTA, GEORGIA

Augusta is located on the south bank of the Savannah River midway between the Great Smokey Mountains and the Atlantic coast. It is a crossroads of major highways from: Atlanta, 157 miles west; Savannah, 133 miles southeast; and Columbia, South Carolina, 72 miles east. Augusta is the second largest metropolitan market in Georgia and is also a major medical center with nine local hospitals that serve the entire southeast.

Founded in 1736 by General James E. Oglethorpe, Augusta is Georgia's second oldest city. Oglethorpe named the city for Princess Augusta, wife of the Prince of Wales. Augusta served as the capital of Georgia in 1778 and again from 1785 to 1796.

Augusta, "The Garden City," is a blend of cultures with progressive new architecture, historic neighborhoods, wide parklike streets, museums, and the acclaimed Augusta National Golf Course.

65 public schools in Richmond and Columbia counties; a number of vocational and technical schools, of which two are a part of the public school system; 18 parochial and private schools; one public and one private liberal arts college and one health sciences university. **FDUCATION**

FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS

Four banks (51 branches), with total assets of nearly \$15 billion, include the state Citizens and Southern National Bank system, First National Bank of Atlanta state system, Georgia Railroad Bank and Trust Company, and First National Bank of Augusta. Three savings and loan associations (18 branches), with total assets of more than 4.3 billion, are located in Augusta. Each of the four banks has 24-hour instant banker services at a central location on the Medical College of Georgia campus.

All major professional sports in Atlanta are within easy access. Full schedule of intercollegiate spectator sports is maintained. Greater Augusta Arts Council, Augusta Opera Association, Augusta Symphony Orchestra, Augusta College and Paine College Lyceum Series, Augusta Choral Society, Augusta Players, Fort Gordon Players, children's theater group, one ballet company, others.

EMPLOYMENT

HOSPITALS

More than 15,000 people are employed in the medical community in Richmond County.

Dwight David Eisenhower Army Medical Center - Built at a cost of approximately 60 million dollars, this tertiary care facility opened in 1976. The Center is accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals and American College of Pathology. It has a capacity of 755 beds, currently operates 461 beds and provides outpatient services from 45 clinics. The Center provides seven residency training programs, operates an accredited LPN school, and participates in the training of physicians, nurses, dietitians, and social workers enrolled at MCG and the University of Georgia. The Medical Center is the focus of a seven-state Southeastern Army referral area and a three-state Department of Defense area. Georgia Regional Hospital - The Georgia Regional Hospital a Augusta is a state-supported, multi-purpose psychiatric hospital opened in April 1969 and designed to provide necessary psychiatric, medical, social, educational and rehabilitative services directed toward returning patients to the community as participating members. Employing 485, the hospital is a licensed 355-bed mental hospital facility with 270 beds currently available for use that provides short-term, intensive care for the 23-county East Central area. All hospital programs are fully accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

Gracewood State School and Hospital - Opened in 1921, Gracewood provides treatment for the mentally retarded and is funded by state and federal funds. The residential units currently accommodate approximately 700 patients and employ 1,546 people. Gracewood is administered by the Division of Mental Health/Mental Retardation, Georgia Department of Human Resources and serves persons of all age levels with all degrees of mental retardation and with a wide range of physical disabilities associated with mental retardation.

Humana Hospital - Opened in November 1973 as Doctor's Hospital of Augusta, Humana is a general acute care hospital accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. Humana Hospital has 301 beds and employs 750 in its six-story building. St. Joseph Hospital - A Catholic hospital operated by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet since December 1952, St. Joseph is a general hospital accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. The 235-bed facility employs 956 and has an outpatient clinic for ambulatory patients offering inhalation therapy, physical therapy, speech therapy, social services, day surgery and a cardiac lab. A wing was recently completed that houses the hospital's administrative and business offices and patient rooms.

Talmadge Memorial Hospital - As a unit of the Medical College of Georgia, Talmadge Memorial Hospital, with 520 beds and 80 clinics, is a major tertiary referral center. It is accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals and opened in 1956. Because of the expertise of the medical staff of the hospital, physicians throughout the state of Georgia refer patients to Talmadge for the specialized services available. Talmadge also serves the Medical College of Georgia as a primary teaching hospital, providing clinical experience in support of programs conducted by the Schools of Allied Health Sciences, Dentistry, Medicine and Nursing. The hospital and clinics employ over 3,200.

University Hospital - Established in 1818, University Hospital operates under the direction of the Richmond County Hospital Authority and is accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. A 10-story physical plant opened in December 1970 provides 615 general and 75 psychiatric hospital beds. The hospital also operates Health Central, a wellness center, which is designed to increase wellness through education, disease prevention and the promotion of good health habits. An Ambulatory Care Center was constructed in 1980 to house the clinics, emergency departments and support services. University Hospital employs 3,000. Veterans Administration Medical Center - Two divisions of the VA Hospital are located in Augusta. The Uptown Division (Lerwood) has 622 beds plus a 40-bed nursing home; the newly constructed Downtown Division, which replaced the Forest Hills Division, has 420 beds. The combined employment of both facilities is over 2,300. Twenty-three rooms of X-ray equipment, a special animal research wing and a 60-bed spinal cord injury unit are part of the Downtown facility.

NURSING HOMES

Approximately 980 beds are provided by Richmond County's nine nursing homes.

PRIVATE PHYSICIANS/DENTISTS

Richmond County has approximately 450 medical doctors with private practices and more than 100 dentists.


STATE AND REGIONAL HEALTH CENTERS

Among the several state and regional centers located in Augusta are the Poison Control Center, Regional Radiation Therapy Center, and the Kidney Dialysis Referral Center. In 1981 Talmadge Hospital's Trauma Unit was designated as the East Central Georgia Trauma Center. Talmadge operates one of two active burn centers in the state and is one of five hospitals in the state providing tertiary care for critically ill newborns.

STATE HEALTH SCIENCES UNIVERSITY

The Medical College of Georgia (MCG) is the eleventh-oldest medical teaching institution in the nation and the region's leader for medical research in many health fields. The state-supported institution, chartered in 1828 as an academy offering a single course of lectures, consists of the Schools of Allied Health Sciences, Dentistry, Graduate Studies, Medicine, and Nursing. MCG's annual budget of approximately \$166 million includes almost \$8 million in new grants and awards. The college provides education for approximately 2,000 students, while supplying jobs for more than 5,000 employees, interns and residents.

PROFILE OF THE MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA

TYPE

The Medical College of Georgia is a state-supported institution - unique in the fact that it is the only public health sciences university in Georgia. It is a unit of the University System of Georgia.

PURPOSE

To provide health education and training for prospective practitioners, scientists and educators at the undergraduate, graduate, postgraduate and continuing education levels.

To promote scholarly inquiry in the biological sciences and provide leadership in the generation of basic knowledge of human biology and behavior in health and disease.


To exercise leadership in the development of new educational approaches for the health professions and in the application of new knowledge and technology.

LOCATION

The campus, situated in the approximate center of Augusta, is convenient to downtown and is accessible to suburban businesses and shops.

SIZE

The present five-school campus consists of 76 buildings, including a 520 bed teaching hospital, on approximately 81 acres of land. In addition, 1 building and almost 94 acres comprise the Animal Care Facility at Gracewood. The College also occupies 1 building in Athens. There are more than 7300 students and employees at MCG, which includes 1958 students, 4189 classified employees, 402 interns and residents, and 775 full-time and part-time faculty. In addition, there are approximately 750 volunteer faculty.



SCHOOLS

ALLIED HEALTH SCIENCES: Established as a separate school by Board of Regents in January 1968 incorporating programs already established at MCG. First degree awarded in 1964.

DENTISTRY: Established by Board of Regents in 1965. First students accepted in 1969. First degree awarded in 1973.

GRADUATE STUDIES: Established as a separate school by Board of Regents in 1965. Programs formerly offered under Graduate Division. First Master's degree awarded in 1951; first Ph.D in 1966.

MEDICINE: Established by legislative act in 1828. First degree awarded in 1833.

NURSING: Begun in 1943 (first degree awarded in 1945) at the University of Georgia in Athens; moved to MCG campus in Augusta in 1956. First baccalaureate nursing degree awarded at MCG in 1957. First M.S.N. degree awarded in 1969.

SYMBOL AND LOGO

The MCG symbol represents infinity--over and under, a never-ending path continually repeating itself--symbolizing man's search for immortality, man's attempt to prolong life through health and

The five poles that make up the entity represent the five areas of study that make up the whole-the Medical College of Georgia. These poles form a precise, mechanical shape which imparts a scientific "feeling." The abstract quality of the symbol can be likened to a biological unit or an atom, organic because of its round, flowing form; mathematical in its strict geometric pattern.

When the symbol is used in conjunction with the stable, authoritative letterforms of the MCG logo (Craw Clarendon typeface) it becomes a powerful statement of quality and professionalism for the college it represents.

SEAL

Used on official documents, the seal of MCG was adopted by the college in 1975. It is similar to the one used in the earliest days of the institution. The seal bears the words Medical College of Georgia in Latin and the Roman numerals for 1828, the year the college was chartered. The illustration depicts the Old Medical College Building on Telfair Street.



REGALIA

The Medical College of Georgia regalia, rich in symoblism, was originally designed by the late Dr. Walter Shepeard, Professor Emeritus of the School of Medicine. It is based on the coats of arms of three members of the 1832 faculty: Dr. Louis A. Dugas and Drs. Joseph and Paul Fitzsimmons Eve. The official colors of the Medical College, blue and silver, were taken from the Dugas coat of arms.

The top of the cap represents the family coat of arms of Louis A. Dugas. The right side is silver, the left is blue, and a red saltire cross extends into all quadrants. The cap's six corners stand for heroism awards given to the family by France during the First Crusade.

The main part of the hood carries the Dugas colors and the red saltire cross with two attached tags in the front; the right tag represents the family coat of arms of Drs. Joseph and Paul Fitzimmons Eve, and the left tag represents the Dugas family colors. The color of the hood's velvet trim symbolizes the major discipline of the wearer: herbal green for medicine; yellow for science; lilac for dentistry; apricot for nursing; and blue for philosophy. The level of the degree is shown by the size of the hood and the width of the trim, as set by the Intercollegiate Regalia Commission. The bachelor's, master's, and doctor's hoods are three feet, three and one-half feet, and four feet long, respectively. The width of the hood trim is two inches for the bachelor's, three for the master's, and five for the doctor's.


DEFINITIONS

Instructional Faculty - Faculty with an academic appointment whose primary responsibility is not administrative. This includes all faculty at the level of department chairman and below. (Total full-time Instructional Faculty, June 30, 1984 = 597.)

Administrative Faculty - Faculty whose primary responsibility is administrative. This generally includes all faculty above the level of department chairman. Academic Administrators have rank and are responsible for academic programs, i.e., deans, associate deans, etc. General Administrators include all other administrators both with and without academic appointments. (Total Administrative Faculty, June 30, 1984: with Academic Appointment = 44; without Academic Appointment = 28.)

Full-Time Faculty - Faculty on an academic or fiscal year contract whose work commitment is 100%. (Includes MCG/VA faculty whose combined work commitment equals 100%.)

General Programs Faculty - Faculty whose academic appointment is in an area other than in the schools of Allied Health Sciences, Dentistry, Medicine or Nursing. Because the institutional definition for reporting faculty is based on school of primary responsibility rather than school of academic appointment, approximately one-half of the General Programs Faculty are reported either as administrative faculty or as faculty in one of the schools. Therefore, except in the diagram below, General Programs Faculty are not listed separately.





VACATION

All permanent faculty and administrative officers (fiscal year contract) working one-half time or more earn vacation leave. Leave accural is at a rate equal to their current work commitment multiplied by 1.75 days per month. Faculty members who are on an academic year contract do not earn vacation leave.

Permanent full-time faculty personnel: vacation leave each December 31st may not exceed 45 working days.

Permanent part-time faculty personnel (working one-half time or more): maximum accural allowed as of December 31st will be determined by their work commitment as of that date.

Faculty personnel will be paid for all accrued vacation leave (up to the maximum specified above) upon

termination from the Medical College of Georgia for any reason.

Three unscheduled holidays are authorized on the basis of one holiday for each quarter of the first three quarters of the calendar year. Faculty members employed on an academic year basis do not earn unscheduled

SICK LEAVE

All permanent faculty and administrative officers working one-half time or more (including academic year faculty members) earn sick leave. The monthly sick leave accrual will equal the current work commitment multiplied by one day. Accrual shall be cumulative, with no maximum for the faculty member's entire length of continuous service.

Any faculty member unable to return to work after exhausting all accumulated sick leave and accrued vacation leave may be granted sick leave without pay for a period not to exceed one year. An approved sick leave of absence without pay permits a faculty member to continue all group insurance in effect. No additional vacation leave or sick leave will accrue while the member is on sick leave of absence without pay.

MILITARY LEAVE

Leave with pay is authorized for members of a Reserve Component or National Guard as specified in official orders, with a maximum of 15 workdays in any calendar year. Permanent faculty (fiscal year contract) working one-half time or more are authorized military leave with pay.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE

The President may, with the approval of the Chancellor and the Board of Regents, grant leave of absence, with or without pay, to members of the faculty. Leaves are granted only for the purpose of promoting scholarly work and encouraging professional development. The Medical College does not have a sabbatical leave policy at this time.

RETTREMENT PLAN

Participation is required for all who have a work commitment of half-time or more. Members contribute 6% of monthly gross salary and the State contributes an additional amount (ranging from 6.83% in 1945 to 12.67% currently). The minimum requirement for service retirement is ten years of creditable service and age 60, or 30 years of service regardless of age. Minimum requirement for disability retirement and survivors benefit is also ten years of creditable service. Members under age 60 who leave our employment with ten or more years of creditable service may freeze their membership and credits until they reach age 60. Members who leave with less than ten years of creditable service may withdraw contributions and earned interest upon application.

GROUP HOSPITALIZATION Available with dependent coverage and medical benefits at group rates.

LONG TERM DISABILITY INSURANCE

Available at group rates to all faculty earning at least \$10,000 PA. Must also have a work commitment of half-time or more.

GROUP ACCIDENT

Available at group rates to all faculty working half-time or more.

GROUP LIFE INSURANCE

Up to \$15,000 free Basic Life Insurance. Additional Supplemental Insurance up to \$110,000 available based on

salary.

JURY DUTY

Full pay while on jury duty.

SOCIAL SECURITY

Current contribution rates--6.7% of monthly gross salary by employee and 7.0% by MCG (of the first \$37,800 earned).

WORKER'S COMPENSATION Full coverage by the provisions of the Georgia Worker's Compensation Act in the event of an accidental injury

on the job.





MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA DEFINITION OF EMPLOYEE CATEGORIES

(Based on Federal Equal Employment Opportunity Guidelines)

Executive, Administrative and Managerial - Includes all persons whose assignments require primary (and major) responsibility for management of the institution, or a customarily recognized department or subdivision thereof. Assignments require the performance of work directly related to management policies or general business operations of the institution, department or subdivisions, etc. It is assumed that assignments in this category customarily and regularly require the incumbent to exercise discretion and independent judgement, and to direct the work of others.

<u>Professional</u> - Includes persons whose assignments require either college graduation or experience of such kind and amount as to provide a comparable background. Also includes all staff members with assignments requiring specialized professional training.

Clinical and Secretarial - Includes all persons whose assignments typically are associated with clerical activities or are specifically of a secretarial nature. Includes personnel who are responsible for internal and external communications, recording and retrieval of data (other than computer programmers) and/or information and other paper work required in an office.

Technical and Paraprofessionals - Includes all persons whose assignments require specialized knowledge or skills which may be acquired through experience or academic work such as is offered in many two-year technical institutes, junior colleges or through equivalent on-the-job training.

<u>Skilled Crafts</u> - Includes all persons whose assignments typically require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the processes involved in the work, acquired through on-the-job training and experience or through apprenticeship or other formal training programs.

Service/Maintenance - Includes persons whose assignments require limited degrees of previously acquired skills and knowledge and in which workers perform duties which result in or contribute to the comfort, convenience and hygiene of personnel and the student body or which contribute to the upkeep and care of buildings, facilities or grounds of the institutional property.

MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA MEDICAL AND DENTAL RESIDENTS BY POSTGRADUATE TRAINING YEAR AND QUARTER 1983-1984*

Residents are on a yearly contract and do not "enroll" by quarter. This chart shows the presence of residents during quarters at MCG, although the residents' year does not coincide with the school calendar year of regularly enrolled students. Most residents begin their residency on July 1st of any given year. A resident's year may run from any one date to another, depending on the contract and date the program is entered. Generally residents may elect to train from 1 to 7 postgraduate years, depending on the course of study and specialty they choose.

The term "resident" is inclusive of the various designations for postgraduate education of physicians and dentists including interns, house officer, housestaff and even fellow. During the period of residency training, the doctor is involved in his own personal education, the education of students and other residents, and health care for his patients.













Foundations and Institutes



Georgia Institute of Human Nutrition

The Georgia Institute of Human Nutrition was established in 1978 in the School of Medicine, Section of Nutrition, to coordinate MCG nutrition research and to provide nutrition services and education on MCG's campus and in affiliated programs throughout Georgia. The Institute promotes the organization of Georgia regional programs on disease prevention and therapeutic care through nutrition. Information generated is for patients, health professionals, and the general public. GIHN is supported by contributions and general grant monies.



Georgia Institute for the Prevention of Human Disease and Accidents

The Georgia Institute for the Prevention of Human Disease and Accidents, established by the Board of Regents in December 1981, was developed to provide students and faculty of the Medical College and the people of the State of Georgia with a coordinated program of education, service and research designed to help Georgia become a leader in the prevention of disease and accidents. Organized and located within the Division of Educational Research and Development, the Institute proposes to work toward developing measures which will encourage interdisciplinary health prevention efforts, emphasize individual responsibility for the maintenance or improvement of health, and cooperate on preventive health projects with state and local agencies.



Human Genetics Institute

The Human Genetics Institute was established at the Medical College of Georgia by the Board of Regents in June of 1982. The main purpose of the Institute is to organize and integrate genetic activities at the Medical College of Georgia. The administrative structure consists of a Director and an Executive Committee composed of representatives from various departments in the Schools of Medicine, Dentistry, Allied Health, and Nursing. An external Advisory Committee provides input concerning moral, legal, and ethical questions in genetics. Funding is provided by a grant from the Genetics Division of the Georgia Department of Human Resources.



Medical College of Georgia Dental Foundation

In 1970 the Dental School faculty founded the MCG Dental Foundation to provide a vehicle for operating the faculty practice and receiving and distributing income to it. MCG employees and their dependents are eligible for oral health services without referral; the general public may be accepted on a referral basis. Fees for dental health services support the program.



Medical College of Georgia Foundation, Inc.

The MCG Foundation Inc., a non-profit, tax exempt corporation, was chartered in 1954 to receive and manage private (non-governmental) contributions for the benefit of the Medical College of Georgia. These contribututions and the income therefrom are used to provide financial support for the programs, projects, services, etc. that may not be funded through state monies. The Director of the Division of Institutional Relations is Executive Director of the Foundation. The Foundation provides financial assistance for students, advanced study for faculty, research expenses in various fields of health sciences, and support for MCG instructional programs. Some of the projects funded include scholarships, awards for local high school science fair winners, employee recognition awards, legislative visits, the cost for fund raising activities at MCG and emergency assistance at Talmadge Hospital.



Medical College of Georgia Research Institute, Inc.

The Medical College of Georgia Research Institute, Inc. (MCGRI), established in June 1980, was developed to administer the sponsored research program for the Medical College. Research proposals seeking outside funding will be submitted through and awards made to the MCGRI. The MCGRI will subcontract with the Medical College to conduct the sponsored research activities. It will provide project development assistance to faculty members and, as funds become available, direct support of research related activities.



Physicians Practice Group Medical Research Foundation of Georgia

Physicians Practice Group, Medical Research Foundation (PPG/MRFG) was established in 1958 to facilitate and support the practice of medicine by the clinical faculty of the School of Medicine. Under the trade name "Physicians Practice Group", the Foundation performs three major functions: billing and collecting of professional services rendered by its member physicians; administering those revenues generated through the patient care activities; and providing various other services that enhance the specialized medical programs available at the Medical College for the citizens of Georgia. After organizational expenses are satisfied, monies generated throughout the Foundation are used to support School of Medicine activities on the departmental level, as well as through the Dean's Office, and on a general basis, school-wide.

Internal Services



Comptroller's Division

The division provides repository, disbursement, fiscal and equipment accountability services to facilitate the operations of internal organizational units of the college and assists external agencies with college business transactions. It also is responsible for two on-campus retail food services, the College Bookstore, and the centralized record management functions.



Division of Continuing Education

The division is responsibe for compliance with the various administrative, academic, and financial policies relating to the presentation of continuing education programs. In addition, the division assists the various schools and divisions in presenting continuing education courses. In accordance with the policies of the University System of Georgia, continuing education at the Medical College of Georgia officially includes all education and training designed for all individuals and groups (with the exception of education developed for students enrolled in MCG degree—credit courses and MCG employees).



Division of Educational Research and Development

The division provides educational and research support services for units of the Medical College. Activities include curriculum development and evaluation, faculty development, educational and institutional research, grant and contract preparation, planning and implementing self-studies for accreditation and student workshops.



Office of Facilities Planning

The Office of Facilities Planning provides information about MCG facilities, assists in space utilization and future space needs studies, coordinates renovation requests, and maintains a long-range facility planning process.



Health Center Credit Union

Since 1976 employees and their families have been eligible to participate in the Health Center Credit Union, which offers an opportunity to accumulate savings and provides a source of credit at low interest rates. In addition to savings plans, the Credit Union supplies travelers checks, travel loans, secured loans, money orders, Notary Public service, and holiday discount cards. The services are supported by membership savings.



Division of Health Communication

The division provides resources and services through four sections. Television Services provides for the production and electronic distribution of educational television programming and program coordination of satellite video teleconferencing. Medical Illustration and Medical Photography offer a wide range of graphic and photographic services in support of scientific and medical education and research. Support to in-class instructional activities requiring projection, television, public address service, inventory control and maintenance of all media equipment and distribution systems is supplied by Classroom Services.



Health Systems and Computing Sciences

The Health Systems and Computing Sciences faculty and staff provide research and educational support in the areas of computing systems, biomedical engineering, statistics, and management systems. Computing facilities and engineering shops are available to faculty and students. Faculty provide consultation to other faculty and students throughout the College, as well as performing teaching and research in the areas described.



Division of Information Systems Management

This division manages the administrative/clinical data processing facility; provides consultation and/or training in data communications, networking, office automation, word processing, distributed processing, and data base systems; offers systems analysis and design, customized computer programming, and spreadsheet modeling; and employs technical support specialists available to faculty and staff. The division maintains the MCG Electronic Data Processing (EDP) plan and approves EDP and word processing requests.



Division of Institutional Relations

The division is a service division involved with financial development, alumni relations, public relations, institution-wide publications and communications. The division supports programs in building university endowment and financial support, is in charge of MCG's media relations, maintains an organized alumni relations program, and carries out necessary internal communications.



Internal Auditing Division

The division provides assistance to operating units in the development of internal control procedures, reviews activities of operating units to determine adherence to established policies and procedures, and performs examinations that will insure the safekeeping of institutional assets.

Internal Services



Division of Laboratory Animal Resources/ Biological Safety

The Section of Laboratory Animal Resources is responsible for all aspects of laboratory animal care and utilization. The Medical College is a registered research facility under the Animal Welfare Act and is accredited by the American Association for Accreditation of Laboratory Animal Care. The Committee on Animal Use for Research and Education reviews all projects involving the use of laboratory animals. Several research and teaching programs are provided by the division. The Section of Biological Safety is responsible for implementing the safety guidelines mandated by law and those developed by the Institutional Biosafety Committee. The safety aspects of work involving carcinogens, pathogens and toxic and hazardous materials is the concern of this section.



Library

The MCG Library provides information and information resources for faculty, staff, students, patients, the University System of Georgia, the State of Georgia, and other academic and health care communities through the selection, acquisition, storage, and dissemination of informational materials such as books, journals, government documents, audiovisual materials and computer data bases. The following services are available: circulation, interlibrary loan, reference (including computerized bibliographic data base search services), student bibliographic instruction, collection development and a variety of audiovisual equipment and programs.

Materials Management Division

The division provides mail and messenger services, and a central receiving, distribution, central stores, and moving services section, to include all physical storage/disbursement/transfer of all new and used supplies and equipment.



Personnel Division

The division manages the classified personnel system of the Medical College, including policy development and implementation; recruitment and placement; position classification and compensation administration; training; and employee relations programs. The administration of faculty and employee benefit programs and the maintenance of employment records are also responsibilities of the division.



Physical Plant Division

The division provides building and grounds maintenance, electrical and mechanical engineering, architectural services, housekeeping and the motor pool.



Procurement Division

The division provides for the procurement of all supplies, materials, and equipment required for the operation of the Medical College. The division operates under authority delegated by the Georgia Department of Administrative Services, Purchasing Division. Under this delegated authority, the division may generally purchase items costing less than \$5,000; all technical instruments, services, and foods, regardless of costs; and items available under statewide or agency contract. The division also coordinates the telecommunication services and provides photocopy and printing services.



Public Safety Division

The division is responsible for providing life safety and property protection services to faculty, students and visitors while on campus. Police services are provided with a sworn law enforcement staff of police officers with a responsibility for crime prevention, investigation and apprehension of persons committing crimes on campus. Safety services include inspections and consultation on accident prevention, fire safety, occupational safety, and environmental safety. The division also provides parking services, which include coordination of traffic movement, vehicle registration, campus parking, and special parking requests.



Division of Research Administration

3

Incorporating the Office of Grants and Contracts, the Division of Research Administration works with investigators in identifying potential funding sources. Assistance is available in developing proposals/applications, which are reviewed to insure that all components are completed and necessary signatures are obtained. The division is responsible for grants processing and subscribes to several publications of interest to investigators.



Division of Student Affairs

Various sections of the Division of Student Affairs are responsible for the administrative functions for student admissions, counseling, financial aid, housing, placement, minority affairs, student records, and student activities. The division also manages the Student Center and administers the Foreign Visitor's Office.



Student Health Service

The MCG Student Health Service provides medical diagnostic services and treatment for students in all five schools. The Center also offers preventive dentistry as well as some restorative dental work. Services of a staff psychologist are also available. Student health fees support these activities.

Special Community Service Projects



American Medical Student Association Clinic

Founded by the MCG American Medical Student Association and supported by the Student Government Association, the clinic provides patient contact experience for students. Physical examinations are given to Augusta area residents needing health forms completed for school or employment. Located in the Student Health Center, the clinic is staffed by professionally supervised students.



Children and Youth (C & Y) Project

Founded in 1966, the C & Y Project provides comprehensive health care for children (under 19 years) from five Augusta low-income housing areas. The project is directed by the Department of Pediatrics with maternal and child health block grant funds. Talmadge Hospital clinical facilities are used for the four clinical services - Adolescent, Dental, Gynecology, and General Pediatrics.



Comprehensive Sickle Cell Center

The Comprehensive Sickle Cell Center, directed by the Department of Cell and Molecular Biology, tests for sickle cell anemia and other related hematological disorders; treats sickle cell anemia patients in the pediatric clinic of the Center; educates the community on sickle cell anemia and related diseases; and offers courseling services to patients and relatives. Founded in 1972, it is supported by a grant from the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute.



Epilepsy Program at the Medical College of Georgia

Founded in 1976 and coordinated by the Department of Neurology and Section of Neurosurgery, the MCG Program is one of five epilepsy centers funded through the National Institute for Neurological and Communicative Disorders and Strokes. It serves the people of Georgia and the Southeast by providing medical care for persons with epilepsy, education for patients and their families, education and training for students, physicians, and non-physician professionals and research into the mechanisms of epilepsy and its treatment. Special features include an active epilepsy surgery program, an in-patient monitoring unit for special diagnostic problems related to epilepsy, and an active out-patient program including a special clinic for pregnant women with epilepsy.



Faculty Speakers Bureau

The Bureau was organized in 1979 to provide volunteer faculty to speak on health care topics to community clubs or organizations in Georgia. It is managed by the Division of Institutional Relations and the Speakers Bureau Committee, a Future of the University Sub-committee of the Faculty Academic Council.

Maternity and Infant Care (M & I) Project

The M & I Project provides services not otherwise available to indigent, high-risk obstetric patients and their newborn to one-year-old offsprings. The project, begun in 1964, is directed by the Department of Obstetrics/Gynecology in cooperation with the Department of Human Resources. East Central Health District funds are provided through a Georgia Department of Human Resources, Maternal and Child Health Block Grant. Clinics are located at MCG, University Hospital, and in county health departments in 14 surrounding counties.



National Registry of Subacute Sclerosing Panencephalitis (SSPE)

The Section of Pediatric Neurology, Departments of Neurology and Pediatrics, manages a project, originally begun in 1969, to continue a national registry of cases of the typically fatal, rare disease, SSPE. The purpose includes: studying the disease's demography, pathogenesis, clinical characteristics, long-term followup and treatments; and determining the relationships of the roles of attenuated live measles virus vaccine in SSPE. Supported by a grant from the Office of Biologics, Federal Drug Administration, the project is coordinated with the Centers for Disease Control and physicians and medical centers in the United States and abroad to identify and study cases of SSPE.



Students for Community Involvement (SCI)

Started in 1979, SCI is a project of the Section of Pediatric Cardiology of the Department of Pediatrics and the Division of Educational Research and Development. SCI was developed to promote awareness of community responsibility in medical students by having them provide community assistance through public education. Medical students teach Richmond County public school children the known information on atherosclerosis and its risk factors. Since its inception more than 10,000 children have been instructed by more than 300 medical students. The Preventive Cardiology Academic Award provided by the National Institutes of Health - National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute funds this project.



Tri-County Outreach Training Program

The Program was founded in July 1980 to expose Family Practice residents and School of Medicine students to rural medical practice and to assist Glascock, Taliaferro, and Warren counties, which are currently without a physician. The Department of Family Medicine administers this program through a Department of Health and Human Services Rural Health Initiative Grant.



University of Georgia Program (UGA) for Health Science Professionals and Practitioners in Related Fields

The UGA Department of Curriculum and Supervision provides a program of advanced graduate study, leading to the Ed.D., for health professionals in the Augusta area and qualified faculty, staff and alumni of MCG. The MCG Residence Center for the program was established in the fall of 1980. Classes are offered quarterly during the academic year and during summer quarters as needed.
