


AUGUSTA, GEORGIA

Augusta is located on the south bank of the Savannah River midway between the Great Smokey Mountains and the Atlantic coast. It is a crossroads of major highways from: Atlanta, 157 miles west; Savannah, 133 miles southeast; and Columbia, South Carolina, 72 miles east. Augusta is the second largest metropolitan market in Georgia and is also a major medical center with nine local hospitals that serve the entire southeast.

Founded in 1736 by General James E. Oglethorpe, Augusta is Georgia's second oldest city. Oglethorpe named the city for Princess Augusta, wife of the Prince of Wales. Augusta served as the capital of Georgia in 1778 and again from 1785 to 1795.

Augusta, "The Garden City," is a blend of cultures with progressive architecture, historic neighborhoods, wide parklike streets, museums, and the acclaimed Augusta National Golf Course.


STATE AND REGIONAL HEALTH CENTERS

The Poison Control Center, Georgia Radiation Therapy Center, and the Kidney Dialysis Referral Center are located in Augusta. In 1981 MCG Hospital's Trauma Unit was designated as the East Central Georgia Trauma Center. MCG Hospital operates one of two active burn centers in the state and is one of five hospitals in the state providing tertiary care for critically ill newborns.

STATE HEALTH SCIENCES UNIVERSITY

MCG is the eleventh oldest medical teaching institution in the nation and the region's leader for medical research in many health fields. The state-supported institution, chartered in 1828 as an academy offering a single course of lectures, consists of the Schools of Allied Health Sciences, Dentistry, Graduate Studies, Medicine, and Nursing. MCG's annual budget of over \$178 million includes almost \$10 million in grants and awards, of which approximately \$8 million is research awards and \$2 million is institutional, public service and other awards. The college provides education for approximately 1900 students, while supplying jobs for more than 5500 employees, interns and residents.

PROFILE OF THE MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA

TYPE

The Medical College of Georgia is a state-supported institution - unique in the fact that it is the only public health sciences university in Georgia. It is a unit of the University System of Georgia.

PURPOSE

To provide health education and training for prospective practitioners, scientists and educators at the undergraduate, graduate, postgraduate and continuing education levels.

To promote scholarly inquiry in the biological sciences and provide leadership in the generation of basic knowledge of human biology and behavior in health and disease.


To exercise leadership in the development of new educational approaches for the health professions and in the application of new knowledge and technology.

LOCATION

The campus, situated in the approximate center of Augusta, is convenient to downtown and is accessible to suburban businesses and shops.

SIZE

The present five-school campus consists of 80 buildings, including a 540 bed teaching hospital, on approximately 84 acres of land. In addition, one building and almost 94 acres comprise the Animal Care Facility at Gracewood State School and Hospital. The College also occupies one building in Athens. There are more than 7400 students and employees at MCG, which include 1865 students, 4365 classified employees, 429 interns and residents, and 772 full-time and part-time faculty. In addition, there are approximately 750 volunteer faculty.

ALLIED HEALTH SCIENCES: First degree in an Allied Health field awarded in 1964. Formally established as a separate school by Board of Regents in January 1968, incorporating programs already in existence at MCG.

DENTISTRY: Established by Board of Regents in 1965. First students accepted in 1969. First degree awarded in 1973.

GRADUATE STUDIES: Established as a separate school by Board of Regents in 1965. Programs formerly offered under Graduate Division. First Master's degree awarded in 1951; first Ph.D in 1966.

MEDICINE: Established by legislative act in 1828. First degree awarded in 1833.

NURSING: Begun in 1943 (first degree awarded in 1945) at the University of Georgia in Athens; moved to MCG campus in Augusta in 1956. First baccalaureate nursing degree awarded at MCG in 1957. First M.S.N. degree awarded in 1969.

SYMBOL AND LOGO The MCG symbol represents infinity--over and under, a never-ending path continually repeating itself--symbolizing man's search for immortality, man's attempt to prolong life through health and medicine.

The five poles that make up the entity represent the five areas of study that make up the whole--the Medical College of Georgia. These poles form a precise, mechanical shape that imparts a scientific "feeling." The abstract quality of the symbol can be likened to a biological unit or an atom, organic because of its round, flowing form; mathematical in its strict geometric pattern.

When the symbol is used in conjunction with the stable, authoritative letterforms of the MCG logo (Craw Clarendon typeface) it becomes a powerful statement of quality and professionalism for the college it represents.

MCG

SEAL

Used on official documents, the seal of MCG was adopted by the college in 1975. It is similar to the one used in the earliest days of the institution. The seal bears the words Medical College of Georgia in Latin and the Roman numerals for 1828, the year the college was chartered. The illustration depicts the Old Medical College Building on Telfair Street.



REGALIA

The Medical College of Georgia regalia, rich in symoblism, was originally designed by the late Dr. Walter Shepeard, Professor Emeritus of the School of Medicine. It is based on the coats of arms of three members of the 1832 faculty: Dr. Louis A. Dugas and Drs. Joseph and Paul Fitzsimmons Eve. The official colors of the Medical College, blue and silver, were taken from the Dugas coat of arms.

The top of the cap represents the family coat of arms of Louis A. Dugas. The right side of the top of the cap is silver, the left is blue, and a red saltire cross extends into all quadrants. The cap's six corners stand for heroism awards given to the family by France during the First Crusade.

The main part of the hood carries the Dugas colors and the red saltire cross with two attached tags in the front; the right tag represents the family coat of arms of Drs. Joseph and Paul Fitzimmons Eve, and the left tag represents the Dugas family colors. The color of the hood's velvet trim symbolizes the major discipline of the wearer: herbal green for medicine; yellow for science; lilac for dentistry; apricot for nursing; and blue for philosophy. The level of the degree is shown by the size of the hood and the width of the trim, as set by the Intercollegiate Regalia Commission. The bachelor's, master's, and doctor's hoods are three feet, three and one-half feet, and four feet long, respectively. The width of the hood trim is two inches for the bachelor's, three for the master's, and five for the doctor's.

Georgia Institute of Human Nutrition

The Georgia Institute of Human Nutrition was established in 1978 in the School of Medicine, Section of Nutrition, to coordinate MCG nutrition research and to provide nutrition services and education on MCG's campus and in affiliated programs throughout Georgia. The Institute promotes the organization of Georgia regional programs on disease prevention and therapeutic care through nutrition. Information generated is for patients, health professionals and the general public. GIHN is supported by contributions and general grant monies.



Georgia Institute for the Prevention of Human Disease and Accidents

The Georgia Institute for the Prevention of Human Disease and Accidents, established by the Board of Regents in December 1981, was developed to provide students and faculty of MCG and the people of the state of Georgia with a coordinated program of education, service and research designed to help Georgia become a leader in the prevention of disease and accidents. Organized and located within the Division of Educational Research and Development, the Institute proposes to work toward developing measures that will encourage interdisciplinary health prevention efforts, emphasize individual responsibility for the maintenance or improvement of health, cooperate on preventive health projects with state and local agencies, and perform research in the areas of health promotion and disease prevention.



Human Genetics Institute

The Human Genetics Institute was established at MCG by the Board of Regents in June of 1982. The main purpose of the Institute is to organize and integrate genetic activities at MCG. The administrative structure consists of a Director and an Executive Committee composed of representatives from various departments in the Schools of Medicine, Dentistry, Allied Health, and Nursing. An external Advisory Committee provides input concerning moral, legal, and ethical questions in genetics. Funding is provided by a grant from the Genetics Division of the Georgia Department of Human Resources.



Medical College of Georgia Dental Foundation

In 1970 the faculty of the School of Dentistry founded the MCG Dental Foundation to provide a vehicle for operating the faculty practice and receiving and distributing income to it. MCG employees and their dependents are eligible for oral health services without referral; the general public may be accepted on a referral basis. Fees for dental health services support the program.



Medical College of Georgia Foundation, Inc.

The MCG Foundation, Inc., a non-profit, tax exempt corporation, was chartered in 1954 to receive and manage private (non-governmental) contributions for the benefit of MCG. contribututions and the income therefrom are used to provide financial support for the programs, projects, services, etc. that may not be funded through state monies. The Vice President for Development is Executive Director of the Foundation. The Foundation provides financial assistance for students, advanced study for faculty, research expenses in various fields of health sciences, and support for MCG instructional programs. Some of the projects funded include scholarships, awards for local high school science fair winners, employee recognition awards, legislative visits, the cost for fund raising activities at MCG and emergency assistance at the Medical College Hospital.



Medical College of Georgia Research Institute, Inc.

The Medical College of Georgia Research Institute, Inc. (MCCRI), established in June 1980, was developed to support the sponsored research program of the Medical College. Research proposals seeking outside funding are submitted through and awards made to the MCCRI. The MCCRI subcontracts with the Medical College to conduct the sponsored research activities. It provides project development assistance to faculty members and, as funds become available, directs support of research related activities.



Physicians Practice Group/ Medical Research Foundation of Georgia

Physicians Practice Group, Medical Research Foundation (PPG/MRFG) was established in 1958 to facilitate and support the practice of medicine by the clinical faculty of the School of Medicine. Under the trade name "Physicians Practice Group," the Foundation performs three major functions: billing and collecting of professional services rendered by its member physicians; administering those revenues generated through the patient care activities; and providing various other services that enhance the specialized medical programs available at MCG for the citizens of Georgia. After organizational expenses are satisfied, monies generated throughout the Foundation are used to support School of Medicine activities on the departmental level, as well as through the Dean's Office, and, on a general basis, school-wide.

MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA Internal Services

Business Services

The Purchasing Section provides for the procurement of all supplies, materials, and equipment required for the operation of MCG. division operates under authority delegated by the Georgia Department of Administrative Services, Purchasing Division. Under this delegated authority, the division may generally purchase items costing less than \$5,000; all technical instruments, services, and foods, regardless of costs; and items available under statewide or agency contract. The division also coordinates the telecommunication services and provides photocopy and printing services. Fiscal Services section provides repository disbursement, fiscal and equipment accountability services to facilitate the operations of internal organization units of the college and assists external agencies with college business transactions. It is also responsible for the centralized record management function.

Continuing Education

The division is responsibe for compliance with the various administrative, academic, and financial policies relating to the presentation of continuing education programs. In addition, the division assists the various schools and divisions in presenting continuing education courses. In accordance with the policies of the University System of Georgia, continuing education at MCG officially includes all education and training designed for all individuals and groups (with the exception of education developed for students enrolled in MCG degree-credit courses and MCG employees).

Educational Research and Development

The division provides educational and research support services for units of the Medical College. Consultation is provided to other faculty on instructional methodology, curriculum development and evaluation, research design and statistics, and grant and contract preparation. Other activities include institutional research, faculty development and student workshops.



Facilities Planning

The Office of Facilities Planning provides information about MCG facilities, assists in space utilization and future space needs studies, coordinates renovation requests, and assists in developing a long-range facility planning process.



Health Communication

The division provides resources and services through four sections. Television Services provides for the production and electronic distribution of educational television programming and program coordination of satellite video teleconferencing. Medical Illustration and Medical Photography offer a wide range of graphic and photographic services in support of scientific and medical education and research. Classroom Services supplies support to in-class instructional activities requiring projection, television, public address service, inventory control and maintenance of all media equipment and distribution systems.



Health Systems and Computing Sciences

Health Systems and Computing Sciences faculty and staff provide research and educational support in the areas of computing systems, biomedical engineering, statistics, and management systems. Computing facilities and engineering shops are available to faculty and students. Faculty provide consultation to other faculty and students, teach and conduct research in the areas described.



Information Systems Management

This division manages the administrative/ clinical data processing facility; provides consultation and/or training in data communications, networking, office automation, word processing, distributed processing, and data base systems; offers systems analysis and design, customized computer programming, and spreadsheet modeling; and employs technical support specialists available to faculty and staff. The division maintains the MCG Electronic Data Processing (EDP) plan and approves EDP and word processing requests.



Institutional Relations

The division is involved with financial development, alumni relations, public relations, institution-wide publications and communications. The division supports programs in building university endowment and financial support, is in charge of MCG's media relations, maintains an organized alumni relations program, and carries out necessary internal communications.



Internal Auditing

The division provides assistance in the development of internal control procedures; reviews activities to determine adherence to established policies and procedures; and performs examinations that will insure the safekeeping of institutional assets.

Laboratory Animal Resources/ Biological Safety

The division is comprised of the sections of Laboratory Animal Resources and Biological Safety. The Section of Laboratory Animal Resources is responsible for all aspects of MCG11ege laboratory animal care and utilization. is a registered research facility under the Animal Welfare Act and is accredited by the American Association for Accreditation of Laboratory Animal Care. The Committee on Animal Use for Research and Education reviews all projects involving the use of laboratory animals. The Section of Biological Safety is responsible for implementing the safety guidelines mandated by law and those developed by the Institutional Biosafety Committee. Safety aspects of work involving carcinogens, pathogens and toxic and hazardous materials is the concern of this section. Several research and teaching programs are provided by the division.



Library

The Medical College Library provides information and information resources for faculty, staff, students, patients, the University System of Georgia, the state of Georgia, and other academic and health care communities through the selection, acquisition, storage, and dissemination of informational materials such as books, journals, government documents, audiovisual materials and computer data bases. Services include: circulation, interlibrary loan, reference (including computerized bibliographic data base search services), student bibliographic instruction, collection development, and a variety of audiovisual equipment and programs.

Materials Management

The division provides inventory management, stock control, shipping, central receiving, central stores, moving and delivery, including all physical storage/disbursement/transfer of all new and used supplies and equipment, as well as student center and hospital cafeteria, snack bar and vending services. The division also provides mail and messenger services.



Personnel Services

The division manages the classified personnel system of MCG, including policy development and implementation; recruitment and placement; position classification and compensation administration; training; and employee relations programs. It is also responsible for the administration of faculty and employee benefit programs and the maintenance of employment records.



Physical Plant Services

The Facilities Design and Maintenance Section provides architectural services, renovations, and building maintenance. The Environmental Service Section provides housekeeping for the campus and the hospital. The Plant Engineering Section provides energy, mechanical, and electrical services. The Grounds Maintenance and Development Section provides institutional ground development and general maintenance.



Public Safety Services

The division is responsible for providing oncampus life safety and property protection services to faculty, students and visitors. A law enforcement staff of certified police officers is responsible for crime prevention, investigation and apprehension of persons committing crimes on campus. Safety services include inspections and consultation on accident prevention, fire safety, occupational safety and environmental safety. Parking services include coordination of traffic, vehicle registration, campus parking, and special parking requests. The Transportation Bureau is responsible for transporting patients and visitors to and from the parking areas and the clinics. After dark, female students and employees may use the campus escort service.




Research Administration

The division works with investigators in identifying potential funding sources. Assistance is available in developing proposals/applications, which are reviewed to insure that all components are completed and necessary signatures are obtained. The division is responsible for grants processing and subscribes to several publications of interest to investigators.



Student Affairs

Various sections of the division are responsible for the administrative functions for student admissions, counseling, financial aid, housing, placement, minority affairs, student records and student activities. The division also manages the Student Center and administers the Foreign Visitor's Office.


Instructional Faculty - Faculty with an academic appointment whose primary responsibility is not administrative. This includes all faculty at the level of department chairman and below. (Total active full-time Instructional Faculty, June 30, 1985 = 606.)

Administrative Faculty - Faculty whose primary responsibility is administrative. This generally includes all faculty above the level of department chairman. Academic Administrators have rank and are responsible for academic programs, i.e., deans, associate deans, etc.

General Administrators include all other administrators both with and without academic appointments. (Total Administrative Faculty, June 30, 1985: with Academic Appointment = 37; without Academic Appointment = 26.)

Full-Time Faculty - Faculty on an academic or fiscal year contract whose work commitment is 100%. (Includes MCG/VA faculty whose combined work commitment equals 100%.)

General Programs Faculty - Faculty whose academic appointment is in an area other than in the schools of Allied Health Sciences, Dentistry, Medicine or Nursing. Because the institutional definition for reporting faculty is based on school of primary responsibility rather than school of academic appointment, approximately one-half of the General Programs Faculty are reported either as administrative faculty or as faculty in one of the schools. Therefore, except in the diagram below, General Programs Faculty are not listed separately.





MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA BENEFITS FOR FULL-TIME FACULTY 1984-85

VACATION

All permanent faculty and administrative officers (fiscal year contract) working one-half time or more earn vacation leave. Leave accrual is at a rate equal to their current work commitment multiplied by 1.75 days per month. Faculty members who are on an academic year contract do not earn vacation leave.

Permanent full-time faculty personnel: vacation leave each December 31st may not exceed 45 working days.

Permanent part-time faculty personnel (working one-half time or more): maximum accrual allowed as of December 31st will be determined by their work commitment as of *hat date.

Faculty personnel will be paid for all accrued vacation leave (up to the maximum specified above) upon termination from the Medical College of Georgia for any reason.

Three unscheduled holidays are authorized on the basis of one holiday for each quarter of the first three quarters of the calendar year. Faculty members employed on an academic year basis do not earn unscheduled holidays.

SICK LEAVE

All permanent faculty and administrative officers working one-half time or more (including academic year faculty members) earn sick leave. The monthly sick leave accrual will equal the current work commitment multiplied by one day. Accrual shall be cumulative, with no maximum for the faculty member's entire length of continuous service.

Any faculty member unable to return to work after exhausting all accumulated sick leave and accrued vacation leave may be granted sick leave without pay for a period not to exceed one year. An approved sick leave of absence without pay permits a faculty member to continue all group insurance in effect. No additional vacation leave or sick leave will accrue while the member is on sick leave of absence without pay.

MILITARY LEAVE

Leave with pay is authorized for members of a Reserve Component or National Guard as specified in official orders, with a maximum of 15 workdays in any calendar year. Permanent faculty (fiscal year contract) working one-half time or more are authorized military leave with pay.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE

The President may, with the approval of the Chancellor and the Board of Regents, grant leave of absence, with or without pay, to members of the faculty. Leaves are granted only for the purpose of promoting scholarly work and encouraging professional development. The Medical College does not have a sabbatical leave policy at

RETTREMENT PLAN

Participation is required for all who have a work commitment of half-time or more. Members contribute 6% of Participation is required for all who have a work commitment of half-time or more. Members contribute 6% of monthly gross salary and the State contributes an additional amount (ranging from 6.83% in 1945 to 13.23% currently). The minimum requirement for service retirement is ten years of creditable service and age 60, or 30 years of service regardless of age. Minimum requirement for disability retirement and survivors benefit is also ten years of creditable service. Members under age 60 who leave our employment with ten or more years of creditable service may freeze their membership and credits until they reach age 60. Members who leave may withdraw contributions and earned interest upon application.

HOSPITALIZATION TNSHRANCE

Available with or without dependent coverage and medical benefits at group rates. Part of the cost is paid by MCG. Must have a work commitment of half-time or more.

LONG-TERM DISABILITY **TNSURANCE**

Available at group rates to all faculty earning at least \$10,000 PA. Must also have a work commitment of half-time or more.

GROUP ACCIDENT INSURANCE

Available at group rates to all faculty working half-time or more.

GROUP LIFE INSURANCE

Up to \$15,000 free Basic Life Insurance. Additional Supplemental Insurance up to \$110,000 available based on salary. Must have a work commitment of half-time or more.

JURY DUTY

Full pay while on fury duty.

SOCIAL SECURITY















MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA DEFINITION OF EEO EMPLOYEE CATEGORIES

Executive, Administrative and Managerial - Includes all persons whose assignments require primary (and major) responsibility for management of the institution, or a customarily recognized department or subdivision thereof. Assignments require the performance of work directly related to management policies or general business operations of the institution, department or subdivisions, etc. It is assumed that assignments in this category customarily and regularly require the incumbent to exercise discretion and independent judgement, and to direct the work of others.

<u>Professional</u> - Includes persons whose assignments require either college graduation or experience of such kind and amount as to provide a comparable background. Also includes all staff members with assignments requiring specialized professional training.


<u>Clinical and Secretarial</u> - Includes all persons whose assignments typically are associated with clerical activities or are specifically of a secretarial nature. Includes personnel who are responsible for internal and external communications, recording and retrieval of data (other than computer programmers) and/or information and other paper work required in an office.

Technical and Paraprofessionals - Includes all persons whose assignments require specialized knowledge or skills which may be acquired through experience or academic work such as is offered in many two-year technical institutes, junior colleges or through equivalent on-the-job training.

<u>Skilled Crafts</u> - Includes all persons whose assignments typically require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the processes involved in the work, acquired through onthe-job training and experience or through apprenticeship or other formal training programs.

<u>Service/Maintenance</u> - Includes persons whose assignments require limited degrees of previously acquired skills and knowledge and in which workers perform duties that result in or contribute to the comfort, convenience and hygiene of personnel and the student body or that contribute to the upkeep and care of buildings, facilities or grounds of the institutional property.

MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA MEDICAL AND DENTAL RESIDENTS BY POSTGRADUATE TRAINING YEAR AND QUARTER 1984-1985*

Residents are on a yearly contract and do not "enroll" by quarter. This chart shows the presence of residents during quarters at MCG, although the residents' year does not coincide with the school calendar year of regularly enrolled students. Most residents begin their residency on July 1st of any given year. A resident's year may run from any one date to another, depending on the contract and date the program is entered. Generally residents may elect to train from 1 to 7 postgraduate years, depending on the course of study and specialty they choose.

The term "resident" is inclusive of the various designations for postgraduate education of physicians and dentists including interns, house officer, housestaff and even fellow. During the period of residency training, the doctor is involved in his own personal education, the education of students and other residents, and health care for his patients.



MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA HOSPITAL AND CLINICS

The Medical College of Georgia Hospital and Clinics was established in 1956 as Talmadge Memorial Hospital, the teaching hospital of the Medical College. Its Virgil P. Sydenstricker Wing was opened in 1976. It is a center of primary as well as specialty care, basic and clinical research and medical education. Services are wide-ranging, reflecting its role in the health care of Georgians and the varied specialties of the medical faculty.

MCG Hospital is the only state teaching hospital in Georgia and serves the five schools of the Medical College: Allied Health Sciences, Dentistry, Graduate Studies, Medicine and Nursing.

Among the special services available at the 540-bed hospital are a comprehensive pediatric program, including intensive care for newborns and critically ill and injured adolescents and open heart surgery; special care for high risk mothers; kidney transplant surgery; and an epilepsy diagnostic and surgery program. The hospital also offers services as a Regional Trauma Center, providing special care for patients with multiple body system injuries.

The hospital's 1984-85 budget totalled \$92.4 million. Admissions totalled approximately 17,500 during the fiscal year, with more than 200,000 patient visits recorded in the hospital's many outpatient clinics. More than 3,000 people are employed by the Hospital and Clinics.

GEORGIA WAR VETERANS NURSING HOME

The Georgia War Veterans Nursing Home (GWVNH), a skilled and restorative nursing home, is owned by the Department of Veterans Service, State of Georgia, and operated by the Medical College of Georgia under a contract through the Board of Regents. All employees of GWVNH are MCG employees, work under the same job classifications and are paid the same wages.

The purpose of the Nursing Home is to provide patient care for eligible Georgia War Veterans who are in need of continuous nursing care and rehabilitation, and to return those who respond to treatment to their families and communities, at the highest possible level of physical and mental restoration.

The GWVNH is located directly across from the Medical College Hospital within the Medical Complex of Augusta and convenient to downtown services and businesses.










