





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

DR. WALTER L. SHEPARD (1906–1978)

Dr. Sheppard came to the Medical College of Georgia in 1948 as associate professor of clinical medicine. Among his duties was responsibility for the laboratories of the University Hospital, then the teaching hospital of MCG. Dr. Sheppard also served

as director of a program for training medical technologists started by Dr. Edgar Pund in 1938. Dr. Sheppard developed this training into a baccalaureate degree program, first issued jointly with the University of Georgia, and later as a part of the newly formed School of Allied Health Sciences. He also developed one of the first blood

banking programs in the southeast and was nationally recognized in this field. The CSRA Blood Assurance Program evolved from this effort and is now administered by the Sheppard Blood Center. Dr. Sheppard continued to direct the medical technology program until his retirement in 1971.

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## GENERAL INFORMATION HIGHLIGHTS

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- Chartered in 1828 as the Medical Academy of Georgia, the Medical College of Georgia is one of the oldest medical schools in the nation.
- In 1873, the Medical College of Georgia became affiliated with the University of Georgia. In 1950, nearly 80 years later, the Medical College of Georgia became an independent institution in the University System of Georgia. Today, the University System consists of 34 independent universities and colleges.
- Departments of Prosthodontics and Restorative Dentistry in the School of Dentistry combined to form one new department: Oral Rehabilitation (December 1, 1992).

### CLIMATE

Short, mild winters and long, warm summers. Average annual temperature 64.3 degrees; August average 80.3 degrees; January average 43.0 degrees. Average annual precipitation 44.27 inches.

### COMMUNICATIONS

Newspapers: one morning daily, one evening daily, combined Saturday and Sunday editions; six area weeklies; two magazines. Television: five stations, three representing the three major networks, one public broadcasting station and cable TV. Radio: ten stations, including public broadcasting station at Augusta College.

### CONVENTIONS

Augusta is growing as a convention center, with excellent meeting facilities and more than 5,000 rooms in area hotels and motels. With the downtown Civic Center and new convention center, Augusta can accommodate conventions and meetings of all sizes.

### EDUCATION

Seventy-one public schools in Richmond and Columbia counties; a number of vocational and technical schools, of which two are a part of the public school system; 16 parochial and private schools; one public and one private liberal arts college and one health sciences university.

### ELEVATION

110 to 460 feet above sea level.

### FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS

Eleven banks (84 branches), with total deposits over \$2 billion, including NationsBank, Wachovia Bank of Georgia, First Union Bank, Bank of Columbia, First Columbia Bank, and Trust Company Bank of Augusta. Three savings and loan associations (22 branches), with total assets over \$1 billion. Four banks have 24-hour instant banker services at a central location on the Medical College of Georgia campus.

Economic Development Department of the Metro Augusta Chamber of Commerce assists new, expanding, or relocating industries. Principal industries include chemical, pulp, textile, metalworking, brick and clay, and food processing.

### LIBRARIES

East Central Georgia Regional Library has four branches with 484,866 volumes and video tapes, plus recordings. The system also has branches in Columbia County, Burke County, Warren County, Lincoln County and Glascock County. Bookmobile schedules are published weekly in local newspapers.

### MILITARY

Fort Gordon, home of U.S. Army Signal School, the largest communications-electronics training center in the world. Dwight David Eisenhower Army Medical Center, U.S. Army's regional medical treatment and teaching facility for the southeastern United States.

### POPULATION

Augusta - 43,923. Richmond County - 192,639. Columbia County - 70,000. Trading Area - 408,860 (1992 projections; MSA includes Richmond, Columbia, and McDuffie counties in Georgia and Aiken County in South Carolina, totaling 1,972 square miles). The CSRA (18-county area comprised of 13 counties in Georgia and five in South Carolina) population is 559,418.

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# PROFILE OF METRO AUGUSTA

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## RECREATION/CULTURE

Parks and Recreation Department of Richmond County plans and supervises year-round programs for all ages. YMCA and YWCA programs are available. Fifteen golf courses in area. Richmond County Recreation Department operates swimming pools and tennis courts. Clarks Hill Lake offers a 1,200-mile shoreline and 80,000 acres of impounded water area with sailing, swimming, camping, waterskiing, fishing, and boating. All major professional sports in Atlanta are within easy access. Full schedule of intercollegiate spectator sports is maintained. Greater Augusta Arts Council, Augusta Opera Association, Augusta Symphony Orchestra, Augusta College and Paine College Lyceum Series, Augusta Choral Society, Augusta Players, Fort Gordon Players, children's theater group, one ballet company, and others.

## TRANSPORTATION

Air - Bush Field (municipal) has 25 in-bound and 25 out-bound daily flights via Delta, Piedmont, Atlantic Southeast Airlines, and Eastern Metro Express. Daniel Field is an in-town utility airfield with fixed-based operations and air taxi service. Five rail lines service business and industry with reciprocal switching and transit agreements. Rail and truck lines serve Port of Augusta. Highway - Interstates 20 and 520; U.S. Highways 1, 25, 78, 221, and 278; Georgia Routes 4, 21, 28, 56, 88, 104, and 232. There are 25 motor freight lines and five tank-truck lines. Bus - one national bus line, one intracity bus line, and a bus route to Fort Gordon.

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## HEALTH CARE

### EMPLOYMENT

More than 25,000 people are employed in the medical community in Richmond County.

### HOSPITALS

#### **Charter Hospital of Augusta**

A 63-bed private psychiatric facility treating emotional, behavioral and related substance abuse problems of young people ranging in age from four to 19. Charter Hospital employs more than 100 people and offers a residential and partial hospitalization program in addition to its acute care programs. The hospital is fully accredited by the Joint Commission on the Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations.

#### **Dwight David Eisenhower Army Medical Center**

Dwight David Eisenhower Army Medical Center (DDEAMC), accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations, is a 434-bed teaching center which provides primary care for 57,000 military beneficiaries in the Central Savannah River Area and tertiary care for eligible beneficiaries in the entire Southeastern United States, including Puerto Rico. The staff consists of 2,024 military and civilian employees. Graduate Medical Education is offered through nine different programs. An accredited LPN school is conducted for military students. DDEAMC also participates in the clinical training of physician assistants, nurses, physical therapists, medical technologists, nuclear medicine technologists, radiologic technologists, social workers, audiologists, pharmacists, optometrists, health care administrators, and other specialties through affiliation agreements with the Medical College of Georgia, Augusta College, and other institutions throughout the United States.

#### **Georgia Regional Hospital**

Georgia Regional Hospital at Augusta is a state-supported, multi-purpose psychiatric hospital opened in April 1969 and designed to provide necessary psychiatric, medical, social, educational, and rehabilitative services directed toward returning patients to the community as participating members. Employing 550, the hospital is a licensed mental health facility, with 262 beds currently available for short-term, intensive care for the 23-county East Central area. All hospital programs are fully accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations.

#### **Gracewood State School and Hospital**

Opened in 1921, Gracewood provides residential services to the mentally retarded from the 47-county East Region of Georgia. Gracewood is administered by the Division of Mental Health, Mental Retardation, and Substance Abuse, Georgia Department of Human Resources, and is state- and federally-funded. Services currently are provided to 630 clients with varying degrees of mental retardation and associated physical handicaps. There is no age limitation for admission, however the population is primarily adults. Gracewood employs 1,564 people.

#### **Humana Hospital Augusta**

Opened in November 1973 as Doctor's Hospital, Humana is a general acute care hospital with 374 beds and 1,109 employees in its six-story building. It is accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations. A 25-bed burn unit is the hospital's center of excellence.

## **St. Joseph Hospital**

A not-for-profit Catholic hospital operated by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet since December 1952. St. Joseph is a general hospital accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations. This 235-bed facility pioneered Day Surgery in the Augusta area eleven years ago. Other centers of excellence include: obstetrical care featuring a newly renovated Family Focused Childbirth Center with LDR's; oncology; physical therapy, speech therapy, occupational therapy; and community health education through its Family Life Center. St. Joseph has the state's largest Home Health/Hospice program serving 18 counties in Georgia and South Carolina. St. Joseph sponsors (with University Hospital) Walton Rehabilitation Hospital, the Brandon Wilde Life Care Community, and the Resource Center on Aging.

## **Medical College of Georgia Hospital and Clinics**

The Medical College of Georgia Hospital and Clinics is a leading tertiary referral center for the state of Georgia and the region, offering a full spectrum of specialized medical and health services. As the teaching hospital of an academic medical center, the Hospital and Clinics is dedicated to the development of professional and technical knowledge and skills through its support of organized programs of teaching in medicine, nursing, dentistry, and the allied health sciences. The 540-bed hospital is fully accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations and operates more than 80 specialty clinics. The facility is the designated Regional Trauma Center for a 17-county district of East Central Georgia. The Children's Medical Center within the Hospital and Clinics contains a Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit as well as numerous programs for the treatment of children and adolescents. Specialty programs of the Hospital and Clinics include the Comprehensive Diabetes Care Center, Comprehensive Cancer Center, Magnetic Resonance Imaging, Extra Corporeal Membrane Oxygenation, and Epilepsy Surgery. In the fall of 1992, the MCG Hospital and Clinics expanded, adding a new Ambulatory Care Center/Specialized Care Center that will enhance emergency, trauma, and intensive care and consolidate more than 80 specialty clinics. The Hospital and Clinics employs over 3,400 people.

## **University Hospital**

Serving the community since 1818, University Hospital is owned by the Richmond County Hospital Authority and operated by University Health Services, Inc. With 700 beds, University is the second largest hospital in Georgia, attracting patients from a 20-county area. Accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations, the hospital admits nearly 26,000 patients annually and treats more than 70,000 patients in the Emergency Department each year. As a tertiary care hospital, University offers such specialty centers as the Georgia Heart Institute, the Harry W. Jernigan, Jr. Cancer Center, the Women's Center, and the Behavioral Health Center. The hospital also operates satellite facilities in Columbia County and Health Central, a community wellness and fitness center in downtown Augusta. Along with St. Joseph Hospital, University sponsors Walton Rehabilitation Hospital, the Brandon Wilde Life Care Community, and the Resource Center on Aging.

## **Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center**

The Veterans Affairs Medical Center is a 1,033-bed facility with two major divisions located approximately three miles apart. The Medical Center provides tertiary care for medical, surgical, neurological, and spinal cord injured patients at the 380-bed Downtown Division and psychiatric, extended, rehabilitative, and nursing home care at the 653-bed Uptown Division. Special programs include: Medical, Surgical, and Coronary Care Intensive Care Units, Alcohol Treatment Unit, Audiology, Cardiac Catheterization Laboratory, Cardio Pulmonary Rehabilitation, Day Treatment, Dialysis, Drug Dependence Treatment, Electron Microscopy Research Program, Homeless Chronically Mentally Ill, Spinal Cord Injury Hospital-based Home Care, Laser Surgery, Long-term Psychiatric Care, Nuclear Medicine, Open Heart Surgery, Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, Pulmonary Function Laboratory, Radiation Therapy, Respiratory Care Unit, Sleep Apnea Studies, Speech Pathology, Spinal Cord Injury Center, Stereotactic Brain Biopsy, Stroke Rehabilitation Program, and YAG Laser. The VAMC provides comprehensive, quality patient care to all eligible veterans.

Accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities, the hospital is sponsored by St. Joseph Center for Life, Inc. and University Health Services, Inc.

Approximately 1,200 beds are provided by Richmond County's ten nursing homes.

## **PHYSICIANS AND DENTISTS**

Richmond County has approximately 1,449 medical doctors with private practices and more than 219 dentists.

## **STATE AND REGIONAL HEALTH CENTERS**

The Poison Control, Radiation Therapy, and Kidney Dialysis Referral centers are located in Augusta. MCG Hospital operates one of two active burn centers in the state and is one of five hospitals that provides tertiary care for critically ill newborns.



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## PROFILE OF THE MEDICAL COLLEGE OF GEORGIA

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- TYPE** The Medical College of Georgia is a state-supported university and is a unit of the University System of Georgia. It is the eleventh oldest medical teaching institution in the nation and the region's leader for medical research in many health fields. The institution, chartered in 1828 as an academy offering a single course of lectures, consists of the Schools of Allied Health Sciences, Dentistry, Graduate Studies, Medicine, and Nursing. The annual budget of MCG of over \$327.4 million in FY 1992 included nearly \$16.7 million in sponsored awards, with more than \$4.8 million for instructional and public service awards and more than \$11 million in research grants and awards. Additional research support was provided to MCG faculty through the MCG Research Institute Research Incentive Program (over \$345,000) and industry (\$575,000) and to MCG/VA faculty through the Veterans Administration (over \$822,000). The university provides education for over 2,400 students (including residents), while supplying jobs for nearly 5,900 employees.
- PURPOSE** To provide superior health education and training for prospective practitioners, scientists, and educators at the undergraduate, graduate, and postgraduate levels appropriate to the needs of the state of Georgia, and to the national and global communities of which it is an active member.
- To be a major center of excellence in research through the generation and application of biomedical knowledge and technology to human health and disease and to play an expanding role in biomedical technology transfer into the health care delivery system.
- To develop and provide state-of-the-art health care services for the citizens of Georgia and others and to encourage, test, and improve access through the use of innovative systems of health care delivery appropriate to the changing demographics and needs of the people of the state and the nation.
- To promote health awareness and disease prevention for the people of Georgia and the nation in order to extend and enhance the quality of life.
- LOCATION** The campus, in the approximate center of Augusta, is situated between Walton Way and Wrightsboro Road.
- SIZE** The present five-school campus consists of 90 buildings, including a 540-bed teaching hospital, on approximately 100 acres of land. One building and additional acreage comprise the Animal Care Facility at Gracewood State School and Hospital. The university also occupies additional space in Athens, Atlanta, and Rome. As of June 30, 1992, there were 851 instructional and administrative full-time and part-time faculty, over 1,000 volunteer faculty, and 5,096 classified employees at MCG. Students enrolled Fall quarter 1992 numbered 2,501 (including 440 housestaff).
- SCHOOLS** **Allied Health Sciences:** First degree in an allied health field awarded in 1964. Formally established as a separate school by Board of Regents in January 1968, incorporating programs already in existence at MCG.
- Dentistry:** Established by Board of Regents in 1965. First students accepted in 1969. First degree awarded in 1973.
- Graduate Studies:** Established as a separate school by Board of Regents in 1965. Programs formerly offered under Graduate Division. First Master's degree awarded in 1951; first PhD in 1966.
- Medicine:** Established by legislative act in 1828. First degree awarded in 1833.
- Nursing:** Begun in 1943 (first degree awarded in 1945) at the University of Georgia in Athens; moved to MCG campus in Augusta in 1956. First baccalaureate nursing degree awarded at MCG in 1957.





### 1859 MCG ANNUAL ANNOUNCEMENT

Just as the campus of the Medical College of Georgia has grown from a single building in 1835 to the ever-spreading urban conglomerate of the 1990s, life and education of the students has become increasingly complex. In the 1859 announcement, a complete set of lecture tickets amounted to \$105 per session, in addition to the matriculation fee of \$5 and the diploma fee of \$30. In 1892, tickets for the full course had been reduced to \$75. The 1859 announcement listed lectures in Anatomy (Special and Comparative), Physiology and Pathological Anatomy, Surgery, Medical Chemistry, Obstetrics and Diseases of Women and Infants, Institutes and Practice of Medicine, Materia Medica, Therapeutics and Medical Jurisprudence. By 1893, lectures were given in the new specialty of Eye, Ear and Throat Diseases. Students entering in 1893, however, would be required to attend three courses of lectures instead of the two years previously mandated. While the renovation of the Old Medical College building may return it to the glories of the past, there can be no reversal of the financial or educational simplicities of bygone days.

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## STUDENTS HIGHLIGHTS

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- Number of applicants up 31 percent over last year.
- Overall one-year retention rate remains high at 93.8 percent, down less than one percent from last year's rate.
- Postdoctorates studying at the Medical College of Georgia drop to 34 in the fall of 1991, down from last year's all-time high of 51.
- Financial assistance to students tops \$12 million.
- Average indebtedness of graduates ranges from approximately \$10,000 for the schools of Allied Health Sciences, Graduate Studies, and Nursing to approximately \$34,000 for the schools of Dentistry and Medicine.




### CHANGES IN APPLICANTS PER POSITION TO SCHOOLS OF DENTISTRY AND MEDICINE


## CHANGES IN PERCENT OF FEMALE AND MALE APPLICANTS







## SCHOOL OF NURSING PIN

The pin of the Medical College of Georgia School of Nursing was made and first awarded in 1952 under the administration of E. Louise Grant while the nursing program was located at the University of Georgia. The design of the pin was adapted in 1956 by changing the name of the school and college when the nursing program transferred from the University of Georgia

and became one of the autonomous schools of the Medical College of Georgia.

The pin is designed with a three-column black enameled arch on a field of gold, circled by a crimson band bearing the name of the School of Nursing. Black and red are the colors of the University of Georgia and were the colors of the Medical College of Georgia until the late 1960s. The gold field is inscribed with the motto of the University of Georgia: "Et-Docere-et-Rerum-

Exquirere-Causas" which translates to read "Both to teach and to inquire about the nature of things."

Symbolically, the three-column arch relates to Wisdom, Justice and Moderation from the motto of the State of Georgia. The seal of the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia also depicts the three-column arch.

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## GRADUATES AND ALUMNI HIGHLIGHTS

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- Alumni located in 152 of Georgia's 159 counties and all states and possessions except North Dakota and Puerto Rico.
- Sixty-seven percent of degrees and certificates conferred in 1991-92 were to women, 10 percent to blacks, and four percent to other minorities.
- Medical College of Georgia cumulative graduates top 20,000.





### DENTAL EXAMINATION CHAIR AND CABINET

This 1867 adjustable dental examination chair is similar to the first adjustable chair invented by James Snell of London in 1832. The chair is typical of the period. The instrument cabinet, dated 1901, is from the practice of a Georgia dentist. The chair, donated by the S. S. White Dental Supply Company of Philadelphia, and the cabinet, on loan from the family of Dr. S. W. Looper, were on display in the lobby of the dental building for several years.



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
## FACULTY AND STAFF HIGHLIGHTS

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- The number of part-time faculty remain relatively constant at 117. Volunteer and full-time instructional faculty jump four and five percent, respectively, over last year's figures.
- Faculty with the rank of professor represent 26 percent of all full-time instructional faculty. Associate professors and assistant professors represent 29 percent and 35 percent, respectively. Instructors and faculty with other ranks comprise the remaining 10 percent.





Vacation leave accrues up to a maximum of 360 hours (45 working days).

### Faculty

All permanent faculty and administrative officers (fiscal year contract) working one-half time or more earn vacation leave. Leave accrual is at a rate equal to current work commitment multiplied by 1.75 days per month. Faculty members on an academic year contract do not earn vacation leave. Permanent full-time faculty: vacation leave each December 31st may not exceed 45 working days. Permanent part-time faculty (working one-half time or more): maximum accrual allowed as of December 31st will be determined by work commitment as of that date. Faculty personnel will be paid for all accrued vacation leave (up to the maximum specified above) upon termination from MCG for any reason.

Four unscheduled holidays (UH) are authorized. One UH is earned for the quarters beginning January and July. Two UHs are earned beginning April quarter. Faculty members employed on an academic year basis do not earn unscheduled holidays.

## SICK LEAVE\*

### Classified Employees

3.69 hours each two weeks for biweekly classified employees or 8 hours (one day) per calendar month for monthly classified employees. No limit on accrual.

### Faculty

All permanent faculty and administrative officers working one-half time or more (including academic year faculty members) earn sick leave. Monthly sick leave accrual will equal the current work commitment multiplied by one day. Accrual shall be cumulative, with no maximum, for the entire length of continuous service.

Any faculty member unable to return to work after exhausting all accrued sick leave and vacation leave may be granted sick leave without pay for a period not to exceed one year. Approved sick leave of absence without pay permits a faculty member to continue all group insurance in effect. No additional vacation or sick leave will accrue while the member is on sick leave of absence without pay.

## MILITARY LEAVE

Permanent/Regular and Permanent/Part-time employees who are members of the Georgia National Guard or a reserve component of any of the United States Armed Forces may be granted leave with pay for a limited period as specified in official orders directing the active Military duty. The amount of this leave may not exceed 18 workdays in any calendar year or in any one continuous period.

## LEAVE OF ABSENCE

The President may, with the approval of the Chancellor and the Board of Regents, grant leaves of absence, with or without pay, to faculty members or administrative staff. Leaves are granted only for the purpose of promoting scholarly work and encouraging professional development. MCG does not currently have a sabbatical leave policy.

## RETIREMENT PLAN

### Classified Employees

Contributions are made by the employee and employer (State of Georgia). The employee's contribution is 6% of gross salary and the State's contribution is 11.81% currently. Federal and state taxes on monthly contributions are deferred until retirement or withdrawal. Participation by all employees who work half-time or more (other than temporary employees) is a condition of employment. Effective July 1, 1987, new employees age 60 or older may decline membership within 90 days after appointment on the payroll. Contributions and earned interest are returnable upon application, if employment is terminated before retirement.

### Faculty

Participation in the Regents Retirement Plan is mandatory for all permanent employees with a work commitment of half time or more. Faculty and principal administrative officers employed on or after July 1, 1990 are eligible to elect membership in the Teachers Retirement System of Georgia or an optional retirement program provided by TIAA-CREF or VALIC. Newly employed faculty or principal administrators have a thirty day election period following the effective date of their appointment to make their selection.

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<b>RETIREMENT PLAN, cont'd.</b>	<p>Under the Regents Retirement Plan, employees contribute six percent of their monthly gross salary and the state contributes four percent. After an individual who elects to participate in the Teachers Retirement System of Georgia completes ten years of creditable service, he or she has a vested right to a retirement benefit on or after age 60 or with 30 years of service regardless of age. An individual who selects the TIAA-CREF or VALIC retirement option will be vested after one month of continuous participation in the plan.</p> <p>Employee contributions to an optional retirement plan or Teachers Retirement of Georgia Plan are sheltered from Federal and State income taxes. New faculty aged 60 or older may decline membership within 90 days after being appointed on the payroll.</p>
<b>COMPULSORY RETIREMENT AGE</b>	Faculty personnel of the University System of Georgia may not continue employment beyond June 30 following their 70th birthday.
<b>JURY DUTY</b>	Full pay while on jury duty.
<b>SOCIAL SECURITY</b>	1992 contribution rates are 7.65% of monthly gross salary by employee and 7.65% by MCG (6.2% of the first \$55,500 earned and 1.45% of first \$130,200 earned).
<b>WORKER'S COMPENSATION</b>	Full coverage for work-related injuries as specified by the Georgia Worker's Compensation Law.
<b>HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE</b>	Available with or without dependent coverage and medical benefits at group rates. Part of the cost is paid by the Medical College of Georgia. Must have a work commitment of half-time or more (temporary employees are not eligible).
<b>LIFE INSURANCE</b>	MCG provides \$25,000 free Basic Life Insurance including Accidental Death and Dismemberment provisions. Supplemental Life Insurance up to \$175,000 can be purchased in the amounts of one times, two times or three times base salary. Dependent Life Insurance is also available. Must have a work commitment of half-time or more (temporary employees are not eligible).
<b>LONG TERM DISABILITY INSURANCE</b>	Available at group rates to all employees earning at least \$10,000 per annum. Must also have a work commitment of half-time or more.
<b>GROUP DENTAL INSURANCE</b>	Available at group rates to all permanent (full- and part-time) personnel. The plan consists of two options: Option I - Prepaid, and Option II - Insured.
<b>GROUP ACCIDENT INSURANCE</b>	Available at group rates to all employees working half-time or more.
<b>FLEXIBLE BENEFITS PLAN</b>	The Flexible Benefits Plan allows for payment of premium costs of the benefits selected with pretax dollars.
<b>DEPENDENT CARE FLEXIBLE SPENDING ACCOUNT PLAN</b>	The Dependent Spending Account Plan provides an opportunity for employees who have dependent care expenses, such as babysitting and daycare, to contribute pretax dollars to a special account from which they are reimbursed for such expenses.
<b>TUITION REIMBURSEMENT</b>	Classified employees working half-time or more are eligible to apply for tuition reimbursement of approved course work.

\*Vacation Leave, Scheduled Holidays, and Sick Leave are prorated for part-time employees who work half-time or more.

LENGTH OF EMPLOYMENT, STATUS, AND DEGREE




## STETHOSCOPE AND NINETEENTH CENTURY TEXTS

The Camman-type stethoscope shown here, c. 1889, is a binaural stethoscope developed by George Camman of New York. This became the most widely respected binaural stethoscope of the nineteenth century and probably was used at the Medical College of Georgia. Although many designers and instrument makers made minor changes,

the modern stethoscope is essentially the same instrument. The drawing is based on a stethoscope on display in the Robert B. Greenblatt, M.D. Library special collection and was donated by the family of an alumnus of the School of Medicine.

Texts used at the Medical College of Georgia during the 1800s were, like those of other early American medical schools, adaptations from English, French and other

European works. One of the earliest American texts was *A System of Anatomy for the Use of Students of Medicine* by Caspar Wistar (1817), professor of anatomy at the University of Pennsylvania. The Robert B. Greenblatt, M.D. Library holds a collection of nineteenth century medical texts, including the Wistar volume.



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## RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

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- Total extramural funding topped \$18.4 million (sponsored research support totaling over \$11.2 million of those funds).
- Researchers submitted 497 proposals for sponsored awards, a 22 percent increase over last year. Sponsored awards received jumped 12 percent.
- In 1991-92, over 84 percent of the Medical College of Georgia's research publications appeared in refereed journals.

The Medical College of Georgia is involved in 277 different funded research activities and related studies in its Schools of Allied Health Sciences, Dentistry, Graduate Studies, Medicine, and Nursing. Research is carried out in both basic and clinical disciplines. As a part of these efforts, three institutes are present on campus:

- Human Genetics Institute
- Georgia Institute of Human Nutrition
- Georgia Institute for Prevention of Human Disease and Accidents

Inter-university research efforts also are carried out with the University of Georgia, the Georgia Institute of Technology, and other US and foreign institutions.


### ***MCGRI***

The Medical College of Georgia Research Institute (MCGRI), managed by a 19-member Board of Directors, is the contracting agency for MCG for all research grants and contracts. The MCGRI:

- Assists MCG in providing administrative and logistical support for its research programs.
- Maintains a patent program to assist in the transfer of technology developed at MCG for the benefit of the inventor, MCG and the general public.
- Provides a research incentive program.
- Funds a grants program for faculty whose research proposals have been approved but not yet funded, and for new faculty to develop pilot studies required for grant applications.

Since being established in 1980, MCGRI has contributed \$4,116,909 of its operational budget to MCG faculty and administration in support of intramural research and educational programs. In 1991-92, \$150,000 was provided to faculty through grants awards and \$345,054 through research incentives.















THE CITY HOSPITAL OPERATING AMPHITHEATRE

This sketch is from a photograph c. 1906 of the operating amphitheatre of the old City Hospital. The City Hospital was under the direction of the faculty and was considered a part of the school. The amphitheatre was

used for surgical demonstrations to students. Medical College of Georgia catalogs of the period describe the amphitheatre as having a seating capacity of 200, well arranged and furnished with the latest aseptic furniture. It also was described as being perfectly lighted, having both gas and electric lights

making it possible to operate at any time of day or night. The glass-topped operating table in the picture is similar to those found in the 1898 *Polk's Medical and Surgical Register* and in Truax: *Mechanics of Surgery* 1899.

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

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




# COUNTY OF ORIGIN OF DISCHARGED GEORGIA INPATIENTS



### NEWTON BUILDING

In January 1913, the College relocated from the Old Medical College Building on Telfair Street to a building formerly used for the Augusta Orphanage. The building was named for Dr. George M. Newton, professor of anatomy, who also served as dean of the College from 1844 to 1857. His estate, with that of his stepfather, had been the source of funding for the Augusta Orphanage. The remodeled Newton

Building was the College's only academic building until the opening of the Dugas building in 1935. It continued as the main facility until the opening of the Kelly Building in 1954, when the administrative offices, the library and all remaining laboratories were relocated. The Newton Building reverted to the city and was demolished in 1959. The drawing is from a photograph in the Robert B. Greenblatt, M.D. Library special collection.






The Medical College of Georgia Foundation, Inc., is a non-profit organization whose purposes include the acquisition and holding of property and money to:




